An act to amend Sections 8505, 8505.1, 8505.2, 8505.5, 8505.10, 8505.12, 8505.14, 8505.17, 8507.1, 8514, 8518, 8520, 8528, 8551.5, 8560, 8562, 8564, 8564.6, 8565, 8566, 8567, 8590, 8593.1, 8612, 8613, 8617, 8622, 8643, 8647, 8651, 8660, 8673, and 8674 of, to add Sections 8504.1 and 8672.1 to, and to repeal Sections 8505.6, 8565.6, and 8590.1 of, the Business and Professions Code, relating to the Structural Pest Control Board.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 1244, as amended, Lieu. Structural Pest Control Board.

Existing law, until January 1, 2015, establishes the Structural Pest Control Board, within the Department of Consumer Affairs, and authorizes the Director of Consumer Affairs to appoint a registrar to be the executive officer of the board. The board is required to license and regulate structural pest control operators, as specified.

This bill would extend the operation of those provisions until January 1, 2019.

Existing law provides, in pertinent part, that structural pest control includes, with respect to household pests and wood destroying pests or organisms, or other pests which may invade households or other

structures, the engaging in, offering to engage in, advertising for, soliciting, or the performance of, among other things, the identification of infestations, or the use of insecticides, pesticides, rodenticides, fumigants, or allied chemicals or substances for the purpose of eliminating, exterminating, controlling, or preventing infestations or infections of those pests, or organisms. Under existing law, an applicator's license expires 3 years from the date the license is issued.

This bill would define the term "pesticide" to include any spray adjuvant and any substance, or mixture of substances, which is intended to be used for preventing, destroying, repelling, or mitigating any pest or organism, and would make conforming changes pertaining to that definition. The bill would delete obsolete provisions pertaining to the definition of fumigants and fumigation procedures, and would conform notice provisions relating to fumigation to other provisions of law. The bill would authorize, in specified circumstances, waiving the use of warning agents in conjunction with fumigants. The bill would provide that an applicator's license instead would expire on June 30 of the 3rd year after issuance.

Existing law requires registered structural pest control companies to submit monthly reports to the county agricultural commissioner reporting the name and registration number of each pesticide, the amount used, and the number of applications made. Existing law requires the report to have a pesticide stamp issued by the board, as specified.

This bill would authorize the use of pesticide stamp numbers in addition to pesticide stamps for those purposes. The bill would delete the requirement that the monthly reports specify the number of applications made for a pesticide. The bill would require structural pest control licensees to maintain a copy of the monthly report for 3 years after submission.

Existing law prescribes various fees for licensing, registration, examinations, and other purposes pertaining to structural pest control matters, and authorizes a fee of \$2 for a pesticide use stamp in connection with a monthly pesticide report. Existing law provides that those fees may be deposited in the Structural Pest Control Research Fund, or with a bank or other depository, as specified.

This bill would prescribe a \$2 fee for a pesticide use stamp number. The bill would delete provisions for deposit of the stamp and stamp number fees with a bank or other depository, and would make additional conforming changes.

Existing law authorizes suspension and fines to be imposed on a registered structural pest control company for specified violations.

This bill would provide that the time for an action for a suspension or fine against a structural pest control licensee or registered company would be 2 years from the date of the violation, provided however, that when an agricultural commissioner submits a completed investigation to the *registrar of the Structural Pest Control Board*, ~~as specified~~, or *the Attorney General*, the action would be required to be brought within one year of the commissioner’s submission.

Existing law establishes a disciplinary review committee, in connection with disciplinary procedures against structural pest control licensees and registered companies, which requires as a member of the committee, a person representing the Secretary of Food and Agriculture.

This bill would instead require as a member of the committee, a person who represents the Director of Pesticide Regulation.

The bill would make additional conforming and technical, nonsubstantive changes.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 8504.1 is added to the Business and
2 Professions Code, to read:

3 8504.1. “Pesticide” includes any of the following:

4 (a) Any spray adjuvant.

5 (b) Any substance, or mixture of substances, which is intended
6 to be used for preventing, destroying, repelling, or mitigating any
7 pest or organism.

