LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 826, as introduced, Nava. Food and agriculture.

Existing law provides that California farmers may transport for sale and sell California-grown fresh fruits, nuts, and vegetables that they produce, directly to the public and defines certified farmers' markets as locations established in accordance with local ordinances, where California farmers may transport and sell to the public California agricultural products that they produced.

This bill would state the intent of the Legislature to establish a program to encourage the creation of farmers' markets and other venues for the sale of fruits and vegetables in areas of the state with inadequate access to those foods.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:
