An act to amend Sections 12841.4, 19204, 19220, 19312, 46003, 46004.1, 46009, 46013, 46013.1, 46013.2, and 46014.1 of the Food and Agricultural Code, *and to amend Section 110485 of the Health and Safety Code*, relating to *food and agriculture*.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2612, as amended, Committee on Agriculture. Slaughtered animals: pet food: organic products: ~~registration~~: *registration: food safety fee*.

(1) Existing law requires every person who is the first to sell any agricultural- or structural-use pesticide product for use in this state that is packaged in rigid, nonrefillable, high-density polyethylene (HDPE) containers of 55 gallons or less to establish a recycling program, or demonstrate participation in a recycling program to ensure HDPE containers are recycled. Existing law requires that the recycling program be certified by an accredited 3rd-party organization, as specified, as being in compliance with certain standards, as specified. Existing law requires any person who is required to establish or participate in this recycling program to provide to the director, at least annually, a document certifying that this requirement has been met.

This bill would instead require the registrant of any production agricultural- or structural-use pesticide product for use in this state that is packaged in HDPE containers of 55 gallons or less to establish a recycling program, or demonstrate participation in a recycling program to ensure HDPE containers are recycled. The bill would delete the 3rd-party certification requirements pertaining to the recycling program. The bill would require any registrant who is required to establish or participate in this recycling program to provide to the director, at least annually, a document certifying that this requirement has been met.

(2) Existing law requires a person engaged in the business of operating a collection center to obtain a license from the Department of Food and Agriculture for each collection center operated. “Collection center” is defined to mean a receiving area for the temporary storage of animal carcasses, packinghouse waste, or other products before transportation to a licensed rendering plant. Existing law makes a violation of these provisions a crime.

This bill, instead, would define “collection center” to mean a receiving area for the temporary storage of animal carcasses, packinghouse waste, or other products before transportation to a licensed rendering plant or pet food processor. Because this bill would change the definition of an existing crime, it would impose a state-mandated local program.

(3) Existing law requires persons engaged in certain businesses, including, among others, rendering, pet food processing, and operating a collection center, to obtain a license from the department. Existing law provides that those licenses are valid for a year from the date of issuance.

This bill, instead, would provide that those licenses shall expire on December 31 of each year.

(4) Existing law requires any person or entity who engages in the transportation of inedible kitchen grease, as defined, to be registered with the department. An applicant for registration as a transporter of inedible kitchen grease is required to include a registration fee of \$100, except for any renderer who registers.

This bill would also exempt a collection center that registers from this registration fee.

(5) Existing law, the California Organic Products Act of 2003, provides that persons engaged in the production or handling of raw agricultural products sold as organic or the processing or handling of processed food sold as organic shall register with the Secretary of Food and Agriculture. Under existing law the registration must include, among other things, a map showing the location and dimensions of the facility or farm where the products are produced. If the registrant has not had control of the property for 36 months, existing law requires that the registrant provide the land use history of the property for the last 36 months from the previous owners. If the registrant does not own the property, existing law requires the registrant to provide documentation from the owner granting permission for the parcel to be registered as organic.

This bill would provide that the registration requirement of providing a map would only apply to exempt producers and would define an exempt producer as a producer whose annual gross agricultural income from organic sales totals \$5,000 or less. This bill would provide that the above requirements regarding prior land use and permission from the owner would only apply to exempt producers or exempt handlers, and would define an exempt handler as a handler whose annual gross agricultural income from organic sales totals \$5,000 or less.

(6) Under existing law a producer required to register with the secretary is required to list all substances applied to the crop, soil, or irrigation water as part of the registration.

Under this bill only producers whose annual gross agricultural income from organic sales totals \$5,000 or less would be required to include this information in their registration.

(7) Existing law establishes a schedule of fees that the registrant is required to pay to the secretary based on the gross sales of the registrant.

This bill would allow the secretary to require the registrant to submit ~~their~~ *its* gross sales by commodity and acreage and to provide the exact dollar amount of sales of \$25,000,001 or more.

This bill would also authorize the secretary to adopt regulations that supersede the registration provisions applicable to persons engaged in organic production, processing, and handling to the extent reasonably necessary to provide an online system of registration.

