An act to amend ~~Section 65080 of the Government Code, and to amend Section 75121 of the Public Resources Code, relating to planning.~~

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1179, as amended, Bocanegra. ~~Regional transportation plan: sustainable communities strategy: schoolsites. *Strategic Growth Council.*~~

~~Existing law requires certain transportation planning activities by designated regional transportation planning agencies, including development of a regional transportation plan. Certain of these agencies are designated by federal law as metropolitan planning organizations. Existing law requires metropolitan planning organizations to adopt a sustainable communities strategy, subject to specified requirements, as part of a regional transportation plan, which is to be designed to achieve certain targets established by the State Air Resources Board for the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks in the region.~~

~~This bill would additionally require the sustainable communities strategy to identify, in consultation with each local educational agency in the region, how the sustainable communities strategy may impact school enrollments and capacities and the need for new schoolsites or expansion or modernization of existing schoolsites, as specified. By~~

~~imposing additional requirements on local agencies, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program.~~

Existing law creates the Strategic Growth Council, consisting of specified state officers and a public member appointed by the Governor, with specified duties relating to coordination of actions of state agencies relative to improvement of air and water quality, natural resource protection, transportation, and various other matters.

This bill would add the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his or her designee to the Strategic Growth Council.

~~The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.~~

~~This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to these statutory provisions.~~

1 SECTION 1. Section 75121 of the Public Resources Code, as
2 amended by Section 6 of Chapter 623 of the Statutes of 2013, is

4 75121. (a) The Strategic Growth Council is hereby established
5 in state government and it shall consist of the Director of State
6 Planning and Research, the Secretary of the Natural Resources
7 Agency, the Secretary for Environmental Protection, the Secretary
8 of Transportation, the Secretary of California Health and Human
9 Services, the Secretary of Business, Consumer Services, and
10 Housing, the Secretary of Food and Agriculture, *the Superintendent*
11 *of Public Instruction or his or her designee*, and one member of
12 the public to be appointed by the Governor. The public member
13 shall have a background in land use planning, local government,
14 resource protection and management, or community development
15 or revitalization.

5 ~~transportation, highway, railroad, maritime, bicycle, pedestrian,~~

7 ~~shall be action-oriented and pragmatic, considering both the~~

24 ~~quantify a set of indicators including, but not limited to, all of the~~

13 ~~metropolitan planning organization as follows:~~

14 ~~(A) No later than September 30, 2010, the State Air Resources~~
15 ~~Board shall provide each affected region with greenhouse gas~~
16 ~~emission reduction targets for the automobile and light truck sector~~
17 ~~for 2020 and 2035, respectively.~~

18 ~~(i) No later than January 31, 2009, the state board shall appoint~~
19 ~~a Regional Targets Advisory Committee to recommend factors to~~
20 ~~be considered and methodologies to be used for setting greenhouse~~

22 ~~committee shall be composed of representatives of the metropolitan~~

35 (B) ~~Each metropolitan planning organization shall prepare a~~
36 ~~sustainable communities strategy, subject to the requirements of~~
37 ~~Part 450 of Title 23 of, and Part 93 of Title 40 of, the Code of~~
38 ~~Federal Regulations, including the requirement to utilize the most~~
39 ~~recent planning assumptions considering local general plans and~~
40 ~~other factors. The sustainable communities strategy shall (i)~~