8 SEC. 2. Section 8505 of the Business and Professions Code is
9 amended to read:

10 8505. (a) “Structural pest control” and “pest control” as used
11 in this chapter are synonymous. Except as provided in Section
12 8555 and elsewhere in this chapter, it is, with respect to household
13 pests and wood destroying pests or organisms, or other pests that
14 may invade households or other structures, including railroad cars,
15 ships, docks, trucks, airplanes, or the contents thereof, the engaging
16 in, offering to engage in, advertising for, soliciting, or the
17 performance of, any of the following:

18 (1) Identification of infestations or infections.

1 (2) The making of an inspection or inspections for the purpose
2 of identifying or attempting to identify infestations or infections
3 of household or other structures by those pests or organisms.

4 (3) The making of inspection reports, recommendations,
5 estimates, and bids, whether oral or written, with respect to those
6 infestations or infections.

7 (4) The making of contracts, or the submitting of bids for, or
8 the performance of any work including the making of structural
9 repairs or replacements, or the use of pesticides, or mechanical
10 devices for the purpose of eliminating, exterminating, controlling
11 or preventing infestations or infections of those pests, or organisms.

12 (b) "Household pests" are defined for the purpose of this chapter
13 as those pests other than wood destroying pests or organisms,
14 which invade households and other structures, including, but not
15 limited to, rodents, vermin, and insects.

16 SEC. 3. Section 8505.1 of the Business and Professions Code
17 is amended to read:

18 8505.1. (a) Except as provided in subdivisions (b) and (c), for
19 the purpose of this act, "fumigation" shall be defined as the use
20 within an enclosed space for the destruction of plant or animal life,
21 a substance having a vapor pressure greater than 5 millimeters of
22 mercury at 25 degrees centigrade when the substance is labeled
23 for those purposes.

24 The following is a list of lethal fumigants:

- 25 (1) Methyl bromide.
- 26 (2) Sulfuryl fluoride.
- 27 (3) Aluminum phosphide.

28 The board may adopt, and may as necessary amend, by
29 regulation, a list of fumigants.

30 (b) For the purpose of this act, "warning agent" is any agent
31 used in combination with any fumigant that lacks warning
32 properties.

33 The following is a warning agent:

34 Chloropicrin.

35 The board may adopt, and may as necessary amend, by
36 regulation, a list of warning agents.

37 (c) For the purpose of this act "simple asphyxiants" shall not
38 be deemed to be fumigants.

39 The following is a list of simple asphyxiants:

- 40 (1) Liquid nitrogen.

1 (2) Carbon dioxide.

2 The board may adopt, and may as necessary amend, by
3 regulation, a list of simple asphyxiants.

4 SEC. 4. Section 8505.2 of the Business and Professions Code
5 is amended to read:

6 8505.2. Fumigation shall be performed only under the direct
7 and personal supervision of an individual who is licensed by the
8 board as an operator or field representative in Branch 1 as set forth
9 in Section 8560.

10 SEC. 5. Section 8505.5 of the Business and Professions Code
11 is amended to read:

12 8505.5. (a) Notice of the date and place of fumigation, and
13 chemicals to be used, shall be given by the fumigator to the fire
14 department serving the area in which fumigation is to be performed
15 not less than two hours prior to the time fumigation begins. The
16 fire department shall not charge any fees for any service related
17 to structural pest control activities except for the costs of an
18 emergency response necessitated by illegal or negligent actions.

19 (b) Notice of each fumigation to be performed shall be given
20 to the commissioner in the county in which the job is to be
21 performed. The notice, which may be mailed or given by telephone,
22 at the option of the commissioner, shall be given at least 24 hours
23 prior to the time fumigation begins, unless the commissioner
24 determines that less time is sufficient. A fee shall not be assessed
25 for processing this notice.

26 SEC. 6. Section 8505.6 of the Business and Professions Code
27 is repealed.

28 SEC. 7. Section 8505.10 of the Business and Professions Code
29 is amended to read:

30 8505.10. Warning signs shall be printed in red on white
31 background and shall contain the following statement in letters
32 not less than two inches in height: "DANGER—FUMIGATION."
33 They shall also depict a skull and crossbones not less than one
34 inch in height and shall state in letters not less than one-half inch
35 in height the name of the fumigant. These signs shall also include
36 in legible ink of any color, the date and time fumigant was injected,
37 and the name, address, and telephone number of the registered
38 company performing the fumigation. Warning signs placed under
39 a tarpaulin shall not be required to state the time the fumigant was
40 injected.