(8) Existing law requires the secretary to establish the California Organic Products Advisory Committee to advise the secretary regarding his or her responsibilities under the act. Under existing law the committee is comprised of 15 members and allows the members to have alternates. Existing law provides that 6 members and their alternates must be producers, 2 processors, 2 consumer representatives, 2 technical representatives, one wholesale distributor, one environmental representative, and one retail representative. Existing law provides that alternates at large may be appointed as specified.

This bill would delete the provisions regarding the appointment of alternates at large.

(9) This bill would make other conforming *and technical* changes.

(10) *Existing law imposes, until January 1, 2011, a \$100 food safety fee on every person who is engaged in the manufacture, packing, or holding of processed food.*

This bill would extend that fee until January 1, 2016.

(11) The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

1 ~~recycling program must be certified by an ANSI-accredited~~

4 standards shall be maintained for three years and shall be subject
5 to audit by the director.

6 (b) Any ~~person~~ *registrant* who is required to establish or
7 participate in a recycling program pursuant to this section shall
8 provide to the director, at least annually, a document certifying
9 that this requirement has been met.

10 (c) (1) The director may adopt regulations to carry out the
11 purposes of this section. Upon a federal pesticide container
12 recycling program being adopted, the director may adopt
13 regulations to conform to the federal program.

14 (2) It is the intent of the Legislature in enacting this section that
15 any regulatory standards adopted by the department shall be at
16 least as stringent as those standards referred to in subdivision (a).

2 (4) A registration fee of one hundred dollars (\$100).

3 (5) A list of the names of the drivers employed by the transporter

22 amended to read:

23 46003. (a) The secretary shall establish an advisory committee,
24 which shall be known as the California Organic Products Advisory
25 Committee, for the purpose of advising the secretary with respect
26 to his or her responsibilities under this act and Article 7
27 (commencing with Section 110810) of Chapter 5 of Part 5 of
28 Division 104 of the Health and Safety Code.

29 (b) The advisory committee shall be comprised of 15 members.
30 Each member may have an alternate. Six members and their
31 alternates shall be producers, at least one of whom shall be a
32 producer of meat, fowl, fish, dairy products, or eggs. Two members
33 and their alternates shall be processors, one member and his or her
34 alternate shall be wholesale distributors, two members and their
35 alternates shall be consumer representatives, one member and his
36 or her alternate shall be environmental representatives, two
37 members and their alternates shall be technical representatives
38 with scientific credentials related to agricultural chemicals,

7 advisory committee. The consumer and environmental
8 representatives and their alternates shall not have a financial interest
9 in the direct sales or marketing of the organic product industry and
10 shall be members or employees of representatives of recognized
11 nonprofit organizations whose principal purpose is the protection
12 of consumer health or protection of the environment. The technical
13 representatives and their alternates shall not have a financial interest
14 in the production, handling, processing, or marketing of the organic
15 products industry. The technical representatives may be involved
16 in organic research or technical review providing they have no
17 financial benefit from results of the research project or technical
18 review.

19 (c) An alternate member shall serve at an advisory committee
20 meeting only in the absence of, and shall have the same powers
21 and duties as, the category whom he or she is representing as
22 alternate, except for duties and powers as an officer of the
23 committee. The number of alternates present who are not serving
24 in the capacity of a member shall not be considered in determining
25 a quorum.

26 (d) An alternate member may serve at an advisory committee
27 subcommittee meeting only in the absence of, and shall have the
28 same powers and duties as, the member whom he or she is
29 designated as alternate, except for duties and powers as a
30 subcommittee chairperson.

31 (e) The members of the advisory committee and their alternates
32 described in subdivision (b) shall be reimbursed for the reasonable
33 expenses actually incurred in the performance of their duties, as
34 determined by the advisory committee and approved by the
35 secretary.

36 (f) The secretary or his or her representative, *the* State Public
37 Health Officer; or his or her representative, and a county
38 agricultural commissioner may serve as ex officio members of the
39 advisory committee.

3 amended to read:

4 46004.1. Unless defined pursuant to the National Organic
5 Program (NOP), the following words and phrases, when used in
6 this act, shall have the following meanings:

7 (a) “Act” means this chapter. It also means the federal Organic
8 Foods Production Act of 1990 (7 U.S.C. Sec. 6501 et seq.) and
9 the regulations adopted pursuant to the federal Organic Foods
10 Production Act of 1990 (7 U.S.C. Sec. 6501 et seq.).

