An act to ~~add Section 39715.5 to~~ amend Section 39712 of the Health and Safety Code, relating to greenhouse gases.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1030, as amended, Ridley-Thomas. California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006: Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund.

The California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006 establishes the State Air Resources Board as the state agency responsible for monitoring and regulating sources emitting greenhouse gases. The act authorizes the state board to include the use of market-based compliance mechanisms. Existing law requires all moneys, except for fines and penalties, collected by the state board from the auction or sale of allowances as part of a market-based compliance mechanism to be deposited in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund and to be available upon appropriation by the Legislature. Existing law requires the Department of Finance, in consultation with the state board and any other relevant state agency, to develop, as specified, a 3-year investment plan for the moneys deposited in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund. *Existing law requires moneys in the fund to be used to facilitate the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions and, where applicable and to the extent feasible, to foster job creation by promoting in-state greenhouse gas emissions reduction projects carried out by California workers and businesses.*

This bill would, *for projects involving hiring*, require ~~a state agency that allocates moneys from the fund to prioritize projects that include project labor agreements with targeted hire goals, community workforce agreements that connect local residents to jobs or training opportunities, or partnerships~~ *priority be given to projects that include partnerships* with training entities that have a proven track record of placing disadvantaged workers in career-track jobs.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 3 (a) With the adoption of Assembly Bill 32 (Chapter 488 of the
- 4 Statutes of 2006), Senate Bill 535 (Chapter 830 of the Statutes of
- 5 ~~2012~~ 2012), and related climate policies, the state has led the
- 6 nation in tackling climate change and ensuring that climate policies
- 7 and investments help lift up our state’s most disinvested
- 8 communities.
- 9 (b) The revenue generated through the auction of carbon
- 10 allowances provides an opportunity to promote triple bottom line
- 11 investments that tackle our climate crises, grow our economy, and
- 12 promote equity.
- 13 (c) The growth rate of green jobs is significantly faster than that
- 14 of all other jobs nationwide, and the majority of this job growth
- 15 is in California, making the state a national and international leader
- 16 in green jobs.
- 17 (d) Green jobs are accessible to people with a variety of
- 18 educational attainment and, on average, offer a higher median
- 19 wage and better opportunities for career advancement. Preparing
- 20 and connecting disconnected youth and disadvantaged workers to
- 21 these jobs is critical to ensuring these jobs support a future of
- 22 shared prosperity.
- 23 (e) It is the intent of the Legislature to ensure that investments
- 24 made through the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, created
- 25 pursuant to Section 16428.8 of the Government Code, continue to
- 26 support the growth of the diverse green jobs sector in the state,
- 27 increase access to green jobs for disconnected youth and other
- 28 disadvantaged workers, and support workforce training

15 39712. (a) (1) It is the intent of the Legislature that moneys
16 shall be appropriated from the fund only in a manner consistent
17 with the requirements of this chapter and Article 9.7 (commencing
18 with Section 16428.8) of Chapter 2 of Part 2 of Division 4 of Title
19 2 of the Government Code.

20 (2) The state shall not approve allocations for a measure or
21 program using moneys appropriated from the fund except after
22 determining, based on the available evidence, that the use of those
23 moneys furthers the regulatory purposes of Division 25.5
24 (commencing with Section 38500) and is consistent with law. If
25 any expenditure of moneys from the fund for any measure or
26 project is determined by a court to be inconsistent with law, the
27 allocations for the remaining measures or projects shall be
28 severable and shall not be affected.

29 (b) Moneys shall be used to facilitate the achievement of
30 reductions of greenhouse gas emissions in this state consistent
31 with Division 25.5 (commencing with Section 38500) and, where
32 applicable and to the extent feasible:

33 (1) Maximize economic, environmental, and public health
34 benefits to the state.

35 (2) (A) Foster job creation by promoting in-state greenhouse
36 gas emissions reduction projects carried out by California workers
37 and businesses.

38 (B) *For projects that involve hiring, projects that include*
39 *partnerships with training entities that have a proven track record*

1 *of placing disadvantaged workers in career-track jobs shall be*
2 *prioritized.*

3 (3) Complement efforts to improve air quality.

4 (4) Direct investment toward the most disadvantaged
5 communities and households in the state.

6 (5) Provide opportunities for businesses, public agencies,
7 nonprofits, and other community institutions to participate in and
8 benefit from statewide efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

9 (6) Lessen the impacts and effects of climate change on the
10 state's communities, economy, and environment.

11 (c) Moneys appropriated from the fund may be allocated,
12 consistent with subdivision (a), for the purpose of reducing
13 greenhouse gas emissions in this state through investments that
14 may include, but are not limited to, any of the following:

15 (1) Funding to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through energy
16 efficiency, clean and renewable energy generation, distributed
17 renewable energy generation, transmission and storage, and other
18 related actions, including, but not limited to, at public universities,
19 state and local public buildings, and industrial and manufacturing
20 facilities.

21 (2) Funding to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through the
22 development of state-of-the-art systems to move goods and freight,
23 advanced technology vehicles and vehicle infrastructure, advanced
24 biofuels, and low-carbon and efficient public transportation.

25 (3) Funding to reduce greenhouse gas emissions associated with
26 water use and supply, land and natural resource conservation and
27 management, forestry, and sustainable agriculture.

28 (4) Funding to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through
29 strategic planning and development of sustainable infrastructure
30 projects, including, but not limited to, transportation and housing.

31 (5) Funding to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through
32 increased in-state diversion of municipal solid waste from disposal
33 through waste reduction, diversion, and reuse.

34 (6) Funding to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through
35 investments in programs implemented by local and regional
36 agencies, local and regional collaboratives, and nonprofit
37 organizations coordinating with local governments.

- 1 (7) Funding research, development, and deployment of
- 2 innovative technologies, measures, and practices related to
- 3 programs and projects funded pursuant to this chapter.

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
