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An act to add and repeal Article 15.3 (commencing with Section 8340) of Chapter 2 of Part 6 of the Education Code, relating to child care.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1326, as amended, Simitian. Child care subsidies: County of San Mateo: pilot project.

Existing law requires the Superintendent of Public Instruction to adopt rules and regulations on eligibility, enrollment, and priority of services for federal and state subsidized child care programs.

This bill would authorize the County of San Mateo, as a pilot project, to develop and implement an individualized county child care subsidy plan. The bill would require the plan to ensure that child care subsidies received by the county are used to address local needs, conditions, and

priorities of working families in the community. The bill would require the County of San Mateo, prior to implementing the plan, to develop a plan with specified elements, including development of local policies that may, except as specified, supersede existing law with regard to eligibility requirements, fees, reimbursement rates, and methods of maximizing use of funds. The bill would require the plan to be approved by the local child care planning council and the Child Development Division of the State Department of Education, as provided. The bill would require the Legislative Analyst and the Senate Office of Research to review the data contained in the child care subsidy plan before the plan is submitted to the local child care planning council for approval. The bill would require the County of San Mateo to submit annual reports to the Legislature, the State Department of Social Services, and the State Department of Education that summarize the success of the plan and to submit a final report to those entities on or before December 31, 2008.

This bill would authorize the County of San Mateo to implement the plan until January 1, 2009, as specified. The bill would provide for the repeal of its provisions on January 1, 2011. The bill would provide that ~~between January 1, 2009, and January 1, 2011, a child who is phased out of the pilot program~~ *enrolls in subsidized child care in the County of San Mateo after January 1, 2009, may not be enrolled in the pilot program and is subject to existing state laws and regulations regarding child care subsidies.*

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Article 15.3 (commencing with Section 8340)  
 2 is added to Chapter 2 of Part 6 of the Education Code, to read:

 4 Article 15.3. Individualized County Child Care Subsidy Plan  
 5  
 6 8340. The County of San Mateo may, as a pilot project,  
 7 develop and implement an individualized county child care  
 8 subsidy plan. The plan shall ensure that child care subsidies  
 9 received by the county are used to address local needs, conditions,  
 10 and priorities of working families in the community.



1 8341. Prior to implementing the local subsidy plan, the  
2 County of San Mateo, in consultation with the department, shall  
3 develop an individualized county child care subsidy plan that  
4 includes the following four elements:

5 (a) An assessment to identify the county's goal for its  
6 subsidized child care system. The assessment shall examine  
7 whether the current structure of subsidized child care funding  
8 adequately supports working families in the county and whether  
9 the county's child care goals coincide with the state's requirements  
10 for funding, eligibility, priority, and reimbursement. The  
11 assessment shall also identify barriers in the state's child care  
12 subsidy system that inhibit the county from meeting its child care  
13 goals. In conducting the assessment, the county shall consider all  
14 of the following:

15 (1) The general demographics of families who are in need of  
16 child care, including employment, income, language, ethnic, and  
17 family composition.

18 (2) The current supply of available subsidized child care.

19 (3) The level of need for various types of subsidized child care  
20 services including, but not limited to, infant care, after-hours care,  
21 and care for children with exceptional needs.

22 (4) The county's self-sufficiency income level.

23 (5) Income eligibility levels for subsidized child care.

24 (6) Family fees.

25 (7) The cost of providing child care.

26 (8) The regional market rates, as established by the department,  
27 for different types of child care.

28 (9) The standard reimbursement rate or state per diem for  
29 centers operating under contracts with the department.

30 (10) Trends in the county's unemployment rate and housing  
31 affordability index.

32 (b) Development of a local policy to eliminate state-imposed  
33 regulatory barriers to the county's achievement of its desired  
34 outcomes for subsidized child care.

35 (1) The local policy shall do all of the following:

36 (A) Prioritize lowest income families first.

37 (B) Follow the family fee schedule established pursuant to  
38 subdivision (f) of Section 8263 *for those families that are income*  
39 *eligible, as defined by Section 8263.1.*



1 (C) Meet local goals that are consistent with the state’s child  
2 care goals.

3 (D) Identify existing policies that would be affected by the  
4 county’s child care subsidy plan.

