An act to repeal and add Section 2290.5 of the Business and Professions Code, to repeal and add Section 1374.13 of the Health and Safety Code, to repeal and add Section 10123.85 of the Insurance Code, and to amend Sections 14132.72 and 14132.725 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, relating to telehealth.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 415, as amended, Logue. Healing arts: telehealth.

Existing law provides for the licensure and regulation of various healing arts professions by various boards within the Department of Consumer Affairs. A violation of specified provisions is a crime. Existing law defines telemedicine, for the purpose of its regulation, to mean the practice of health care delivery, diagnosis, consultation, treatment, transfer of medical data, and education using interactive audio, video, or data communications. Existing law requires a health care practitioner, as defined, to obtain verbal and written informed consent from the patient or the patient's legal representative before telemedicine is delivered. Existing law also imposes various requirements with regard to the provision of telemedicine by health care service plans, health

insurers, or under the Medi-Cal program, including a prohibition on requiring face-to-face contact between a health care provider and a patient for services appropriately provided through telemedicine, subject to certain contracts or policies. Existing law provides that health care service plans and health insurers shall not be required to pay for consultations provided by telephone or facsimile machines. Existing law provides that a willful violation of the provisions governing health care service plans is a crime.

This bill would delete the provisions regarding telemedicine as described above, and would instead set forth provisions relating to telehealth, as defined, ~~and. This bill would require a health care provider, as defined, to, prior to the delivery health care via telehealth, verbally inform the patient that telehealth may be used and obtain verbal consent from the patient. This bill would provide that failure to comply with this provision constitutes unprofessional conduct. This bill would also set forth provisions~~ for the payment of telehealth services by health care service plans and health insurers. By changing the definition of a crime applicable to health care service plans, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Existing law prohibits a requirement of face-to-face contact between a health care provider and a patient under the Medi-Cal program for services appropriately provided through telemedicine, subject to reimbursement policies developed by the Medi-Cal program to compensate licensed health care providers who provide health care services, that are otherwise covered by the Medi-Cal program, through telemedicine.

This bill would, instead, prohibit a requirement of in-person contact between a health care provider and patient under the Medi-Cal program for any service otherwise covered by the Medi-Cal program when the service is provided by telehealth, as defined.

Existing law, until January 1, 2013, and to the extent that federal financial participation is available, authorizes, under the Medi-Cal program, teleophthalmology and teledermatology by store and forward, as defined.

This bill would delete the repeal of the above-described authorization.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. This act shall be known, and may be cited, as the
2 Telehealth Advancement Act of 2011.
- 3 SEC. 2. The Legislature finds and declares all of the following:
- 4 (a) Lack of primary care providers, specialty providers, and
5 transportation continue to be significant barriers to access to health
6 services in medically underserved rural and urban areas.
- 7 (b) Parts of California have difficulty attracting and retaining
8 health professionals, as well as supporting local health facilities
9 to provide a continuum of health care.
- 10 (c) Many health care providers in medically underserved areas
11 are isolated from mentors, colleagues, and the information
12 resources necessary to support them personally and professionally.
- 13 (d) It is the intent of the Legislature to create a parity of
14 telehealth with other health care delivery modes, to actively
15 promote telehealth as a tool to advance stakeholders' goals
16 regarding health status and health system improvement, and to
17 create opportunities and flexibility for telehealth to be used in new
18 models of care and system improvements.
- 19 (e) Telehealth is a mode of delivering health care services and
20 public health utilizing information and communication technologies
21 to enable the diagnosis, consultation, treatment, education, care
22 management, and self-management of patients at a distance from
23 health care providers.
- 24 (f) Telehealth is part of a multifaceted approach to address the
25 problem of inadequate provider distribution and the development
26 of health systems in medically underserved areas by improving
27 communication capabilities and providing convenient access to
28 up-to-date information, consultations, and other forms of support.
- 29 (g) The use of information and telecommunication technologies
30 to deliver health services has the potential to reduce costs, improve
31 quality, change the conditions of practice, and improve access to
32 health care, particularly in rural and other medically underserved
33 areas.
- 34 (h) Telehealth will assist in maintaining or improving the
35 physical and economic health of medically underserved

1 communities by keeping the source of medical care in the local
2 area, strengthening the health infrastructure, and preserving health
3 care-related jobs.

4 (i) Consumers of health care will benefit from telehealth in
5 many ways, including expanded access to providers, faster and
6 more convenient treatment, better continuity of care, reduction of
7 lost work time and travel costs, and the ability to remain with
8 support networks.

9 (j) It is the intent of the Legislature that the fundamental health
10 care provider-patient relationship cannot only be preserved, but
11 can also be augmented and enhanced, through the use of telehealth
12 as a tool to be integrated into practices.

13 (k) Without the assurance of payment and the resolution of legal
14 and policy barriers, the full potential of telehealth will not be
15 realized.

16 SEC. 3. Section 2290.5 of the Business and Professions Code
17 is repealed.

18 SEC. 4. Section 2290.5 is added to the Business and Professions
19 Code, to read:

20 2290.5. (a) For purposes of this division, the following
21 definitions shall apply:

22 (1) "Asynchronous store and forward" means the transmission
23 of a patient's medical information from an originating site to the
24 health care provider at a distant site without the presence of the
25 patient.

26 (2) "Distant site" means a site where a health care provider who
27 provides health care services is located while providing these
28 services via a telecommunications system.

29 (3) "Health care provider" means a person who is licensed under
30 this division.

