An act to amend Sections 84305.5, 84504, and 84505 of, to add Sections 84506.1, 84506.2, and 84506.3 to, to repeal Sections 84502, 84503, and 84506.5 of, and to repeal and add Sections 84501, 84506, 84507, and 84508 of, the Government Code, relating to the Political Reform Act of 1974, and ~~declaring the urgency thereof~~ *calling a special election to be consolidated with the November 4, 2014, statewide general election*, to take effect immediately *as an act calling an election*.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1648, as amended, Brownley. Political Reform Act of 1974: advertisements: disclosure.

The Political Reform Act of 1974 regulates mass mailings, known as slate mailers, that support or oppose multiple candidates or ballot measures for an election. The act requires that each slate mailer identify the slate mailer organization or committee primarily formed to support or oppose one or more ballot measures that is sending the slate mailer, and to contain other specified information in specified formatting. The act requires that each candidate and each ballot measure that has paid to appear in the slate mailer be designated by an asterisk.

This bill would instead require that a candidate or ballot measure appearing in the slate mailer be designated by an asterisk if the slate mailer organization or committee primarily formed to support or oppose one or more ballot measures that is sending the slate mailer has received payment to include the candidate or ballot measure in the slate mailer. The bill would also recast the language of the prescribed notice to voters that must be included on a slate mailer.

The act also regulates advertisements, which are defined as any general or public advertisement that is authorized and paid for by a person or committee for the purpose supporting or opposing a candidate for elective office or a ballot measure or ballot measures. The act places certain disclosure requirements on advertisements for or against any ballot measure, including that the advertisement disclose any person who has made cumulative contributions of \$50,000 or more, as prescribed. The act places more specific disclosure requirements on broadcast or mass mailing advertisements that are paid for by independent expenditures that support or oppose a candidate or ballot measure.

This bill would repeal provisions relating to disclosures for advertisements paid for by an independent expenditure and required disclosures of persons who have made cumulative contributions of \$50,000 or more. This bill would, instead, impose specified disclosure requirements on radio, television, and video advertisements, and certain mass mailing and print advertisements that support or oppose a candidate or ballot measure or solicit contributions in support of those purposes. The bill would require radio, television, and video advertisements that are authorized by a candidate or agent of the candidate to include a statement in which the candidate identifies himself or herself and states

that he or she approves the message, as specified. The bill would require radio, television, video, and certain mass mailings and print advertisements that are not authorized by a candidate or an agent of the candidate to disclose, in a prescribed format, the 3 largest identifiable contributors, as defined, of the committee that paid for the advertisement. The bill would require mass mailings or print advertisements that are paid for by certain persons who are not committees to disclose the name of that person as the funder of the mass mailing or print advertisement. The bill would also require that certain committees establish and maintain a committee disclosure Internet Web site, as defined, which discloses the top 10 identifiable contributors and provides a link to either the Internet Web site maintained by the Secretary of State for campaign finance disclosures of the committee, or a page on the committee disclosure Internet Web site that discloses all identifiable contributors to that committee, as specified. The bill would require these advertisements to identify the address for the committee disclosure Internet Web site.

Existing law makes a knowing or willful violation of the Political Reform Act of 1974 a misdemeanor and subjects offenders to criminal penalties.

This bill would impose a state-mandated local program by creating additional crimes.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

~~The Political Reform Act of 1974, an initiative measure, provides that the Legislature may amend the act to further the act's purposes upon a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of each house and compliance with specified procedural requirements.~~

~~This bill would declare that it furthers the purposes of the act.~~

~~This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as an urgency statute.~~

The Political Reform Act of 1974, an initiative measure, provides that the act may be amended by a statute that becomes effective upon approval of the voters.

This measure would call a special statewide election to be consolidated with the statewide general election scheduled for November 4, 2014. It would provide for the submission to the voters of the

provisions of this bill amending the Political Reform Act of 1974, as summarized above, at that election.

This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as an act calling an election.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 84305.5 of the Government Code is
2 amended to read:

3 84305.5. (a) A slate mailer organization or committee primarily
4 formed to support or oppose one or more ballot measures shall not
5 send a slate mailer unless the slate mailer complies with all of the
6 following:

7 (1) The name, street address, and city of the slate mailer
8 organization or committee primarily formed to support or oppose
9 one or more ballot measures are shown on the outside of each piece
10 of slate mail and on at least one of the inserts included with each
11 piece of slate mail in no less than 8-point roman type, which shall
12 be in a color or print that contrasts with the background so as to
13 be easily legible. A post office box may be stated in lieu of a street
14 address if the street address of the slate mailer organization or the
15 committee primarily formed to support or oppose one or more
16 ballot measures is a matter of public record with the Secretary of
17 State’s Political Reform Division.