5 (E) (i) Authorize any agency that provides child care and  
6 development services in San Mateo County through a contract  
7 with the department to apply to the department to amend existing  
8 contracts in order to benefit from the local policy once it is  
9 adopted. ~~The~~

10 (ii) *The department shall approve an application to amend an*  
11 *existing contract if the child care subsidy plan is approved*  
12 *pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 8342, or modified pursuant*  
13 *to subdivision (c) of Section 8342.*

14 (iii) *The contract of a department contractor who does not elect*  
15 *to request an amendment to its contract remains operative and*  
16 *enforceable.*

17 (F) *If a contract is amended as provided in subparagraph (E)*  
18 *and the contractor receives an increase in its reimbursement rate*  
19 *as a result of the amendment, the County of San Mateo shall, by*  
20 *the end of the first full fiscal year of operation under the amended*  
21 *contract, demonstrate a 2 percent increase in the aggregate child*  
22 *days of enrollment under that contract compared to the enrollment*  
23 *under that contract in the final quarter of the 2002–03 fiscal year.*

24 (2) The local policy may supersede state law concerning child  
25 care subsidy programs with regard only to the following factors:

26 (A) Eligibility criteria including, but not limited to, age, family  
27 size, time limits, income level, inclusion of former and current  
28 CalWORKs participants, and special needs considerations, except  
29 that the local policy may not deny or reduce eligibility of a family  
30 that qualifies for child care pursuant to Section 8353. Under the  
31 local policy, a family that qualifies for child care pursuant to  
32 Section 8354 shall be treated for purposes of eligibility and fees in  
33 the same manner as a family that qualifies for subsidized child care  
34 on another basis pursuant to the local policy.

35 (B) Fees including, but not limited to, family fees, sliding scale  
36 fees, and copayments.

37 (C) Reimbursement rates.

38 (D) Methods of maximizing the efficient use of subsidy funds,  
39 including, but not limited to, multiyear contracting with the  
40 department for center-based child care, and interagency



1 agreements that allow for flexible and temporary transfer of funds  
2 among agencies.

3 (c) Recognition that all funding sources utilized by direct  
4 service contractors that provide child care and development  
5 services in San Mateo County are eligible to be included in the  
6 child care subsidy plan of the county.

7 (d) Establishment of measurable outcomes to evaluate the  
8 success of the plan to achieve the county's child care goals and to  
9 overcome any barriers identified in the state's child care subsidy  
10 system. The Department of Social Services shall have an  
11 opportunity to review and comment on the proposed measurable  
12 outcomes before they are submitted to the local child care planning  
13 council for approval pursuant to Section 8342.

15 8341.5. To ensure that the annual and final reports required  
16 pursuant to Section 8343 provide useful comparative information,  
17 the Legislative Analyst and the Senate Office of Research shall  
18 review the evaluation design, the baseline data, and the data  
19 collection proposed in the child care subsidy plan of the county  
20 before the plan is submitted to the local child care planning council  
21 for approval.

22 8342. (a) The plan shall be submitted to the local child care  
23 planning council for approval. Upon approval of the plan by the  
24 local child care planning council, the county board of supervisors  
25 shall hold at least one public hearing on the plan. Following the  
26 hearing, if the county board of supervisors votes in favor of the  
27 plan, the plan shall be submitted to the Child Development  
28 Division of the department for review.

29 (b) Within 30 days of receiving the plan, the Child  
30 Development Division shall review and either approve or  
31 disapprove the plan.

32 (c) Within 30 days of receiving any modification to the plan,  
33 the Child Development Division shall review and either approve  
34 or disapprove that modification to the plan.

35 (d) The Child Development Division may disapprove only  
36 those portions of the plan or modifications to the plan that are not  
37 in conformance with this article or that are in conflict with federal  
38 law.

39 8343. (a) Upon approval of the plan by the Child  
40 Development Division, the County of San Mateo shall annually



1 prepare and submit to the Legislature, the Department of Social  
2 Services, and the department a report that summarizes the success  
3 of the pilot project and the county's ability to maximize the use of  
4 funds and to improve and stabilize child care in the county.

5 (b) On or before December 31, 2008, the County of San Mateo  
6 shall submit a final report to the Legislature, the Department of  
7 Social Services, and the department summarizing the impact of the  
8 plan on the child care needs of working families.

9 8344. The County of San Mateo may implement its  
10 individualized county child care subsidy plan until January 1,  
11 2009, at which date the County of San Mateo shall terminate the  
12 plan. Between January 1, 2009, and January 1, 2011, the County  
13 of San Mateo shall phase out the individualized county child care  
14 subsidy plan and, as of January 1, 2011, shall implement the state's  
15 requirements for child care subsidies. A child enrolling for the first  
16 time for subsidized child care in San Mateo County after January  
17 1, 2009, may not be enrolled in the pilot program established  
18 pursuant to this article and is subject to existing state laws and  
19 regulations regarding child care eligibility and priority.

20 8345. The plan shall allow a participating contractor to  
21 receive any increase in funding that the contractor would have  
22 received if the contractor had not participated in the local subsidy  
23 plan.

24 8346. This article shall remain in effect only until January 1,  
25 2011, and as of that date is repealed, unless a later enacted statute,  
26 which is enacted before January 1, 2011, deletes or extends that  
27 date.
