An act to amend Section 116875 of the Health and Safety Code, relating to lead plumbing.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1953, as introduced, Chan. Lead plumbing.

Existing law prohibits the use of any pipe, pipe or plumbing fitting or fixture, solder, or flux that is not lead free in the installation or repair of any public water system or any plumbing in a facility providing water for human consumption, except as specified.

Existing law prohibits the introduction into commerce of any pipe, pipe or plumbing fitting, or fixture, except for a pipe that is used in manufacturing or industrial processing.

Existing law defines lead free as not more than 8% lead when used with respect to pipes and fittings and not more than 4% by dry weight with respect to plumbing fittings and fixtures.

This bill would revise the term lead free to mean not more than 0.25% lead when used with respect to pipes and pipe fittings, plumbing fittings, and fixtures.

Existing law requires the State Department of Health Services to adopt building standards to implement the above prohibitions. Appropriate state and local building and health officials are required to enforce these standards.

By increasing the duties of local officials, this bill will impose a state-mandated local program.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state.

Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to these statutory provisions.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 116875 of the Health and Safety Code
2 is amended to read:

3 116875. (a) No person shall use any pipe, pipe or plumbing
4 fitting or fixture, solder, or flux that is not lead free in the
5 installation or repair of any public water system or any plumbing
6 in a facility providing water for human consumption, except
7 when necessary for the repair of leaded joints of cast iron pipes.

8 (b) No person shall introduce into commerce any pipe, pipe or
9 plumbing fitting, or fixture, that is not lead free, except for a pipe
10 that is used in manufacturing or industrial processing.

11 (c) No person engaged in the business of selling plumbing
12 supplies, except manufacturers, shall sell solder or flux that is not
13 lead free.

14 (d) No person shall introduce into commerce any solder or
15 flux that is not lead free unless the solder or flux bears a
16 prominent label stating that it is illegal to use the solder or flux in
17 the installation or repair of any plumbing providing water for
18 human consumption.

19 (e) For the purposes of this section, "lead free" means not
20 more than 0.2 percent lead when used with respect to solder and
21 flux and not more than ~~8~~ 0.25 percent when used with respect to
22 pipes and pipe fittings, *plumbing fittings, and fixtures*. ~~With~~
23 ~~respect to plumbing fittings and fixtures, "lead free" means not~~
24 ~~more than 4 percent by dry weight after August 6, 2002, unless~~
25 ~~the department has adopted a standard, based on health effects,~~
26 ~~for the leaching of lead.~~

27 SEC. 2. If the Commission on State Mandates determines that
28 this act contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement to
29 local agencies and school districts for those costs shall be made