1 SEC. 8. Section 8505.12 of the Business and Professions Code
2 is amended to read:

3 8505.12. A registered company performing fumigation shall
4 use an adequate warning agent with all fumigants which lack those
5 properties. There may be circumstances in which the use of
6 chloropicrin is not possible due to its unknown effects on sensitive
7 items, including, but not limited to, artifacts in museums or in
8 police evidence storage. In these circumstances, waiving the use
9 of chloropicrin shall be approved by the state regulatory authority
10 and documented in advance and shall include alternative safety
11 precautions which address initial clearance of the site to be
12 fumigated, potential movement of the fumigant to unattended
13 areas, and continued site security. When conditions involving
14 abnormal hazards exist, the licensee exercising direct and personal
15 supervision shall take those safety precautions in addition to those
16 prescribed by this chapter as are reasonably necessary to protect
17 the public health and safety.

18 SEC. 9. Section 8505.14 of the Business and Professions Code
19 is amended to read:

20 8505.14. "Fumigator" means any individual licensed by the
21 board as a structural pest control operator or as a structural pest
22 control field representative in Branch 1 as set forth in Section 8560.

23 SEC. 10. Section 8505.17 of the Business and Professions
24 Code is amended to read:

25 8505.17. (a) There is hereby continued in existence in the State
26 Treasury a special fund to be known as the Structural Pest Control
27 Education and Enforcement Fund. Funds derived from the pesticide
28 use report filing fee provided for in Section 8674 and all proceeds
29 from civil penalties collected by the board pursuant to Section
30 8617 shall be deposited in the Education and Enforcement Account
31 which is hereby created in the fund. The account shall be used by
32 the board (1) for the purposes of training as provided in Section
33 8616, (2) for reimbursement to the Director of Pesticide Regulation
34 for work performed as the agent of the board pursuant to Sections
35 8616, 8616.4, and 8617 and Section 15202 of the Food and
36 Agricultural Code and for cases referred to the board pursuant to
37 subdivision (b) of Section 8616.5, and (3) for reasonable expenses
38 incurred by the Disciplinary Review Committee. There is no
39 reimbursement from this fund for inspections and routine
40 investigations.

1 (b) The board may withhold funds from its agent if it is not
2 satisfied that its agent has corrected the problems which resulted
3 in a suspension as provided in Section 8616.6. The authority to
4 withhold funds shall be limited only to the withholding of an
5 amount otherwise due the agent for reimbursable activities
6 performed in the county or counties for which a notice has been
7 filed pursuant to Section 8616.6.

8 (c) Registered structural pest control companies shall prepare
9 and submit to the county agricultural commissioner a monthly
10 report of all pesticides used in that county. The report shall be on
11 a form approved by the Director of Pesticide Regulation and shall
12 contain the name and registration number of each pesticide and
13 the amount used. The report shall be submitted to the commissioner
14 by the 10th day of the month following the month of application
15 and a copy shall be maintained by the licensee for a period of three
16 years after the report submission date. Each pesticide use report
17 or combination of use reports representing a registered structural
18 pest control company's total county pesticide use for the month
19 shall require a pesticide use stamp or stamp number issued by the
20 board in the denomination fixed by the board in accordance with
21 Section 8674 as the pesticide use report filing fee. The board shall
22 provide for the sale of these stamps and stamp numbers and for
23 the refund of moneys paid for stamps and stamp numbers which
24 are returned to it unused. When a registered structural pest control
25 company performs no pest control during a month in a county in
26 which it has given notice pursuant to Section 15204 of the Food
27 and Agricultural Code, the registered company shall submit a use
28 report stating this fact to the commissioner. A pesticide use stamp
29 or stamp number is not required on negative use reports.