18 (2) At the top or bottom of the front side or surface of at least
19 one insert, or at the top or bottom of one side or surface of a
20 postcard or other self-mailer, there is a notice in at least 8-point
21 roman boldface type, which shall be in a color or print that
22 contrasts with the background so as to be easily legible, and in a
23 printed or drawn box and set apart from any other printed matter.

(3) (A) Each candidate and each ballot measure for which the slate mailer organization or committee primarily formed to support or oppose one or more ballot measures has received payment to include the candidate or ballot measure in the slate mailer is designated by an *. A candidate or ballot measure for which the slate mailer organization or committee primarily formed to support or oppose one or more ballot measures has not received payment to include the candidate or ballot measure in the slate mailer shall not be designated by an *.

(B) The * required by this paragraph shall be of the same type size, type style, color or contrast, and legibility as is used for the name of the candidate, or the ballot measure name or number and position advocated, to which the * designation applies, except that in no case shall the * be required to be larger than 10-point boldface type. The designation shall immediately follow the name of the candidate, or the name or number and position advocated on the ballot measure, where the designation appears in the slate of candidates and measures. If there is no slate listing, the designation shall appear at least once in at least 8-point boldface type, immediately following the name of the candidate, or the name or number and position advocated on the ballot measure.

(4) The name of a candidate appearing in the slate mailer who is a member of a political party differing from the political party that the mailer appears by representation or indicia to represent is accompanied, immediately below the name, by the party designation of the candidate, in no less than 9-point roman type,

1 which shall be in a color or print that contrasts with the background
2 so as to be easily legible. The designation shall not be required in
3 the case of candidates for nonpartisan office.

4 (b) The name, street address, and city of the slate mailer
5 organization or committee primarily formed to support or oppose
6 one or more ballot measures, as required by paragraph (1) of
7 subdivision (a), and the notice required by paragraph (2) of
8 subdivision (a) may appear on the same side or surface of an insert
9 in the slate mailer.

10 SEC. 2. Section 84501 of the Government Code is repealed.

11 SEC. 3. Section 84501 is added to the Government Code, to
12 read:

13 84501. For purposes of this article, the following terms have
14 the following meanings:

15 (a) (1) "Advertisement" means any general or public
16 advertisement which is authorized and paid for by a person or
17 committee for the purpose of supporting or opposing a candidate
18 for elective office or a ballot measure or ballot measures.

19 (2) "Advertisement" does not include a communication from
20 an organization other than a political party to its members, a
21 campaign button smaller than 10 inches in diameter, a bumper
22 sticker smaller than 60 square inches, or other advertisement as
23 determined by regulations of the Commission.

24 (b) "Committee disclosure Internet Web site" means the Internet
25 Web site for a committee identifying the top identifiable
26 contributors to that committee, as described in Section 84506.3.

27 (c) "Cumulative contributions" means the cumulative amount
28 of contributions received by a committee beginning 18 months
29 prior to the date the committee made its first expenditure to qualify,
30 support, or oppose a candidate for elective office or a ballot
31 measure or ballot measures and ending seven days before the
32 advertisement is sent to the printer or broadcast station or uploaded
33 to the Internet.

34 (d) "Identifiable contributor" means a person or committee that
35 has made cumulative contributions of at least ten thousand dollars
36 (\$10,000) to a committee.

37 SEC. 4. Section 84502 of the Government Code is repealed.

38 SEC. 5. Section 84503 of the Government Code is repealed.

39 SEC. 6. Section 84504 of the Government Code is amended
40 to read:

1 84504. (a) Any committee that supports or opposes one or
2 more ballot measures shall name and identify itself using a name
3 or phrase that clearly identifies the economic or other special
4 interest of its major donors of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or
5 more in any reference to the committee required by law, including,
6 but not limited, to its statement of organization filed pursuant to
7 Section 84101.

8 (b) If the major donors of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or
9 more share a common employer, the identity of the employer shall
10 also be disclosed.

11 (c) Any committee which supports or opposes a ballot measure
12 shall print or broadcast its name as provided in this section as part
13 of any advertisement or other paid public statement, unless the
14 advertisement is required to include a disclosure pursuant to any
15 other section of this article.

16 (d) If candidates or their controlled committees, as a group or
17 individually, meet the contribution thresholds for a person, they
18 shall be identified by the controlling candidate's name.

