An act to amend Section 229.26 of the Streets and Highways Code, relating to highways.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2559, as introduced, Frazier. Tourist-oriented directional signs.

Existing law authorizes the Department of Transportation to administer a program for the placement of tourist-oriented directional signs for businesses, attractions, or facilities near state highways in nonurbanized areas. Existing law specifies various requirements for placement of these signs, including that the maximum distance from a highway intersection to an attraction or facility may generally not exceed 10 miles, but may not exceed 3 miles in the case of food or lodging facilities.

This bill would make nonsubstantive changes to these provisions.

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

- 1     SECTION 1. Section 229.26 of the Streets and Highways Code
- 2     is amended to read:
- 3     229.26. (a) Except as provided in subdivision (b), the distance
- 4     from the nearest highway intersection to the nearest facility or
- 5     attraction shall not exceed 10 miles.

- 1 (b) Notwithstanding subdivision (a), the maximum distance
- 2 from the signed intersection to the nearest facility or attraction
- 3 shall not exceed the following:
- 4 (1) One mile for a service station.
- 5 (2) Three miles for *a* food or lodging ~~facilities.~~ *facility*.
