An act to amend Sections ~~12956.1, 12956.2, and 27361~~ *12956.1 and 12956.2* of, *to add Section 27361.05 to*, and to add Article 3.6 (commencing with Section 27310) to Chapter 6 of Part 3 of Division 2 of Title 3 of, the Government Code, relating to real property.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 985, as amended, De La Torre. Real property: discriminatory restrictions.

(1) Existing law prohibits discrimination in housing through restrictive covenants based on race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, familial status, marital status, disability, national origin, source of income, or ancestry and provides that discrimination in housing through a restrictive covenant includes the existence of a

restrictive covenant regardless of whether accompanied by a statement that the covenant is repealed or void.

Existing law similarly declares that any provision in any deed of real property in California that purports to restrict the right of any person to sell, lease, rent, use, or occupy the property to persons having any specified characteristic, including, but not limited to, race, color, religion, sex, marital status, national origin, ancestry, familial status, disability, source of income, or sexual orientation, by providing for payment of a penalty, forfeiture, reverter, or otherwise, is void, except as specified.

Existing law provides that any deed or other written instrument that relates to title to real property, or any written covenant, condition, or restriction annexed or made a part of, by reference or otherwise, any deed or instrument, that contains any provision that purports to forbid, restrict, or condition the right of any person or persons to sell, buy, lease, rent, use, or occupy the property on account of any of the above-specified characteristics, shall be deemed to be revised to omit that provision.

Existing law also authorizes a person who holds an ownership interest of record in property that he or she believes is the subject of an unlawfully restrictive covenant based on race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, familial status, marital status, disability, national origin, source of income, or ancestry, to record a Restrictive Covenant Modification, which would include a copy of the original document with the illegal language stricken. Before recording the modification document, the county recorder is required to submit the modification document and the original document to the county counsel who is required to determine whether the original document contains an unlawful restriction based on race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, familial status, marital status, disability, national origin, source of income, or ancestry. The county recorder is required to make Restrictive Covenant Modification forms available to the public. Under existing law, a county recorder, title insurance company, escrow company, real estate broker, real estate agent, or association that provides a copy of a declaration, governing document, or deed to any person is required to place a cover page or stamp on the previously recorded document stating that if the document contains an unlawful restriction, that restriction is void and may be removed by recording a Restrictive Covenant Modification.

This bill would require a county recorder, title insurance company, escrow company, real estate broker, real estate agent, or association that provides a copy of a declaration, governing document, or deed to a person who holds an ownership interest of record in property to also provide a Restrictive Covenant Modification form with specified procedural information to that person. The bill would authorize a title insurance company, escrow company, real estate broker, real estate agent, or other person to record a Restrictive Covenant Modification, in addition to the owner of record, and would require the requester to provide a return address in order for the county recorder to notify the interested party of the action taken by county counsel on the respective property. The bill would require the county counsel to make its determination whether the language identified by the requester in the original document contains an unlawful restriction within a reasonable period of time, not to exceed 3 months, as specified, and would authorize the county counsel to compile a list of phrases identified as unlawfully restrictive language for the purpose of expediting that determination. The bill would require the county recorder to make Restrictive Covenant Modification forms available to the public onsite in an appropriately designated area, and would permit multiple submissions on behalf of different homes and for processing homes in batches with respect to a modification document that affects multiple homes or lots. These new duties would impose a state-mandated local program on the county recorder and county counsel.

(2) Existing law requires the recorder of each county to establish a social security number truncation program in order to create a public record version of each official record so that the public record is in an electronic format and is an exact copy of the official record, except that any social security number contained in the official record shall be truncated by redacting the first 5 digits of that number. These provisions apply to any document recorded since January 1, 1980, as specified. If a public record version of an official record exists, and upon a request of any person to inspect, copy, or to otherwise publicly disclose that record, the recorder shall make available only the public record version of that record, and publicly disclose the official record only in response to a subpoena or court order. The county recorder may, upon authorization of the board of supervisors, charge an additional fee of \$1 for recording the first page of each document to be used to implement a social security number truncation program pursuant to these provisions. The county auditor is required, at the request of the county board of

supervisors, to verify that these fees are used only for the purpose of the program.