19 SEC. 7. Section 84505 of the Government Code is amended
20 to read:

21 84505. In addition to the requirements of Sections 84504,
22 84506, 84506.1, 84506.2, and 84506.3, the committee placing the
23 advertisement or persons acting in concert with that committee
24 shall be prohibited from creating or using a noncandidate-controlled
25 committee or a nonsponsored committee to avoid, or that results
26 in the avoidance of, the disclosure of any individual, industry,
27 business entity, controlled committee, or sponsored committee as
28 a major funding source.

29 SEC. 8. Section 84506 of the Government Code is repealed.

30 SEC. 9. Section 84506 is added to the Government Code, to
31 read:

32 84506. (a) A radio advertisement that supports or opposes a
33 candidate or ballot measure or solicits contributions in support of
34 that purpose shall, if the advertisement is authorized by a candidate
35 or an agent of the candidate, include an audio statement in which
36 the candidate identifies himself or herself and states that the
37 candidate has approved the message.

38 (b) A radio advertisement that supports or opposes a candidate
39 or ballot measure or solicits contributions in support of that purpose
40 shall, if the advertisement is not authorized by a candidate or an

1 agent of the candidate, include at the end of the advertisement a
 2 disclosure read in a clearly spoken manner in a pitch and tone
 3 substantially similar to the rest of the advertisement that reads as
 4 follows: “Top funders of this ad are [state names in descending
 5 order of identifiable contributors who made the three largest
 6 cumulative contributions to the committee that paid for the
 7 advertisement]. Full funding details at [state Internet Web site
 8 address of the committee disclosure Internet Web site].”

9 (c) If there are fewer than three identifiable contributors, the
 10 disclosure shall be adjusted accordingly to disclose the qualifying
 11 identifiable contributors, if any. If the committee does not have
 12 any identifiable contributors, but the committee has received
 13 cumulative contributions totaling at least ten thousand dollars
 14 (\$10,000), the disclosure shall be adjusted to include the name of
 15 the committee in the place of the names of identifiable contributors.

16 SEC. 10. Section 84506.1 is added to the Government Code,
 17 to read:

18 84506.1. (a) A television or video advertisement that supports
 19 or opposes a candidate or ballot measure or solicits contributions
 20 in support of that purpose shall, if the advertisement is authorized
 21 by a candidate or an agent of the candidate, include a statement in
 22 which the candidate identifies himself or herself and states that
 23 the candidate has approved the message. The candidate statement
 24 shall be made using an unobscured, full-screen video of the
 25 candidate making the statement, or by using an unobscured,
 26 full-screen, and clearly identifiable photographic image of the
 27 candidate that is displayed during an audio voiceover of the
 28 candidate reading the statement.

29 (b) A television or video advertisement that supports or opposes
 30 a candidate or ballot measure or solicits contributions in support
 31 of that purpose shall, if the advertisement is not authorized by a
 32 candidate or an agent of the candidate, include all of the following
 33 at the end of the advertisement:

34 (1) A full-screen without audio on a black background for a
 35 minimum of three seconds that is dedicated to the disclosure
 36 described in this subdivision.

37 (2) The text “Top Funders for This Ad” located at the top of the
 38 television or video display screen and centered horizontally. The
 39 text shall be white in color and the font size shall be at least 5
 40 percent of the height of the television or video display screen.

1 (3) Immediately below the text described in paragraph (2), the
2 logos, if any, as they appear on the Internet Web site homepage
3 of the identifiable contributor, for the identifiable contributors who
4 made the three largest cumulative contributions to the committee
5 that paid for the advertisement. Each logo shall occupy at least 15
6 percent of the width or height of the television or video display
7 screen and the logos shall be displayed from left to right in
8 descending order beginning with the largest identifiable contributor.

9 (4) Immediately below the logos, if any, described in paragraph
10 (3), or beneath the text described in paragraph (2) if no identifiable
11 contributor has a logo, the identifiable contributors who have made
12 the three largest cumulative contributions to the committee that
13 paid for the advertisement. The three identifiable contributors shall
14 each be disclosed on a separate vertical line, in descending order,
15 beginning with the identifiable contributor who made the largest
16 cumulative contribution on the first line. The name of each of the
17 three identifiable contributors shall be centered horizontally. The
18 text shall be white in color and the font size shall be at least 5
19 percent of the height of the television or video display screen.

20 (5) The text “Full Funding Details At [insert Internet Web site
21 address of the committee disclosure Internet Web site].” The text
22 shall be white in color and the font size shall be equivalent to 4
23 percent of the height of the television or video display screen. The
24 text shall be located in a position that is vertically 4 percent above
25 the bottom of the television or video display screen.