11 (b) “Categorical products” means categories of products of like
12 commodity such as apples, salad products, etc. and does not require
13 variety specific information.

14 (c) “Enforcement authority” means the governmental unit with
15 primary enforcement jurisdiction, as provided in Section 46008.

16 (d) “Exempt handler” means a handling operation that sells
17 agricultural products as “organic” but whose gross agricultural
18 income from organic sales totals five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or
19 less annually.

20 (e) “Exempt producer” means a production operation that sells
21 agricultural products as “organic” but whose gross agricultural
22 income from organic sales totals five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or
23 less annually.

24 (f) “Handle” means to sell, process, or package agricultural
25 products.

26 (g) “Handler” means any person engaged in the business of
27 handling agricultural products, but does not include final retailers
28 of agricultural products that do not process agricultural products.

29 (h) “Handling operation” means any operation or portion of an
30 operation, except final retailers of agricultural products that do not
31 process agricultural products that (1) receives or otherwise acquires
32 agricultural products, and (2) processes, packages, or stores
33 agricultural products.

34 (i) “NOP” means the National Organic Program established
35 pursuant to the federal Organic Foods Production Act of 1990 (7
36 U.S.C. Sec. 6501 et seq.) and the regulations adopted for
37 implementation.

38 (j) “Person” means any individual, firm, partnership, trust,
39 corporation, limited liability company, company, estate, public or
40 private institution, association, organization, group, city, county,

1 city and county, political subdivision of this state, other
2 governmental agency within the state, and any representative,

16 registration fee within 10 days of the date on which the fee is due

18 determined to be due plus interest at the rate of 1.5 percent per
19 month on the unpaid balance.

21 *SEC. 8.* Section 46013 of the Food and Agricultural Code is
22 amended to read:

23 46013. Any producer, handler, processor, or registered
24 certification organization subject to this chapter that does not pay
25 the fee within 10 days of the date on which the fee is due and
26 payable shall pay a penalty of 10 percent of the total amount
27 determined to be due plus interest at the rate of 1.5 percent per
28 month on the unpaid balance.

30 *SEC. 9.* Section 46013.1 of the Food and Agricultural Code is
31 amended to read:

32 46013.1. (a) Every person engaged in this state in the
33 production or handling of raw agricultural products sold as organic,
34 and retailers that are engaged in the production of products sold
35 as organic, and retailers that are engaged in the processing, as
36 defined by the NOP, of products sold as organic, shall register
37 with the agricultural commissioner in the county of principal
38 operation prior to the first sale of the product. All processors of
39 organic agriculturally derived products that are not required to be
40 registered as outlined in subdivision (b) must register with the

1 secretary. Each registrant must annually renew the registration
2 unless no longer engaged in the activities requiring the registration.
3 Each registrant shall provide a complete copy of its registration to
4 the county agricultural commissioner in any county in which the
5 registrant operates.

6 (b) Every person engaged in this state in the processing or
7 handling of processed products pursuant to Section 110460 of the

29 (B) When the exempt producer or exempt handler has not had
30 control of the property being registered for at least 36 months,
31 documentation shall be provided from previous owners or managers
32 that shows the 36-month land use history. When the exempt
33 producer or exempt handler is not the owner, documentation shall
34 be provided from the owner granting permission for the parcel to
35 be registered as organic by the exempt producer or exempt handler.

36 (3) Sufficient information, under penalty of perjury, to enable
37 the secretary or county agricultural commissioner to verify the
38 amount of the registration fee to be paid in accordance with this
39 act.

(4) The names of all certification organizations or governmental entities, if any, providing organic certification to them.

(5) In the case of exempt producers, for each field or management unit, a list of all substances applied to the crop, soil, growing medium, growing area, irrigation water or postharvest wash or rinse water, or seed, including the source of the substance, the brand name, if any, the rate of application, and the total amount applied in each calendar year, for at least the applicable time periods specified in this act.

(e) The registration form shall include a separate “public information sheet” or its equivalent that shall include:

(1) The name and address of the registrant.

(2) The nature of the registrant’s business, including the categorical products produced, handled, or processed that are sold as organic.

(3) The names of all certification organizations or governmental entities, if any, providing certification pursuant to the NOP and this act.