This bill would require the recorder of each county to create a public record version of each official record for which a restrictive covenant modification is recorded on or after January 1, 2010, so that the public record is in an electronic format and is an exact copy of the official record, except that any unlawfully restrictive covenant contained in the official record shall be redacted. The bill would specify that an electronic version of the unredacted record, for which a Restrictive Covenant Modification is recorded, would become the official record for the purposes of these provisions. If a public record version of an official record exists, and upon request of any person to inspect, copy, or to otherwise publicly disclose that record, the recorder shall make available only the public record version of that record, and publicly disclose the official record only in response to a subpoena or court order. The bill would provide that the county recorder shall not incur any liability for a procedural, clerical, or administrative error in the recording of a modification document or any other activity related to the redaction of an unlawfully restrictive covenant pursuant to these provisions. The bill would also exempt the county counsel from liability, as specified. The bill would require the county recorder to charge an initial fee of not more than \$2, as specified, for recording the first page of each property-related document to be used by the county for the sole purpose of performing activities related to the redaction of an unlawfully restrictive covenant pursuant to these provisions or those described in (1) above. The bill would require the board of supervisors to adjust the fee to a whole dollar amount reasonably sufficient to recover costs. By creating new duties for county recorders, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

(3) This bill would make legislative findings that any limitation on the public's right of access to the writings of public officials and agencies made by its provisions is necessary to protect against the risk of discrimination.

(4) The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that the Legislature finds there is no mandate contained in the bill that will result in costs incurred by a local agency or school district for a new program or higher level of service which

require reimbursement pursuant to these constitutional and statutory provisions.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 12956.1 of the Government Code is
2 amended to read:

3 12956.1. (a) As used in this section, “association,” “governing
4 documents,” and “declaration” have the same meanings as set forth
5 in Section 1351 of the Civil Code.

6 (b) (1) A county recorder, title insurance company, escrow
7 company, real estate broker, real estate agent, or association that
8 provides a copy of a declaration, governing document, or deed to
9 any person shall place a cover page or stamp on the first page of
10 the previously recorded document or documents stating, in at least
11 14-point boldface type, the following:

13 “If this document contains any restriction based on race, color,
14 religion, sex, sexual orientation, familial status, marital status,
15 disability, national origin, source of income as defined in
16 subdivision (p) of Section 12955, or ancestry, that restriction
17 violates state and federal fair housing laws and is void, and may
18 be removed pursuant to Section 12956.2 of the Government Code.
19 Lawful restrictions under state and federal law on the age of
20 occupants in senior housing or housing for older persons shall not
21 be construed as restrictions based on familial status.”

22
23 (2) The requirements set forth in paragraph (1) shall not apply
24 to documents being submitted for recordation to a county recorder.

25 (3) A county recorder, title insurance company, escrow
26 company, real estate broker, real estate agent, or association that
27 provides a copy of a declaration, governing document, or deed
28 directly to a person who holds an ownership interest of record in
29 property shall also provide a Restrictive Covenant Modification
30 form with procedural information, as defined subdivision (b) of
31 Section 27310, along with the document.

32 (c) Any person who records a document for the express purpose
33 of adding a racially restrictive covenant is guilty of a misdemeanor.

1 The county recorder shall not incur any liability for recording the
2 document. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a
3 prosecution for a violation of this subdivision shall commence
4 within three years after the discovery of the recording of the
5 document.

6 SEC. 2. Section 12956.2 of the Government Code is amended
7 to read:

8 12956.2. (a) A person who holds an ownership interest of
9 record in property that he or she believes is the subject of an
10 unlawfully restrictive covenant in violation of subdivision (l) of
11 Section 12955 may record a document titled Restrictive Covenant
12 Modification. A title insurance company, escrow company, real
13 estate broker, real estate agent, or other person also may record
14 the modification document provided for in this section. The county
15 recorder may choose to waive the fee prescribed for recording and
16 indexing instruments pursuant to Section 27361 in the case of the
17 modification document. The modification document shall include
18 a complete copy of the original document containing the unlawfully
19 restrictive language with the unlawfully restrictive language
20 stricken.

