An act to add Sections 8879.38, 8879.39, and 8879.40 to the Government Code, relating to transportation.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 995, as amended, Nava. California Ports Infrastructure, Security, and Air Quality Improvement Account.

Existing law, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006, approved by the voters as Proposition 1B in the November 2006 general election, establishes the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Fund of 2006 in the State Treasury. Specified moneys in the fund are required to be deposited in various accounts to be available upon appropriation by the Legislature, for certain purposes.

This bill would require projects funded from proceeds of bonds issued under the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006 to meet specified requirements. The bill would require projects that have the highest benefits compared to cost, and that reduce pollution to be given priority for funding from bond proceeds. The bill would prohibit the Budget Act from including appropriations for specific transportation improvement projects, and the Legislature from enacting legislation containing specific

transportation projects, funded from the proceeds of these bonds. The bill would prohibit the Legislature from enacting legislation to continuously appropriate these bond proceeds. The bill would also require the California Transportation Commission to report to the Legislature on the administration of programs under the bond act.

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Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

 protection against a security and safety threat or projects to develop
 disaster response transportation systems that can move people,
 goods, and emergency personnel and equipment in the aftermath
 of a disaster impairing the mobility of goods, people, and

include in its annual report to the Legislature, required by Section 4