30 (d) All other proceeds from civil penalties collected by the board
31 shall be deposited in the Civil Penalties Account which is hereby
32 created in the fund. These funds shall be available to the board
33 upon appropriation by the Legislature for the purposes of enforcing
34 this chapter.

35 SEC. 11. Section 8507.1 of the Business and Professions Code
36 is amended to read:

37 8507.1. (a) (1) "Structural pest control applicator" is any
38 individual who is licensed by the board to apply pesticides in
39 Branch 2 or Branch 3 on behalf of a registered company.

1 (2) A structural pest control applicator shall not contract for
2 pest control work or perform pest control work in his or her own
3 behalf.

4 (b) As used in this chapter, “applicator” refers to “structural
5 pest control applicator.”

6 SEC. 12. Section 8514 of the Business and Professions Code
7 is amended to read:

8 8514. (a) A Branch 2 or 3 registered company shall not
9 commence work on a contract, or sign, issue, or deliver any
10 documents expressing an opinion or statement relating to the
11 control of household pests, or wood destroying pests or organisms
12 until the registered company has completed an inspection.

13 (b) Notwithstanding any provision of this chapter, after an
14 inspection has been made, a registered company which holds a
15 branch registration for the control of household pests, or wood
16 destroying pests or organisms, but whose branch registration
17 restricts the method of eradication or control permitted, may
18 recommend and enter into a contract for the eradication or control
19 of pests within the scope of its branch registration, provided that
20 it subcontracts, in writing, the actual performance of the work to
21 a registered company which holds a branch registration authorizing
22 the particular method to be used.

23 (c) A registered company may subcontract, in writing, any pest
24 control work for which it is registered in any branch or branches
25 to a registered company holding a valid branch registration to do
26 that work.

27 (d) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit a
28 registered company or the consumer from subcontracting with a
29 licensed contractor to do any work authorized under Section 8556.

30 (e) A registered company shall not subcontract structural
31 fumigation work, as permitted in this section, without the written
32 consent of the consumer. The consumer shall be informed in
33 advance, in writing, of any proposed work which the registered
34 company intends to subcontract and of the consumer’s right to
35 select another person or entity of the consumer’s choosing to
36 perform the work. The consumer may authorize the subcontracting
37 of the work as proposed or may contract directly with another
38 registered company licensed to perform the work. Nothing in this
39 paragraph shall be construed to eliminate any otherwise applicable

1 licensure requirements, nor permit a licensed contractor to perform
2 any work beyond that authorized by Section 8556.

3 (f) Nothing contained in this section shall permit or authorize
4 a registered company to perform, attempt to perform, advertise or
5 hold out to the public or to any person that it is authorized,
6 qualified, or registered to perform, pest control work in a branch,
7 or by a method, for which it is not registered, except that a Branch
8 2 or Branch 3 registered company may advertise fumigation or
9 any all encompassing treatment described in paragraph (8) of
10 subdivision (a) of Section 1991 of Title 16 of the California Code
11 of Regulations if the company complies with the requirements of
12 this section.

13 (g) Subcontracting of work, as permitted in this section, shall
14 not relieve the prime contractor or the subcontractor from
15 responsibility for, or from disciplinary action because of, an act
16 or omission on its part, which would otherwise be a ground for
17 disciplinary action. However, the registered company making the
18 initial proposal including proposed work that the registered
19 company intends to subcontract shall not be subject to disciplinary
20 action or otherwise responsible for an act or omission in the
21 performance of the work that the consumer directly contracts with
22 another registered company, person, or entity to perform, as
23 permitted by this section. All home solicitation contracts shall
24 comply with Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 1688) of Title
25 5 of Part 2 of Division 3 of the Civil Code.

26 SEC. 13. Section 8518 of the Business and Professions Code
27 is amended to read:

28 8518. (a) When a registered company completes work under
29 a contract, it shall prepare, on a form prescribed by the board, a
30 notice of work completed and not completed, and shall furnish
31 that notice to the owner of the property or the owner's agent within
32 10 business days after completing the work. The notice shall
33 include a statement of the cost of the completed work and estimated
34 cost of work not completed.

35 (b) The address of each property inspected or upon which work
36 was completed shall be reported on a form prescribed by the board
37 and shall be filed with the board no later than 10 business days
38 after completed work.