26 (6) If there are fewer than three identifiable contributors, the
27 disclosure shall be adjusted accordingly to disclose only those that
28 qualify as identifiable contributors, if any. If the committee does
29 not have any identifiable contributors, but the committee has
30 received cumulative contributions totaling at least ten thousand
31 dollars (\$10,000), the disclosure shall be adjusted to include the
32 name of the committee in the place of the names of identifiable
33 contributors.

34 SEC. 11. Section 84506.2 is added to the Government Code,
35 to read:

36 84506.2. Except for slate mailers or advertisements that are
37 authorized by a candidate or an agent of the candidate, any mass
38 mailing or print advertisement that supports or opposes a candidate
39 or ballot measure or solicits contributions in support of that purpose
40 and that is paid for by a committee, or by any person who is not a

1 committee and who spends more than one thousand dollars
2 (\$1,000) on mass mailing or print advertising cumulatively in the
3 period beginning 18 months prior to the date the person made his
4 or her first expenditure to qualify, support, or oppose the candidate
5 for elective office or the ballot measure and ending seven days
6 before the mass mailing or print advertisement is sent to the printer,
7 shall include a disclosure area on the largest page of the mass
8 mailing or print advertisement that meets all of the following
9 criteria:

10 (a) The disclosure area shall be set apart from the rest of the
11 page on which it is located by a line framing the disclosure area
12 in the shape of a square or rectangle and the line shall be a color
13 that is darker than the background color of the remainder of the
14 disclosure area. The disclosure area within the border line shall
15 have a solid background color that establishes a contrast to the
16 color of the disclosure text that is equivalent to or greater than the
17 text and background color contrast in the other areas of the mass
18 mailing or print advertisement.

19 (b) For purposes of a mass mailing or print advertisement paid
20 for by a committee, the disclosure shall include the following:

21 (1) The text “Top Funders of This Ad” shall be located at the
22 top of the disclosure area and centered horizontally in the disclosure
23 area. The text shall be in a font size of at least 14-point for pages
24 smaller than 8.5 inches by 11 inches and at least 16-point for pages
25 that are equal to, or larger than, 8.5 inches by 11 inches.

26 (2) Immediately below the text described in paragraph (1) shall
27 be printed the logos, if any, as they appear on the Internet Web
28 site homepage of the identifiable contributor, for the identifiable
29 contributors who made the three largest cumulative contributions
30 to the committee. Each logo shall occupy at least 8 percent of the
31 width or height of the page on which the disclosure area is located
32 and the logos shall be displayed from left to right in descending
33 order beginning with the largest identifiable contributor.

34 (3) Immediately below the logos, if any, described in paragraph
35 (2), or beneath the text described in paragraph (1) if no identifiable
36 contributor has a logo, shall be identified by name the identifiable
37 contributors who have made the three largest cumulative
38 contributions to the committee that paid for the mass mailing or
39 print advertisement. The three identifiable contributors shall each
40 be disclosed on a separate vertical line, in descending order,

1 beginning with the identifiable contributor who made the largest
2 cumulative contribution on the first line. The name of each of the
3 three identifiable contributors shall be centered horizontally. The
4 text shall identify the identifiable contributor in a font size of at
5 least 10-point for pages smaller than 8.5 inches by 11 inches and
6 at least 12-point for pages that are equal to, or larger than, 8.5
7 inches by 11 inches.

8 (4) The text “Full Funding Details At [insert Internet Web site
9 address of the committee disclosure Internet Web site].” The text
10 shall be located at the bottom of the disclosure area and shall be
11 in 10-point font size for pages smaller than 8.5 inches by 11 inches
12 and at least 12-point font size for pages that are equal to, or larger
13 than, 8.5 inches by 11 inches.

14 (5) If there are fewer than three identifiable contributors, the
15 disclosure shall be adjusted accordingly to disclose the qualifying
16 identifiable contributors, if any. If the committee does not have
17 any identifiable contributors, but the committee has received
18 cumulative contributions totaling at least ten thousand dollars
19 (\$10,000), the disclosure shall be adjusted to include the name of
20 the committee in the place of the names of identifiable contributors.

21 (c) For purposes of a mass mailing or print advertisement paid
22 for by a person who is not a committee and who spends more than
23 one thousand dollars (\$1,000) on mass mailings or print
24 advertisements, as described in this section, the disclosure shall
25 include the text “This advertisement funded by [insert name of the
26 person who paid for the mass mailing or print advertisement].”
27 The text shall be centered within the disclosure area and shall be
28 in a font size of at least 14-point for pages smaller than 8.5 inches
29 by 11 inches and at least 16-point for pages that are equal to, or
30 larger than, 8.5 inches by 11 inches. The person shall not be
31 required to create or maintain a disclosure Internet Web site
32 described in Section 85406.3.