21 (b) Before recording the modification document, the county
22 recorder shall submit the modification document and the original
23 document to the county counsel who shall determine whether the
24 language identified by the requester in the original document
25 contains an unlawful restriction based on race, color, religion, sex,
26 sexual orientation, familial status, marital status, disability, national
27 origin, source of income as defined in subdivision (p) of Section
28 12955, or ancestry. The county counsel shall return the documents
29 and inform the county recorder of its determination within a
30 reasonable period of time, not to exceed three months unless
31 extraordinary circumstances apply. The county recorder shall refuse
32 to record the modification document if the county counsel finds
33 that the original document does not contain an unlawful restriction
34 as specified in this subdivision. For the purpose of expediting the
35 determination required pursuant to this subdivision, the county
36 counsel may compile a list of phrases identified as unlawfully
37 restrictive language.

38 (c) If a title insurance company, escrow agent, realtor, or other
39 person requests to record a modification document, the requester
40 shall provide a return address in order for the county recorder to

1 notify the interested party of the action taken by county counsel
2 on the respective property. The notice required pursuant to this
3 subdivision may be made on a postcard mailed by first-class mail.

4 (d) The modification document shall be indexed in the same
5 manner as the original document being modified. It shall contain
6 a recording reference to the original document in the form of a
7 book and page or instrument number, and date of the recording.

8 (e) Subject to covenants, conditions, and restrictions that were
9 recorded after the recording of the original document that contains
10 the unlawfully restrictive language and subject to covenants,
11 conditions, and restrictions that will be recorded after the
12 Restrictive Covenant Modification, the restrictions in the
13 Restrictive Covenant Modification, once recorded, are the only
14 restrictions having effect on the property. The effective date of the
15 terms and conditions of the modification document shall be the
16 same as the effective date of the original document.

17 (f) The county recorder shall make available to the public
18 Restrictive Covenant Modification forms onsite in an appropriately
19 designated area, which shall be deemed to satisfy the requirement
20 of paragraphs (1) and (2) of subdivision (b) of Section 12956.1 to
21 provide a Restrictive Covenant Modification form if the specified
22 procedural information for completion is attached to the form.
23 Those forms shall permit multiple submissions on behalf of
24 different homes and for processing homes in batches with respect
25 to a modification document that affects multiple homes or lots.

26 (g) If the holder of an ownership interest of record in property
27 or a third party causes to be recorded a modified document pursuant
28 to this section that contains modifications not authorized by this
29 section, the county recorder shall not incur liability for recording
30 the document. The liability that may result from the unauthorized
31 recordation is the sole responsibility of the holder of the ownership
32 interest of record or third party who caused the modified
33 recordation.

34 (h) This section does not apply to persons holding an ownership
35 interest in property that is part of a common interest development
36 as defined in subdivision (c) of Section 1351 of the Civil Code if
37 the board of directors of that common interest development is
38 subject to the requirements of subdivision (b) of Section 1352.5
39 of the Civil Code.

1 SEC. 3. Article 3.6 (commencing with Section 27310) is added
2 to Chapter 6 of Part 3 of Division 2 of Title 3 of the Government
3 Code, to read:

5 Article 3.6. Unlawfully Restrictive Covenant Redaction
6

7 27310. As used in this article, the following terms have the
8 following meanings:

9 (a) "Official record" means the permanent archival record of
10 all instruments, papers, and notices as accepted for recording by
11 a county recorder.

12 (b) "Procedural information," as it relates to a Restrictive
13 Covenant Modification, means the description of how to locate
14 potentially unlawful restrictive covenants and how to submit the
15 Restrictive Covenant Modification document to the county recorder
16 for appropriate processing. This description may, but is not required
17 to, use the following language:

18
19 Some archived property documents may contain offensive, illegal
20 language that purports to restrict ownership or occupancy of
21 property. These restrictions are illegal, and have no effect on
22 anyone's ability to own or occupy the property, but may still appear
23 in property documents as an unlawful restrictive covenant.

24 Sometimes these illegal restrictions appear only in archived
25 documents and may be found only by a review of those documents
26 at the office of the county recorder. You may search those
27 documents for free at the office of the county recorder, which is
28 open to the public. If you discover an illegal restriction, you may
29 obtain a Restrictive Covenant Modification form from the office
30 of the county recorder to request the removal of the illegal
31 restriction. You must submit a modification document that includes
32 a complete copy of the original document containing the unlawfully
33 restrictive language with the unlawfully restrictive language
34 stricken.