39 (c) A filing fee shall be assessed pursuant to Section 8674 for
40 every property upon which work is completed.

1 (d) Failure of a registered company to report and file with the
2 board the address of any property upon which work was completed
3 pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 8516 or Section 8518 is
4 grounds for disciplinary action and shall subject the registered
5 company to a fine of not more than two thousand five hundred
6 dollars (\$2,500).

7 (e) The registered company shall retain for three years all
8 original notices of work completed, work not completed, and
9 activity forms.

10 (f) Notices of work completed and not completed shall be made
11 available for inspection and reproduction to the executive officer
12 of the board or his or her duly authorized representative during
13 business hours. Original notices of work completed or not
14 completed or copies thereof shall be submitted to the board upon
15 request within two business days.

16 SEC. 14. Section 8520 of the Business and Professions Code
17 is amended to read:

18 8520. (a) There is in the Department of Consumer Affairs a
19 Structural Pest Control Board, which consists of seven members.

20 (b) Subject to the jurisdiction conferred upon the director by
21 Division 1 (commencing with Section 100), the board is vested
22 with the power to and shall administer the provisions of this
23 chapter.

24 (c) It is the intent of the Legislature that consumer protection
25 is the primary mission of the board.

26 (d) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2019,
27 and as of that date is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that
28 is enacted before January 1, 2019, deletes or extends that date.
29 Notwithstanding any other law, the repeal of this section renders
30 the board subject to review by the appropriate policy committees
31 of the Legislature.

32 SEC. 15. Section 8528 of the Business and Professions Code
33 is amended to read:

34 8528. (a) With the approval of the director, the board shall
35 appoint a registrar, fix his or her compensation, and prescribe his
36 or her duties.

37 (b) The registrar is the executive officer and secretary of the
38 board.

1 (c) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2019,
2 and as of that date is repealed, unless a later enacted statute, that
3 is enacted before January 1, 2019, deletes or extends that date.

4 SEC. 16. Section 8551.5 of the Business and Professions Code
5 is amended to read:

6 8551.5. Except as provided in this chapter, an unlicensed
7 individual in the employ of a registered company shall not apply
8 any pesticides included in Branch 2 or Branch 3. However, an
9 individual may, for 90 days from the date of employment, apply
10 pesticides for the purposes of training under the direct supervision
11 of a licensed field representative or operator employed by the
12 company. This direct supervision means in the presence of the
13 licensed field representative or operator at all times. The 90-day
14 time period may not be extended.

15 SEC. 17. Section 8560 of the Business and Professions Code
16 is amended to read:

17 8560. (a) Licenses issued to operators, field representatives,
18 or applicators shall be limited to the branch or branches of pest
19 control for which the applicant has qualified by application and
20 examination.

21 (b) For the purpose of delimiting the type and character of work
22 authorized by the various branch licenses, the practice of pest
23 control is classified into the following branches:

24 (1) Branch 1. Fumigation. The practice relating to the control
25 of household and wood-destroying pests or organisms by
26 fumigation with poisonous or lethal gases.

27 (2) Branch 2. General pest. The practice relating to the control
28 of household pests, excluding fumigation with poisonous or lethal
29 gases.

30 (3) Branch 3. Termite. The practice relating to the control of
31 wood-destroying pests or organisms by the use of insecticides, or
32 structural repairs and corrections, excluding fumigation with
33 poisonous or lethal gases.

34 (c) The board may issue a license for a combination of two or
35 more branches for which an applicant qualifies under the provisions
36 of this chapter, and the combination license shall be considered
37 one license.

38 (d) Unless otherwise authorized by the board, all examinations
39 shall be supplied by the board. All examinations shall be kept for
40 a period of one year, upon the expiration of which these records

1 may be destroyed on order of the board. Each applicant for license
2 as an operator or a field representative shall be designated by a
3 number instead of by name, and the identity thereof shall not be
4 disclosed until the examinations are graded. A person shall not be
5 admitted to the examination room except members of the board,
6 the examining personnel, and the applicants.