(f) A registration form shall be accompanied by payment of a nonrefundable registration fee by producers, handlers, and processors, which shall be based on gross sales by the registrant of product sold as organic in the calendar year that precedes the date of registration or, if no sales were made in the preceding year, then based on the expected sales during the ~~12-calendar~~ 12 calendar months following the date of registration. Unless specified elsewhere the fee is based according to the following schedule:

3 (1) Any person required to register pursuant to this section
4 whose registration fee would be less than seventy-five dollars (\$75)
5 shall pay an initial registration fee of seventy-five dollars (\$75).
6 Thereafter, the amount of the annual fee shall be as specified above
7 or, according to the applicable classification, as described in
8 paragraphs (2) to (9), inclusive.

9 (2) Any person selling a multi-ingredient product in which less
10 than 70 percent of the ingredients are organic shall pay a fee of
11 one hundred dollars (\$100) or one-half of the amount that would
12 be due based on the above chart, whichever is more.

13 (3) Producers that sell processed product shall pay fees based
14 on the value of raw product prior to being processed and the value
15 of any product sold as unprocessed.

16 (4) Any person that packs, repacks, labels, sorts, or otherwise
17 handles any organic product that is outside the jurisdiction of the
18 State Public Health Officer and that does not take title or manage
19 the sale of the product, but provides only handling services for
20 organic product, shall register and pay one hundred dollars (\$100)
21 per year.

22 (5) Commission merchants or brokers that do not take possession
23 or title of the product but arrange for the sale of the product shall
24 register and pay one hundred dollars (\$100) per year.

25 (6) A retail store engaged in the handling or processing of
26 organic products shall register and pay a fee of one hundred dollars
27 (\$100) for each store location that processes organic products
28 onsite.

29 (7) Any person that provides temporary storage or transportation
30 for organic product and does not handle the raw unpackaged
31 product does not have to register.

32 (8) Any person that hires any other person for custom packing
33 or labeling shall register and pay a fee based on the total sales of
34 product custom produced for them as outlined in the chart above.
35 In addition to the required registration information above the person
36 must disclose on the registration form the names of all companies
37 that pack and process for them.

38 (9) Any person required to register pursuant to this section that
39 fits the description of more than one of the persons described above
40 shall pay the greater of the multiple amounts.

1 (10) The secretary may require any producer, handler, processor,
2 or other organic registrant to provide the exact dollar amount of
3 gross sales of twenty-five million one dollars (\$25,000,001) or
4 more in lieu of the range specified in subdivision (f).

5 (11) The secretary may require any producer, handler, processor,
6 or other organic registrant to submit gross sales by commodity and
7 gross sales by acreage.

8 (g) The secretary may adopt regulations that supersede the terms
9 of this section to the extent reasonably necessary to provide an
10 online system of registration for those required to register pursuant
11 to this section.

13 *SEC. 10.* Section 46013.2 of the Food and Agricultural Code
14 is amended to read:

15 46013.2. (a) To the extent feasible, the secretary shall
16 coordinate the registration and fee collection procedures of this
17 section with similar licensing or registration procedures applicable
18 to registrants.

19 (b) The secretary or county agricultural commissioner shall
20 deny a registration submission that is incomplete or not in
21 compliance with this act.

22 (c) A registrant shall, within a reasonable time, notify the
23 secretary of any change in the information reported on the
24 registration form and shall pay any additional fee owed if that
25 change results in a higher fee owed than that previously paid.

26 (d) At the request of any person, the “public information sheet”
27 described in subdivision (e) of Section 46013.1 for any registrant
28 shall be made available for inspection and copying at the main
29 office of the department and each county agricultural
30 commissioner. Copies of the “public information sheet” shall also
31 be made available by mail, upon written request. The secretary or
32 county agricultural commissioner may charge a reasonable fee for
33 the cost of reproducing a “public information sheet.” Except as
34 provided in this subdivision, a registration form is exempt from
35 Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 6250) of Division 7 of
36 Title 1 of the Government Code.

37 (e) The secretary, in consultation with the California Organic
38 Products Advisory Committee, may suspend the registration
39 program set forth in this section if the secretary determines that

3 (f) A registration is considered legal and valid until revoked,
4 suspended, or until the expiration of the registration.

