Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 109—Relative to Rare Disease Day.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 109, as amended, Pan. Rare Disease Day.

This measure would proclaim February 29, 2012, as Rare Disease Day in California.

Fiscal committee: no.

- 1 WHEREAS, There are nearly 7,000 diseases and conditions
- 2 considered rare, each affecting fewer than 200,000 Americans;
- 3 and

1 WHEREAS, Of these 7,000 rare diseases, more than 80 percent
2 of them are considered ultra rare, affecting less than a few thousand
3 Americans; and

4 WHEREAS, While each of these diseases may affect small
5 numbers of people, rare diseases as a group affect almost 30 million
6 Americans; and

7 WHEREAS, Many rare diseases are serious and debilitating
8 conditions that have a significant impact on the lives of those
9 affected; and

10 WHEREAS, While approximately 360 orphan drugs and
11 biologics have been approved for the treatment of rare diseases
12 affecting between 11 and 14 million people according to the United
13 States Food and Drug Administration, that leaves well over 15
14 million Americans affected by rare diseases with no treatment
15 specific to their disease; and

16 WHEREAS, Besides dealing with their specific medical
17 problems, individuals and their families affected by rare diseases
18 struggle with obtaining an accurate and timely diagnosis, few, if
19 any, treatment options, and problems related to accessing or being
20 reimbursed for treatment; and

21 WHEREAS, While some rare diseases are relatively well known,
22 many others are not known at all by the public, making patients
23 and their families bear a large share of the burden for fundraising
24 and research; and

25 WHEREAS, Because nearly one in 10 Americans have a rare
26 disease, Californians are among those affected by those diseases;
27 and

28 WHEREAS, Research into rare diseases builds greater
29 understanding of the nature of disease and serves as a foundation
30 for innovation in the United States; and

31 WHEREAS, The National Organization for Rare Disorders
32 (NORD) is organizing a nationwide observance of Rare Disease
33 Day on February 29, 2012, on which patients, medical
34 professionals, researchers, government officials, and companies
35 developing treatments for rare diseases will join together to focus
36 attention on rare diseases as a public health issue; and

37 WHEREAS, The theme for Rare Disease Day is solidarity,
38 reaffirming the idea that people affected by rare diseases are “Rare
39 But Strong Together”; now, therefore, be it

1 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
2 *thereof concurring, That the Legislature proclaims February 29,*
3 2012, as Rare Disease Day in California; and be it further
4 *Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies*
5 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

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