1 identify the general location of uses, residential densities, and
2 building intensities within the region, (ii) identify areas within the
3 region sufficient to house all the population of the region, including
4 all economic segments of the population, over the course of the
5 planning period of the regional transportation plan taking into
6 account net migration into the region, population growth, household
7 formation and employment growth, (iii) identify areas within the
8 region sufficient to house an eight-year projection of the regional
9 housing need for the region pursuant to Section 65584, (iv) identify
10 a transportation network to service the transportation needs of the
11 region, (v) gather and consider the best practically available
12 scientific information regarding resource areas and farmland in
13 the region as defined in subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section
14 65080.01, (vi) consider the state housing goals specified in Sections
15 65580 and 65581, (vii) identify, in consultation with each local
16 educational agency, as defined in Section 421 of the Education
17 Code, in the region, how the sustainable communities strategy may
18 impact school enrollments and capacities and the need for new
19 schoolsites, and how the sustainable communities strategy may
20 impact school capacities in the areas targeted for infill development
21 and the need for expansion or modernization of existing schoolsites,
22 (viii) set forth a forecasted development pattern for the region,
23 which, when integrated with the transportation network, and other
24 transportation measures and policies, will reduce the greenhouse
25 gas emissions from automobiles and light trucks to achieve, if
26 there is a feasible way to do so, the greenhouse gas emission
27 reduction targets approved by the state board, and (ix) allow the
28 regional transportation plan to comply with Section 176 of the
29 federal Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 7506).

30 (C) (i) Within the jurisdiction of the Metropolitan
31 Transportation Commission, as defined by Section 66502, the
32 Association of Bay Area Governments shall be responsible for
33 clauses (i), (ii), (iii), (v), (vi) and (vii) of subparagraph (B), the
34 Metropolitan Transportation Commission shall be responsible for
35 clauses (iv) and (ix) of subparagraph (B); and the Association of
36 Bay Area Governments and the Metropolitan Transportation
37 Commission shall jointly be responsible for clause (viii) of
38 subparagraph (B):

39 (ii) Within the jurisdiction of the Tahoe Regional Planning
40 Agency, as defined in Sections 66800 and 66801, the Tahoe

1 Metropolitan Planning Organization shall use the Regional Plan
2 for the Lake Tahoe Region as the sustainable community strategy,
3 provided that it complies with clauses (viii) and (ix) of
4 subparagraph (B).

5 (D) In the region served by the multicounty transportation
6 planning agency described in Section 130004 of the Public Utilities
7 Code, a subregional council of governments and the county
8 transportation commission may work together to propose the
9 sustainable communities strategy and an alternative planning
10 strategy, if one is prepared pursuant to subparagraph (I), for that
11 subregional area. The metropolitan planning organization may
12 adopt a framework for a subregional sustainable communities
13 strategy or a subregional alternative planning strategy to address
14 the intraregional land use, transportation, economic, air quality,
15 and climate policy relationships. The metropolitan planning
16 organization shall include the subregional sustainable communities
17 strategy for that subregion in the regional sustainable communities
18 strategy to the extent consistent with this section and federal law
19 and approve the subregional alternative planning strategy, if one
20 is prepared pursuant to subparagraph (I), for that subregional area
21 to the extent consistent with this section. The metropolitan planning
22 organization shall develop overall guidelines, create public
23 participation plans pursuant to subparagraph (F), ensure
24 coordination, resolve conflicts, make sure that the overall plan
25 complies with applicable legal requirements, and adopt the plan
26 for the region.

27 (E) The metropolitan planning organization shall conduct at
28 least two informational meetings in each county within the region

32 one informational meeting if it is attended by representatives of
33 the county board of supervisors and city council members
34 representing a majority of the cities representing a majority of the

4 participation plan, for development of the sustainable communities

7 (i) Outreach efforts to encourage the active participation of a
8 broad range of stakeholder groups in the planning process,
9 consistent with the agency's adopted Federal Public Participation
10 Plan, including, but not limited to, affordable housing advocates,
11 transportation advocates, neighborhood and community groups,
12 environmental advocates, home builder representatives,
13 broad-based business organizations, landowners, commercial
14 property interests, and homeowner associations.

15 (ii) Consultation with congestion management agencies,
16 transportation agencies, and transportation commissions.

