An act to add and repeal Section 19803.5 of the Business and Professions Code, relating to gaming.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 601, as introduced, Yee. Gambling activities and establishments. The Gambling Control Act provides for the licensure and regulation of various legalized gambling activities and establishments by the California Gambling Control Commission and the investigation and enforcement of those activities and establishments by the Department of Justice. Existing law declares the intent of the Legislature in enacting the act, to provide uniform, minimum standards of regulation of permissible gambling activities and the operation of lawful gambling establishments.

This bill would require the Legislative Analyst to conduct an economic study to be submitted to the Legislature no later than December 1, 2014, analyzing the economic impact of all California laws and regulations on gambling establishments and the state's economy, as specified. The bill would authorize the Legislative Analyst to submit a claim to the Controller for its expenses associated with the study, to be paid from the Gambling Control Fund upon appropriation of the Legislature.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of the 2 following:

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1 (1) Many states are currently examining their laws governing 2 gambling and, as a result of that examination, are expanding 3 gambling in their states to compete with other states that permit 4 more expansive gambling and a greater variety of legalized games. 5 (2) California gambling establishments and tribes compete with 6 gambling establishments in many states for gambling revenues. 7 This competition has an economic impact beyond gambling, 8 including, but not limited to, reduced revenues from tourism and 9 entertainment and state and local tax proceeds. (3) Laws and regulations governing gambling establishments 10

11 and permitted games, including, but not limited to, the Gambling 12 Control Act and the Penal Code, the regulations adopted pursuant 13 to these laws and the enforcement of these laws and regulations

17 SEC. 2. Section 19803.5 is added to the Business and 18 Professions Code, to read:

19 19803.5. (a) The Legislative Analyst shall conduct an economic study to be submitted to the Legislature no later than 20 21 December 1, 2014, analyzing the economic impact of all California 22 laws and regulations on gambling establishments and the state's 23 economy. At a minimum, the study shall examine the extent to 24 which the regulation of permitted games and games procedures 25 and the regulation of the expansion of gaming impedes economic 26 growth in this sector of the California economy and state and local 27 tax and fee proceeds. Upon submission of this study to the 28 Legislature, the Legislative Analyst may submit a claim to the 29 Controller for its expenses associated with the study. The Controller 30 may pay those expenses from the Gambling Control Fund upon 31 appropriation by the Legislature.

35 (c) Pursuant to Section 10231.5 of the Government Code, this 36 section is repealed on December 31, 2015.

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