7 (e) The board shall make rules and regulations for the purpose
8 of securing fair, impartial, and proper examinations.

9 (f) Licensees may be licensed in other branches upon complying
10 with the requirements for qualification and by examination in those
11 other branches. A failure of the licensee to pass examination in
12 the other branch or branches shall not have any effect on existing
13 licenses.

14 (g) The examination shall be in each of the subjects specified
15 in the branch or branches relating to the respective applications.
16 A license according to the applications shall be granted to any
17 applicant who shall make a general average of not less than 70
18 percent on each of the subjects of the branch or branches.

19 SEC. 18. Section 8562 of the Business and Professions Code
20 is amended to read:

21 8562. (a) To obtain an original operator’s license, an applicant
22 shall submit to the registrar an application containing the statement
23 that the applicant desires the issuance of an operator’s license
24 under the terms of this chapter.

25 (b) The application shall be made on forms prescribed by the
26 board and issued by the registrar in accordance with rules and
27 regulations adopted by the board, and shall contain the following:

- 28 (1) The name of the applicant.
- 29 (2) Proof satisfactory to the board that the applicant has had
30 actual experience for a period of not less than the time specified
31 opposite the branches of pest control listed below in the employ
32 of a registered company in the State of California in the particular
33 branch or branches of pest control for which the applicant desires
34 to be licensed, or the equivalent of that experience:

1 (c) For the purpose of this subdivision one year shall equal 1,600
2 hours of actual experience in the field.

3 (d) A designation of the branch or branches for which the
4 application is made.

5 (e) The fees prescribed by this chapter.

6 (f) No operator's license shall be issued to an individual under
7 18 years of age.

8 (g) Effective January 1, 1993, an operator's license shall not be
9 issued to an individual unless that individual has been licensed as
10 a field representative in the branch in which the individual has
11 applied for an operator's license for a period of at least one year,
12 in the case of Branches 1 and 2, or for a period of at least two years
13 for Branch 3, or has demonstrated to the satisfaction of the board
14 that he or she has the equivalent of that training and experience.

15 SEC. 19. Section 8564 of the Business and Professions Code
16 is amended to read:

17 8564. (a) To obtain an original field representative's license,
18 an applicant shall submit to the registrar an application containing
19 a statement that the applicant desires the issuance of a field
20 representative's license under the terms of this chapter.

21 (b) The application shall be made on a form prescribed by the
22 board and issued by the registrar in accordance with rules and
23 regulations adopted by the board, and shall contain the following:

24 (1) The length of time during which the applicant has engaged
25 in any work relating to pest control.

26 (2) The name and place of business of the person who last
27 employed him or her.

28 (3) The name of the person by whom the applicant is employed.

29 (4) The name of the registered company by which the applicant
30 is to be employed.

31 (5) The fees prescribed by this chapter.

32 (c) The board shall not accept any application for a field
33 representative's license in Branch 1 unless the applicant submits
34 proof satisfactory to the board that he or she has had six months'
35 training and experience in the practice of fumigating with
36 poisonous or lethal gases under the immediate supervision of an
37 individual licensed to practice fumigating, or the equivalent of that
38 training and experience.

39 (d) The board shall not accept any application for a field
40 representative's license in Branch 2 unless the applicant submits

1 proof satisfactory to the board that he or she has had training and
2 experience in the practice of pesticide application, Branch 2 pest
3 identification and biology, pesticide application equipment, and
4 pesticide hazards and safety practice under the immediate
5 supervision of an operator or field representative licensed in Branch
6 2, or the equivalent of that training and experience.

7 (e) The board shall not accept any application for a field
8 representative's license in Branch 3 unless the applicant submits
9 proof satisfactory to the board that he or she has had training and
10 experience in the practice of pesticide application, Branch 3 pest
11 identification and biology, pesticide application equipment,
12 pesticide hazards and safety practices, structural repairs, and
13 structural inspection procedures and report writing under the
14 immediate supervision of an operator or field representative
15 licensed in Branch 3, or the equivalent of that training and
16 experience.

17 SEC. 20. Section 8564.6 of the Business and Professions Code
18 is amended to read:

19 8564.6. (a) To obtain an original applicator's license, an