31 (4) "Originating site" means a site where a patient is located at
32 the time health care services are provided via a telecommunications
33 system or where the asynchronous store and forward transfer
34 occurs.

35 (5) "Telehealth" means the mode of delivering health care
36 services and public health via information and communication
37 technologies to facilitate the diagnosis, consultation, treatment,
38 education, care management, and self-management of a patient's
39 health care while the patient is at the originating site and the health
40 care provider is at a distant site. Telehealth facilitates patient

1 self-management and caregiver support for patients and includes
2 synchronous interactions and asynchronous store and forward
3 transfers.

5 ~~practice of any health care provider.~~

6 *(b) Prior to the delivery of health care via telehealth, the health*
7 *care provider shall verbally inform the patient that telehealth may*
8 *be used and obtain verbal consent from the patient for this use.*
9 *The verbal consent shall be documented in the patient's medical*
10 *record.*

11 *(c) The failure of a health care provider to comply with this*
12 *section shall constitute unprofessional conduct. Section 2314 shall*
13 *not apply to this section.*

14 *(d) This section shall not be construed to alter the scope of*
15 *practice of any health care provider or authorize the delivery of*
16 *health care services in a setting, or in a manner, not otherwise*
17 *authorized by law.*

19 *(e) All laws regarding the confidentiality of health care*
20 *information and a patient's rights to his or her medical information*
21 *shall apply to telehealth interactions.*

23 repealed.

24 SEC. 6. Section 1374.13 is added to the Health and Safety
25 Code, to read:

26 1374.13. (a) For the purposes of this section, the definitions
27 in subdivision (a) of Section 2290.5 of the Business and Professions
28 Code shall apply.

29 (b) It is the intent of the Legislature to recognize the practice
30 of telehealth as a legitimate means by which an individual may
31 receive health care services from a health care provider without
32 in-person contact with the health care provider.

33 (c) No health care service plan shall require that in-person
34 contact occur between a health care provider and a patient before
35 payment is made for the covered services appropriately provided
36 through telehealth, and every health care service plan shall adopt
37 payment policies consistent with this section to compensate health
38 care providers who provide covered health care services through
39 telehealth, subject to the terms and conditions of the contract

1 entered into between the enrollee or subscriber and the health care
2 service plan.

25 in-person contact with the health care provider.

27 between a health care provider and a patient before payment is
28 made for the services appropriately provided through telehealth,
29 and every health insurer shall adopt payment policies consistent

6 (b) It is the intent of the Legislature to recognize the practice
7 of telehealth as a legitimate means by which an individual may
8 receive health care services from a health care provider without
9 in-person contact with the provider.

10 (c) In-person contact between a health care provider and a
11 patient shall not be required under the Medi-Cal program for
12 services appropriately provided through telehealth.

13 (d) The department shall not require a health care provider to
14 document a barrier to an in-person visit for Medi-Cal coverage of
15 services provided via telehealth.

16 (e) ~~The~~ *For the purposes of payment for covered treatment or*
17 *services provided through telehealth, the* department shall not limit
18 the type of setting where services are provided for the patient or

29 SEC. 10. Section 14132.725 of the Welfare and Institutions
30 Code is amended to read:

31 14132.725. (a) Commencing July 1, 2006, to the extent that
32 federal financial participation is available, face-to-face contact
33 between a health care provider and a patient shall not be required
34 under the Medi-Cal program for teleophthalmology and
35 teledermatology by store and forward. Services appropriately
36 provided through the store and forward process are subject to
37 billing and reimbursement policies developed by the department.

38 (b) For purposes of this section, “teleophthalmology and
39 teledermatology by store and forward” means an asynchronous
40 transmission of medical information to be reviewed at a later time

1 by a physician at a distant site who is trained in ophthalmology or
 2 dermatology or, for teleophthalmology, by an optometrist who is
 3 licensed pursuant to Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 3000)
 4 of Division 2 of the Business and Professions Code, where the
 5 physician or optometrist at the distant site reviews the medical
 6 information without the patient being present in real time. A patient
 7 receiving teleophthalmology or teledermatology by store and
 8 forward shall be notified of the right to receive interactive
 9 communication with the distant specialist physician or optometrist,
 10 and shall receive an interactive communication with the distant
 11 specialist physician or optometrist, upon request. If requested,
 12 communication with the distant specialist physician or optometrist
 13 may occur either at the time of the consultation, or within 30 days
 14 of the patient’s notification of the results of the consultation. If the
 15 reviewing optometrist identifies a disease or condition requiring
 16 consultation or referral pursuant to Section 3041 of the Business
 17 and Professions Code, that consultation or referral shall be with
 18 an ophthalmologist or other appropriate physician and surgeon, as
 19 required.

20 (c) Notwithstanding Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section
 21 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code,
 22 the department may implement, interpret, and make specific this
 23 section by means of all-county letters, provider bulletins, and
 24 similar instructions.

25 (d) On or before January 1, 2008, the department shall report
 26 to the Legislature the number and type of services provided, and
 27 the payments made related to the application of store and forward
 28 telemedicine as provided, under this section as a Medi-Cal benefit.

29 SEC. 11. No reimbursement is required by this act pursuant to
 30 Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution because
 31 the only costs that may be incurred by a local agency or school
 32 district will be incurred because this act creates a new crime or
 33 infraction, eliminates a crime or infraction, or changes the penalty
 34 for a crime or infraction, within the meaning of Section 17556 of
 35 the Government Code, or changes the definition of a crime within
 36 the meaning of Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California
 37 Constitution.

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
