Assembly Joint Resolution No. 37-Relative to immigration.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AJR 37, as amended, De Leon. Immigration.

This measure would specify principles for repairing the nation's broken immigration system and would urge Congress and the President of the United States to take a comprehensive and workable approach to improving the nation's immigration system using those principles.

- 1 WHEREAS, The United States of America was founded by 2 immigrants who traveled came from around the world seeking a better life: and 3
- 4 WHEREAS, The current immigration system is broken. It 5 separates families, reduces the effectiveness of national security 6 programs, contributes to labor abuses, and creates long backlogs 7 for families seeking naturalization. Further, it neglects the hard
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- work and financial contributions immigrants make to our country; 9 and
- 10 WHEREAS, It is estimated that about 11 million undocumented
- immigrants are in the United States; and 11
- WHEREAS, California has one of the biggest populations of 12
- 13 immigrants, both legal and undocumented; and

1 WHEREAS, Immigrants and their children comprise nearly

2 one-half of California's population and live and work in all 58

3 counties, most notably in the San Diego, Central Valley, Los

4 Angeles, and greater San Francisco areas; and

5 WHEREAS, Immigrants and their children comprise nearly one-half of California's population and contribute to local 6 7 economies. In the San Francisco Bay area, immigrants contribute 8 22% of the region's economic activity. In Santa Clara County, 9 immigrants contribute 44% of the region's economic activity. In Fresno, immigrants contribute 27% of the region's economic 10 activity. In Orange County, immigrants contribute 33% of the 11 region's economic activity. In the Inland Empire, immigrants 12 13 contribute 28% of the region's economic activity. In San Diego, 14 immigrants contribute 25% of the region's economic activity; and WHEREAS, Approximately 77% of undocumented immigrants 15 that reside in California live with families members that are legal 16 17 United States residents and citizens; and

18 WHEREAS, One in eleven workers in California is an 19 undocumented immigrant, and immigrants are a vibrant, 20 productive, and vital part of the state's growing economy, diverse 21 cultural fabric, and changing demographics. Immigrant worker 22 populations in California are concentrated in a variety of sectors, 23 including leisure and hospitality, construction, food and agriculture, 24 service, transportation, and textile sectors. Many immigrants 25 throughout the state-even own have even started their own small 26 businesses; and 27 WHEREAS, The integration of immigrants and the development

of a comprehensive approach to solve our broken immigration
 system is critical to ensure that our state continues to have a strong
 economy; and

31 WHEREAS, Fixing our broken immigration system would have 32 a positive impact on the economy because moving workers out of a vulnerable underground status produces both short-term and 33 34 long-term economic gains. Doing so will strengthen the ability of 35 working families to become more productive, with higher levels 36 of income and job-generating consumption, and will increase their 37 net contributions to tax revenues; and 38 WHEREAS, Fixing our broken immigration system would have

a positive impact on the economy in the short and long term.
 Recent data released by the Center for American Progress

1 University of California, Los Angeles, indicates that legalizing the

2 status of undocumented immigrants working and living in the

3 United States would create roughly \$1.5 trillion in additional GDP

4 growth over 10 years and increase wages for all workers; and

5 WHEREAS, A study released by the University of Southern 6 California estimates that the immediate and long-term effects of 7 enacting comprehensive immigration reform would result in a \$16

8 billion boost to California's economy; and

9 WHEREAS, Modernizing our antiquated and dysfunctional 10 immigration system will uphold our nation's basic values of 11 fairness, equal opportunity, and respect for the law; and

WHEREAS, A comprehensive approach to solve our broken immigration system, one that works for all communities and families in America, should include the following elements: (1) a plan for providing legal status with a path to citizenship to undocumented immigrants who are working and living in the

United States, which plan should include the AgJOBS Act of 2009and DREAM Act of 2009, (2) improvement of the economic

situation of all workers in the United States, (3) the reform of visa

20 programs in order to keep families together, protect workers' rights,

and ensure that future immigration is regulated and controlled

22 rather than illegal and chaotic, (4) the implementation of smart,

23 effective enforcement measures targeted at the worst violators of

24 immigration and labor laws, (5) prioritizing immigrant integration

25 into our communities and country, and (6) respect for the due

process rights of everyone in the United States; now, therefore,
be it

28 Resolved by the Assembly and the Senate of the State of 29 California, jointly, That the Legislature urges the President and

30 the Congress of the United States to take a comprehensive and

31 workable approach to solving our nation's broken immigration

32 system, using the principles described in this resolution; and be it

33 further

34 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies

35 of this resolution to the President and the Vice President of the

36 United States, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and

37 to each Senator and Representative from California in the Congress

38 of the United States.