5 (g) The registration revocation process shall be in conjunction
6 with other provisions of this act. The secretary or county
7 agricultural commissioner's office may initiate the revocation
8 process for failure to comply with the NOP or this act. Any person
9 against whom the action is being taken shall have the opportunity
10 to appeal the action and be afforded the opportunity to be heard
11 in an administrative appeal. This appeal shall be administered by
12 either the state or county agricultural commissioner's office.

14 the expiration date, the account shall be considered closed and the
15 registration voided. A notification shall be sent to the registrant

26 is amended to read:

27 46014.1. (a) Any certification organization that certifies
28 product in this state sold as organic shall register with the secretary
29 and shall thereafter annually renew the registration, unless the
30 organization is no longer engaged in the activities requiring the
31 registration. Registration shall be on a form provided by the
32 secretary, shall include a copy of accreditation by the USDA or
33 proof of application if applicable.

34 (b) Each certification organization shall pay to the secretary an
35 annual registration fee of twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each client
36 they have certified in this state up to a maximum of two hundred
37 fifty dollars (\$250). Any registration submitted by a certification
38 organization; shall be made available to the public for inspection
39 and copying. The secretary may audit the organization's
40 certification procedures and records at any time, but any records

1 of the certification organization not otherwise required to be
2 disclosed shall be kept confidential by the secretary.

3 (c) The secretary and the county agricultural commissioners
4 under the supervision of the secretary shall, if requested by a
5 sufficient number of persons to cover the costs of the program in
6 a county as determined by the secretary, establish a certification
7 program. This program shall meet all of the requirements of this
8 act. In addition, this program shall meet all of the requirements of
9 the federal certification program, including federal accreditation.
10 The secretary shall establish a fee schedule for participants in this
11 program that covers all of the department's reasonable costs of the
12 program. A county agricultural commissioner that conducts a
13 voluntary certification program pursuant to this section shall
14 establish a fee schedule for participants in this program that covers
15 all of the county's reasonable costs of the program. The secretary
16 may not expend funds obtained from registration fees collected
17 under this chapter for the purposes of adopting or administering
18 this program. The certification fee authorized by this subdivision
19 is due and payable on January 1 or may be prorated before the
20 10th day of the month following the month in which the decision
21 to grant the certification is issued. Any person who does not pay
22 the amount that is due within the required period shall pay the
23 enforcement authority providing the certificate a penalty of 10
24 percent of the total amount determined to be due, plus interest at
25 the rate of 1.5 percent interest per month on the unpaid balance.

26 *SEC. 12. Section 110485 of the Health and Safety Code is*

28 110485. (a) Every person who is engaged in the manufacture,
29 packing, or holding of processed food in this state shall pay a food
30 safety fee of one hundred dollars (\$100) to the department in
31 addition to any fees paid pursuant to Section 110470.

32 (b) Revenue received pursuant to this section shall be deposited
33 in the Food Safety Fund created pursuant to Section 110050. A
34 penalty of 10 percent per month shall be added to any food safety
35 fee not paid when due.

36 (c) Upon appropriation, the food safety fees deposited in the
37 Food Safety Fund shall be used by the department to assist in
38 developing and implementing education and training programs
39 related to food safety. These programs shall be developed in
40 consultation with representatives of the food processing industry.

1 Implementation shall include education and training in the
2 prevention of microbial contamination.

3 (d) This section does not apply to companies exclusively
4 involved in flour milling, dried bean processing, or in the drying
5 or milling of rice, or to those individual registrants the director
6 determines should not be assessed because substantial economic
7 hardship would result to those registrants. For the purposes of this
8 subdivision, the substantial hardship exemption shall be extended
9 only to registrants whose wholesale gross annual income from the
10 registered business is twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) or less.

11 (e) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, ~~2011~~
12 2016, and as of that date is repealed, unless a later enacted statute,
13 that is enacted on or before January 1, ~~2011~~ 2016, deletes or
14 extends that date.

16 *SEC. 13.* No reimbursement is required by this act pursuant to
17 Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution because
18 the only costs that may be incurred by a local agency or school
19 district will be incurred because this act creates a new crime or
20 infraction, eliminates a crime or infraction, or changes the penalty
21 for a crime or infraction, within the meaning of Section 17556 of
22 the Government Code, or changes the definition of a crime within
23 the meaning of Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California
24 Constitution.
