

ASSEMBLY BILL

Introduced by Assembly Member Thomson

February 25, 2002

An act to add Section 2104.5 to the Business and Professions Code, relating to healing arts, and declaring the urgency thereof, to take effect immediately.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2872, as introduced, Thomson. Healing arts: physicians and surgeons.

Existing law, the Medical Practice Act, establishes requirements that a graduate of a medical school located outside of the United States or Canada is required to satisfy for licensure by the Medical Board of California as a physician and surgeon. These requirements include the successful completion of one academic year of a supervised clinical training program that is under the direction of an approved medical school.

This bill would make various findings by the Legislature, including that medical schools located within California no longer offer this clinical training program, described as the "Fifth Pathway Program." The bill would require the board, in consultation with these medical schools and the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development, to convene a working group to study methods to reactivate the Fifth Pathway Program in medical schools located in this state. The bill would require the board to report its findings to the Legislature on or before July 1, 2002.

The bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as an urgency statute.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. (a) The Legislature finds and declares all of the
2 following:

3 (1) The Fifth Pathway Program allows a citizen of the United
4 States who attended medical school in a foreign country and
5 completed one academic year of supervised clinical training in an
6 approved medical school located in the United States and one year
7 of a residency program, to apply for licensure as a physician and
8 surgeon.

9 (2) The clinical training component of the Fifth Pathway
10 Program is not currently offered in medical schools located in
11 California.

12 (3) The Fifth Pathway Program is currently utilized
13 successfully in other states, and has been utilized successfully in
14 California in the past, to increase the number of physicians and
15 surgeons who have an understanding of foreign cultures and a
16 proficiency in a foreign language that they obtained while
17 attending medical school in a foreign country.

18 (4) California is currently experiencing a shortage of health
19 care providers with the cultural and linguistic competency to serve
20 the state’s diverse population, which has contributed to a lack of
21 access to care in many immigrant communities.

22 (b) It is the intent of the Legislature to facilitate the
23 establishment of one or more Fifth Pathway Programs at approved
24 medical schools in California so that United States citizens who
25 have graduated from a medical school in a foreign country can
26 more easily obtain licensure in this state.

27 SEC. 2. Section 2104.5 is added to the Business and
28 Professions Code, to read:

29 2104.5. The board, in consultation with various medical
30 schools located in California and the Office of Statewide Health
31 Planning and Development, shall convene a working group to
32 study methods to reactivate the Fifth Pathway Program in medical
33 schools located in this state. The board shall submit a report to the
34 Legislature, including the chairs of the Assembly Health
35 Committee and the Senate Business and Professions Committee,



1 on or before July 1, 2002, that shall include options for the
2 Legislature to consider in order to facilitate the establishment of
3 one or more Fifth Pathway Programs in medical schools located
4 in California.

5 SEC. 3. This act is an urgency statute necessary for the
6 immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety
7 within the meaning of Article IV of the Constitution and shall go
8 into immediate effect. The facts constituting the necessity are:

9 There is a severe shortage of health care providers in California
10 who are culturally and linguistically competent to serve the state's
11 diverse population. Because this shortage presents a danger to the
12 health of those citizens, it is necessary that this act go into
13 immediate effect.
