Senate Joint Resolution No. 4—Relative to Alzheimer's disease.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SJR 4, as amended, Correa. Alzheimer's Silver Alert program.

This measure would urge the President and the Congress of the United States to act to establish a federally controlled Alzheimer's Silver Alert program to locate missing persons with dementia and establish a federal grant program to aid states in establishing local Silver Alert programs. Fiscal committee: no.

- WHEREAS. At least 5.2 million 5.200.000 Americans suffer 1 2 from Alzheimer's disease, a progressive and fatal brain disease that causes loss of memory and verbal, sensory, and other cognitive 3 4 functions: and 5 WHEREAS, Sixty percent of patients with Alzheimer's disease will wander away from home and only 4 percent of those patients 6 7 will be able to find their way back-unassisted home without 8 assistance; and
- 9 WHEREAS, Half of seniors and others with dementia who 10 wander away from home, on foot or in a car, sustain injury if *they*
- 11 are not found within 24 hours; and



1 WHEREAS, The senior population has been steadily growing

and the aging of the baby boomer generation will likely increasethe number of persons suffering from dementia, thereby increasing

4 the number of persons injured or killed while wandering; and

5 WHEREAS, A new type of missing persons program, know 6 *known* as Silver Alert, has been developed and adopted by several 7 states and has resulted in the safe return of a majority of persons 8 with demontia reported missing: and

8 with dementia reported missing; and

9 WHEREAS, Legislators from other states are discussing 10 proposals for Silver Alert programs for introduction in 2009; and

11 WHEREAS, A nationally coordinated program, similar to the 12 Amber Alert program for missing children, could promote best

12 Amber Alert program for missing children, could promote best 13 practices, based on ideas and experiences of existing states' Silver

Alert programs, and spread those best practices to other states,

resulting in a national program incorporating the media and law

16 enforcement; now, therefore, be it

17 Resolved by the Senate and the Assembly of the State of 18 California, jointly, That the Legislature urges the President and 19 the Congress of the United States to act to establish a federally controlled Alzheimer's Silver Alert program to locate missing 20 21 persons with dementia and establish a federal grant program to aid 22 states in establishing local Silver Alert programs; and be it further 23 Resolved, That the Secretary of the Senate transmit copies of 24 this resolution to the President and Vice President of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Majority 25 26 Leader of the Senate, and each Senator and Representative from 27 California in the Congress of the United States.