35 After you complete the form and submit it to the office of the
36 county recorder, the county counsel will make a legal determination
37 whether the language is indeed unlawful and should be removed.
38 If an illegal restriction is found to exist, state law contains a
39 procedure for the creation of a replacement document that does
40 not contain the offensive language. This procedure may be used

1 to remove illegal restrictions from a declaration, governing
2 document, or deed, even if you are not the owner.

3
4 (c) “Public record” means a record that is in an electronic format
5 and is an exact copy of an official record except that any unlawfully
6 restrictive covenant contained in the copied record is redacted and
7 any social security number contained in the copied record is
8 truncated pursuant to Article 3.5 (commencing with Section
9 27300). The public record shall have the same legal force and
10 effect as the official record.

11 (d) “Unlawfully restrictive covenant” means any written
12 covenant, condition, or restriction annexed or made a part of, by
13 reference or otherwise, a deed or other instrument in violation of
14 subdivision (l) of Section 12955.

15 27311. (a) The county recorder of each county shall create a
16 public record version of each official record for which a Restrictive
17 Covenant Modification is recorded pursuant to Section 12956.2
18 on or after January 1, 2010. The public record shall be in an
19 electronic format and an exact copy of the official record, except
20 that any unlawfully restrictive covenant contained in the official
21 record shall be redacted. An electronic version of the unredacted
22 record, for which a Restrictive Covenant Modification is recorded,
23 shall become the official record for purposes of this section.

24 (b) Nothing in this article shall be construed to restrict, delay,
25 or modify access to any official record, or modify any existing
26 agreements regarding access to any official record, prior to the
27 creation and availability of a public record version of that official
28 record. A county recorder shall not charge any new fee or increase
29 any existing fees in order to fund the redaction of unlawfully
30 restrictive covenants pursuant to this article, except as provided
31 in subdivision (e) of Section 27361.

32 (c) The county recorder shall not incur any liability for a
33 procedural, clerical, or administrative error in the recording of a
34 modification document or any other activity related to the redaction
35 of an unlawfully restrictive covenant pursuant to this article.

36 27313. If a public record version of an official record exists,
37 both of the following shall apply:

38 (a) Upon a request for inspection, copying, or any other public
39 disclosure of an official record that is not exempt from disclosure,

1 a county recorder shall make available only the public record
2 version of that record.

3 (b) A county recorder shall publicly disclose an official record
4 only in response to a subpoena or order of a court of competent
5 jurisdiction.

6 27314. (a) Each county may use funds generated by fees
7 authorized by subdivision (e) of Section 27361 to implement this
8 article.

9 (b) It is the intent of the Legislature that counties be permitted
10 to seek revenue anticipation loans or other outside funding sources
11 for the implementation of this article to be secured by the
12 anticipated revenue from the fee authorized by subdivision (e) of
13 Section 27361.

14 27317. A county recorder is authorized to take all actions
15 required by this article notwithstanding subdivision (d) of Section
16 27203 or any other provision of law.

17 27318. The county counsel shall not incur liability for the
18 failure to strike unlawfully restrictive language from a document
19 if that language was not identified on the Restrictive Covenant
20 Modification form as an illegal restriction.

26 SEC. 5. The Legislature finds and declares that Section 3 of
27 this act imposes a limitation on the public's right of access to the
28 meetings of public bodies or the writings of public officials and
29 agencies within the meaning of Section 3 of Article I of the
30 California Constitution. Pursuant to that constitutional provision,
31 the Legislature makes the following finding to demonstrate the
32 interest protected by this limitation and the need for protecting
33 that interest:

34 In order to protect against the risk of discrimination when
35 government documents maintained by county recorders contain
36 unlawfully restrictive covenants, it is necessary to enact legislation
37 that minimizes the existence of unlawfully restrictive covenants
38 in those government documents.

39 SEC. 6. The Legislature finds that there is no mandate
40 contained in this act that will result in costs incurred by a local

1 agency or school district for a new program or higher level of
2 service which require reimbursement pursuant to Section 6 of
3 Article XIII B of the California Constitution and Part 7
4 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of Title 2 of the
5 Government Code.
