An act to add Section 69959 to, and to repeal Sections 69957 and 69958 of, the Government Code, relating to courts.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 803, as introduced, Wagner. Electronic court reporting.

Existing law authorizes a court to use electronic recording equipment in a limited civil case, a misdemeanor or infraction case, or for the internal purpose of monitoring judicial officer performance. Existing law requires a court to obtain advance approval from the Judicial Council prior to purchasing equipment. Existing law also requires each superior court to report semiannually to the Judicial Council, and the Judicial Council to report semiannually to the Legislature, regarding all purchases and leases of electronic recording equipment that will be used to record superior court proceedings.

This bill would instead require the Judicial Council, by July 1, 2012, to implement electronic court reporting in 20% of all superior court courtrooms and to implement electronic reporting in at least an additional 20% of all superior court courtrooms, annually thereafter. This bill would also require the Judicial Council to report to the Governor and the Legislature on the efforts undertaken to implement electronic court reporting, as provided, by January 1, 2014. The provisions of the bill would not apply to felony cases.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

3 ~~69957. (a) If an official reporter or an official reporter pro~~
4 ~~tempore is unavailable to report an action or proceeding in a court,~~
5 ~~subject to the availability of approved equipment and equipment~~
6 ~~monitors, the court may order that, in a limited civil case, or a~~

22 ~~(b) Notwithstanding subdivision (a), a court may use electronic~~
23 ~~recording equipment for the internal personnel purpose of~~

26 ~~and temporary judges while proceedings are conducted in the~~

4 ~~69958. Each superior court shall report to the Judicial Council~~
5 ~~on or before October 1, 2004, and semiannually thereafter, and~~

16 SEC. 3. Section 69959 is added to the Government Code, to
17 read:

18 69959. (a) Notwithstanding any other law, the Judicial Council
19 shall, by July 1, 2012, implement electronic court reporting in 20
20 percent of all superior court courtrooms not currently utilizing
21 electronic recording. The Judicial Council shall, annually thereafter,
22 phase in electronic recording in at least an additional 20 percent
23 of the total number of superior court courtrooms. The Judicial
24 Council may implement electronic recording in more courtrooms
25 if it will result in additional savings.

26 (b) The Judicial Council, shall, by January 1, 2014, report to
27 the Governor and the Legislature on the efforts undertaken to
28 implement electronic court reporting, including, but not limited
29 to, all of the following:

30 (1) The costs incurred to implement electronic recording.

31 (2) The superior courts and case types affected by the first year
32 of implementation.

33 (3) The savings achieved in the 2012–13 and 2013–14 fiscal
34 years through the implementation of electronic recording.

35 (4) Future implementation plans and the superior courts or case
36 types to be phased in during future fiscal years.

37 (c) References to “court reporters” and “reporter’s transcript”
38 throughout existing law, may include, where appropriate, electronic
39 court recordings for those courts that have partially or fully
40 implemented electronic recording.

- 1 (d) This section does not apply to felony cases.

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