17 (iii) Workshops throughout the region to provide the public with
18 the information and tools necessary to provide a clear
19 understanding of the issues and policy choices. At least one
20 workshop shall be held in each county in the region. For counties
21 with a population greater than 500,000, at least three workshops
22 shall be held. Each workshop, to the extent practicable, shall
23 include urban simulation computer modeling to create visual
24 representations of the sustainable communities strategy and the
25 alternative planning strategy.

26 (iv) Preparation and circulation of a draft sustainable
27 communities strategy and an alternative planning strategy, if one
28 is prepared, not less than 55 days before adoption of a final regional
29 transportation plan.

30 (v) At least three public hearings on the draft sustainable
31 communities strategy in the regional transportation plan and
32 alternative planning strategy, if one is prepared. If the metropolitan
33 transportation organization consists of a single county, at least two
34 public hearings shall be held. To the maximum extent feasible, the
35 hearings shall be in different parts of the region to maximize the
36 opportunity for participation by members of the public throughout
37 the region.

38 (vi) A process for enabling members of the public to provide a
39 single request to receive notices, information, and updates.

1 ~~(G) In preparing a sustainable communities strategy, the~~
2 ~~metropolitan planning organization shall consider spheres of~~
3 ~~influence that have been adopted by the local agency formation~~
4 ~~commissions within its region.~~

5 ~~(H) Prior to adopting a sustainable communities strategy, the~~
6 ~~metropolitan planning organization shall quantify the reduction in~~
7 ~~greenhouse gas emissions projected to be achieved by the~~
8 ~~sustainable communities strategy and set forth the difference, if~~
9 ~~any, between the amount of that reduction and the target for the~~
10 ~~region established by the state board.~~

11 ~~(I) If the sustainable communities strategy, prepared in~~
12 ~~compliance with subparagraph (B) or (D), is unable to reduce~~
13 ~~greenhouse gas emissions to achieve the greenhouse gas emission~~
14 ~~reduction targets established by the state board, the metropolitan~~
15 ~~planning organization shall prepare an alternative planning strategy~~

32 ~~achievement of the greenhouse gas emission reduction targets.~~

33 ~~(iv) An alternative development pattern set forth in the~~
34 ~~alternative planning strategy shall comply with Part 450 of Title~~
35 ~~23 of, and Part 93 of Title 40 of, the Code of Federal Regulations,~~
36 ~~except to the extent that compliance will prevent achievement of~~
37 ~~the greenhouse gas emission reduction targets approved by the~~

39 ~~(v) For purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act~~
40 ~~(Division 13 (commencing with Section 21000) of the Public~~

1 Resources Code), an alternative planning strategy shall not
2 constitute a land use plan, policy, or regulation, and the
3 inconsistency of a project with an alternative planning strategy
4 shall not be a consideration in determining whether a project may

6 ~~(J) (i) Prior to starting the public participation process adopted~~
7 ~~pursuant to subparagraph (F), the metropolitan planning~~
8 ~~organization shall submit a description to the state board of the~~
9 ~~technical methodology it intends to use to estimate the greenhouse~~
10 ~~gas emissions from its sustainable communities strategy and, if~~
11 ~~appropriate, its alternative planning strategy. The state board shall~~
12 ~~respond to the metropolitan planning organization in a timely~~
13 ~~manner with written comments about the technical methodology,~~
14 ~~including specifically describing any aspects of that methodology~~
15 ~~it concludes will not yield accurate estimates of greenhouse gas~~

18 SEC. 2. Section 75121 of the Public Resources Code is

20 75121. (a) The Strategic Growth Council is hereby established
21 in state government and it shall consist of the Director of State
22 Planning and Research, the Secretary of the Resources Agency,
23 the Secretary for Environmental Protection, the Secretary of the
24 Transportation Agency, the Secretary of California Health and
25 Human Services, the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his
26 or her designee, and one member of the public to be appointed by
27 the Governor. The public member shall have a background in land
28 use planning, local government, resource protection and
29 management, or community development or revitalization.

30 (b) Staff for the council shall be reflective of the council's
