LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2029, as amended, Cooley. Inquests: sudden unexplained death in childhood.

Existing law states findings and declarations of the Legislature that sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS) is the leading cause of death for children under age one. Under existing law, a coroner has a duty to inquire into and determine the circumstances, manner, and cause of, among other things, deaths where the suspected cause of death is sudden infant death syndrome. The coroner is required to perform an autopsy, within 24 hours or as soon thereafter as feasible, in any case where an infant has died suddenly and unexpectedly. ~~Under existing law, it is a misdemeanor for a funeral director, physician, or other person who has charge of a deceased person's body to not immediately notify the~~

~~coroner if death occurred as a result of any of the causes or circumstances that the coroner has a duty to inquire into.~~

~~This bill would expand the duty of the coroner to also inquire into and determine the circumstances, manner, and cause of deaths where a child, who is one year of age or older but under 18 years of age, dies suddenly and unexpectedly or where the suspected cause of death is sudden unexplained death in childhood. This bill would define “sudden unexplained death in childhood” as the sudden death of a child one year of age or older but under 18 years of age that is unexplained by the history of the child and where for which a thorough postmortem examination fails to demonstrate an adequate cause of death. This bill would require the coroner to perform an autopsy as soon as feasible in any case where a child has died suddenly and unexpectedly. to notify the parent or responsible adult of a child within that definition about the importance of taking tissue samples. This bill would also exempt the coroner from liability for damages in a civil action for any act or omission done in compliance with a specified statute. The bill would provide an exemption to these provisions if the requirements conflict with a parent or guardian’s sincerely held religious beliefs unless there is an overriding public health concern or a law enforcement officer reasonably suspects that a crime has been committed. these provisions.~~

~~By expanding the duties of a local agency and expanding the scope of an existing crime, this bill would create a state-mandated local program.~~

~~The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.~~

~~This bill would provide that with regard to certain mandates no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.~~

~~With regard to any other mandates, this bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs so mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to the statutory provisions noted above.~~

~~The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.~~

~~This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state,~~

reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to these statutory provisions.

3 27491. (a) It is the duty of the coroner to inquire into and
4 determine the circumstances, manner, and cause of all violent,
5 sudden, or unusual deaths; unattended deaths; deaths if the
6 deceased has not been attended by either a physician or a registered
7 nurse, who is a member of a hospice care interdisciplinary team,
8 as defined by subdivision (g) of Section 1746 of the Health and
9 Safety Code in the 20 days before death; deaths related to or
10 following known or suspected self-induced or criminal abortion;
11 known or suspected homicide, suicide, or accidental poisoning;
12 deaths known or suspected as resulting in whole or in part from
13 or related to accident or injury either old or recent; deaths due to
14 drowning, fire, hanging, gunshot, stabbing, cutting, exposure,
15 starvation, acute alcoholism, drug addiction, strangulation,
16 aspiration, or in which the suspected cause of death is sudden infant
17 death syndrome; deaths in which a child, who is one year of age
18 or older but under 18 years of age, dies suddenly and unexpectedly,
19 or in which the suspected cause of death is sudden unexplained
20 death in childhood; death in whole or in part occasioned by
21 criminal means; deaths associated with a known or alleged rape
22 or crime against nature; deaths in prison or while under sentence;
23 deaths known or suspected as due to contagious disease and
24 constituting a public hazard; deaths from occupational diseases or
25 occupational hazards; deaths of patients in state mental hospitals
26 serving the mentally disabled and operated by the State Department
27 of State Hospitals; deaths of patients in state hospitals serving the
28 developmentally disabled and operated by the State Department
29 of Developmental Services; deaths under such circumstances as
30 to afford a reasonable ground to suspect that the death was caused
31 by the criminal act of another; and any deaths reported by
32 physicians or other persons having knowledge of death for inquiry
33 by coroner. Inquiry pursuant to this section does not include those

3 ~~(b) In any case in which the coroner conducts an inquiry~~
4 ~~pursuant to this section, the coroner or a deputy shall personally~~
5 ~~sign the certificate of death. If the death occurred in a state hospital,~~
6 ~~the coroner shall forward a copy of his or her report to the state~~
7 ~~agency responsible for the state hospital.~~

8 ~~(c) The coroner shall have discretion to determine the extent of~~
9 ~~inquiry to be made into any death occurring under natural~~
10 ~~circumstances and falling within the provisions of this section, and~~
11 ~~if inquiry determines that the physician of record has sufficient~~
12 ~~knowledge to reasonably state the cause of a death occurring under~~
13 ~~natural circumstances, the coroner may authorize that physician~~
14 ~~to sign the certificate of death.~~

15 ~~(d) For the purpose of inquiry, the coroner shall have the right~~
16 ~~to exhume the body of a deceased person when necessary to~~

18 ~~(e) Any funeral director, physician, or other person who has~~
19 ~~charge of a deceased person's body, when death occurred as a~~

2 ~~autopsy in any case where a child, who is one year of age or older~~
3 ~~but under 18 years of age, has died suddenly and unexpectedly.~~

4 ~~(2) However, if the attending physician desires to certify that~~
5 ~~the cause of death is sudden unexplained death in childhood, an~~
6 ~~autopsy may be performed at the discretion of the coroner. If the~~
7 ~~coroner performs an autopsy pursuant to this section, he or she~~