33 SEC. 12. Section 84506.3 is added to the Government Code,
34 to read:

35 84506.3. Except for a committee that is controlled by a
36 candidate, a committee that pays for an advertisement described
37 in this article shall establish and maintain a committee disclosure
38 Internet Web site. If the committee has an Internet Web site
39 homepage, that Internet Web site may also serve as the committee
40 disclosure Internet Web site. The homepage of the committee

1 disclosure Internet Web site and any other Internet Web sites
2 maintained by the committee shall include a disclosure statement
3 area for the purpose of making a contribution disclosure statement
4 that includes all of the following:

5 (a) The disclosure statement area shall be at least 250 pixels
6 wide. The disclosure statement area shall have a white background
7 and a border that is dark in color.

8 (b) A title that reads “Top Funders of This Committee.” The
9 text shall be black in color and shall be at least 10-point font size.

10 (c) Immediately below the text described in subdivision (b), a
11 list of the identifiable contributors who have made the 10 largest
12 cumulative contributions to the committee. Each of the 10
13 identifiable contributors shall be disclosed on a separate vertical
14 line, in descending order, beginning with the identifiable
15 contributor who made the largest cumulative contribution on the
16 first line. The text shall be black in color and shall be at least
17 9-point font size.

18 (d) Immediately below the text described in subdivision (c), the
19 logos, if any, as they appear on the Internet Web site homepage
20 of the identifiable contributor, for the identifiable contributors who
21 made the 10 largest cumulative contributions to the committee.
22 Each logo shall occupy at least 75 horizontal or vertical pixels and
23 shall be displayed from left to right in descending order beginning
24 with the largest identifiable contributor.

25 (e) Either of the following:

26 (1) A link to the Internet Web site maintained by the Secretary
27 of State that contains campaign finance disclosures made by the
28 committee pursuant to this title for the current election cycle. The
29 link shall be labeled “Full funding info at Secretary of State’s
30 Internet Web site.” The link shall be a standard hyperlink that is
31 displayed as blue underlined text in Arial equivalent font in at least
32 9-point font size.

33 (2) (A) A link to another page on the committee disclosure
34 Internet Web site that lists all of the committee’s identifiable
35 contributors. The link shall be labeled “More funding info” and
36 shall be a standard hyperlink that is displayed as blue underlined
37 text in Arial equivalent font in at least 9-point font size.

38 (B) The linked page on the committee disclosure Internet Web
39 site shall have a title that reads “\$10,000 Funders of this
40 Committee.” The linked page shall disclose each identifiable

1 contributor of the committee on a separate vertical line, in
2 descending order, beginning with the identifiable contributor who
3 made the largest aggregate contribution on the first line. Each line
4 shall identify the name of the identifiable contributor and the
5 amount of that contributor's aggregate contributions received by
6 the committee since its organization, current within seven days.

7 (f) If there are fewer than 10 identifiable contributors, the
8 disclosure shall be adjusted accordingly to disclose the qualifying
9 identifiable contributors, if any. If the committee does not have
10 any identifiable contributors, but the committee has received
11 cumulative contributions totaling at least ten thousand dollars
12 (\$10,000), the disclosure shall be adjusted to include the name of
13 the committee in the place of the names of identifiable contributors.

14 SEC. 13. Section 84506.5 of the Government Code is repealed.

15 SEC. 14. Section 84507 of the Government Code is repealed.

16 SEC. 15. Section 84507 is added to the Government Code, to
17 read:

18 84507. For purposes of any disclosure required by Sections
19 84506 to 84506.3, inclusive, for advertisements that are not
20 authorized by a candidate or an agent of the candidate, the
21 following shall also apply in the event that an identifiable
22 contributor is a person who is an individual:

23 (a) If the committee receiving the contribution is supporting or
24 opposing a candidate, then the disclosure shall include the
25 occupation and employer of the identifiable contributor in addition
26 to the contributor's name.

27 (b) If the committee receiving the contribution is supporting or
28 opposing a ballot measure, and the passage or defeat of the ballot
29 measure directly benefits or harms the employer of the identifiable
30 contributor, then the disclosure shall include the occupation and
31 employer of the identifiable contributor in addition to the
32 contributor's name. However, if an employer of an identifiable
33 contributor is also an identifiable contributor of that committee,
34 then the contributions of the employees shall, instead, be deemed
35 to be contributions by the employer for purposes of determining
36 the total cumulative contribution made by the employer in order
37 to determine which identifiable contributors shall be disclosed on
38 an advertisement pursuant to this article.

39 (c) If the committee receiving the contribution is supporting or
