An act to amend Section 6254 of the Government Code, relating to public records.

## LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2611, as introduced, Low. The California Public Records Act: exemptions.

Existing law, the California Public Records Act, requires state and local agencies to make their records available for public inspection, unless an exemption from disclosure applies. The act declares that access to information concerning the conduct of the people's business is a fundamental and necessary right of every person in this state. Existing law also requires every public agency to comply with the California Public Records Act and with any subsequent statutory enactment amending the act, or enacting or amending any successor act.

Existing law exempts from disclosure any investigatory or security file compiled by any other state or local police agency, or any investigatory or security files compiled by any other state or local agency for correctional, law enforcement, or licensing purposes.

This bill would expand that exemption to include any investigatory or security audio or video recording.

Existing law requires state and local law enforcement agencies to disclose the names and addresses of persons involved in complaints or investigations and various other information related to an incident to a victim or any person who suffers bodily injury or property damage or

loss as the result of specified incidents or crimes unless the disclosure would endanger the safety of a witness or other person involved in the investigation.

This bill would expand this exception to include disclosures that would endanger the privacy of those persons, and would specify that the disclosure exception applies to disclosures about a victim.

Existing law requires state and local law enforcement agencies to make public specific specified information relating to individuals arrested by the agency for the commission of a crime and the circumstances surrounding all complaints or requests for assistance, among other things, except to the extent that disclosure of a particular item of information would endanger the safety of a person involved in the investigation.

This bill would further expand that exception to include a disclosure that would endanger the privacy of a person involved in the investigation.

The bill would exempt from disclosure any audio or video recording depicting the death or serious bodily injury of a peace officer.

Existing constitutional provisions require that a statute that limits the right of access to the meetings of public bodies or the writings of public officials and agencies be adopted with findings demonstrating the interest protected by the limitation and the need for protecting that interest.

This bill would make legislative findings to that effect.

The California Constitution requires local agencies, for the purpose of ensuring public access to the meetings of public bodies and the writings of public officials and agencies, to comply with a statutory enactment that amends or enacts laws relating to public records or open meetings and contains findings demonstrating that the enactment furthers the constitutional requirements relating to this purpose.

This bill would make legislative findings to that effect.

The bill would also make other technical, nonsubstantive changes.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

6254. Except as provided in Sections 6254.7 and 6254.13, this
chapter does not require the disclosure of any of the following
records:

communications prepared by, on behalf of, or for the use of, any
state agency referred to in paragraph (1).

(4) Information received in confidence by any state agencyreferred to in paragraph (1).

30 (e) Geological and geophysical data, plant production data, and
31 similar information relating to utility systems development, or
32 market or crop reports, that are obtained in confidence from any
33 person.

(f) Records of complaints to, or investigations conducted by,
or records of intelligence information or security procedures of,
the office of the Attorney General and the Department of Justice,
the Office of Emergency Services and any state or local police
agency, or any investigatory or security files files, including audio

1 or video recordings, compiled by any other state or local police

2 agency, or any investigatory or security files compiled by any other

However, 21 However, this-division subdivision does not require the 22 disclosure of that portion of those investigative files that reflects 23 the analysis or conclusions of the investigating officer. 24 Customer lists provided to a state or local police agency by an

alarm or security company at the request of the agency shall be construed to be records subject to this subdivision.

27 Notwithstanding any other provision of this subdivision, state 28 and local law enforcement agencies shall make public the following 29 information, except to the extent that disclosure of a particular 30 item of information would endanger the safety or privacy of a 31 person involved in an investigation or would endanger the 32 successful completion of the investigation or a related investigation: 33 (1) The full name and occupation of every individual arrested 34 by the agency, the individual's physical description including date of birth, color of eyes and hair, sex, height and weight, the time 35 36 and date of arrest, the time and date of booking, the location of 37 the arrest, the factual circumstances surrounding the arrest, the 38 amount of bail set, the time and manner of release or the location 39 where the individual is currently being held, and all charges the

Governor's office or in the custody of or maintained by the
Governor's Legal Affairs Secretary. However, public records shall
not be transferred to the custody of the Governor's Legal Affairs

(4) Records obtained to provide workers' compensation 27 28 insurance under Chapter 4 (commencing with Section 11770) of 29 Part 3 of Division 2 of the Insurance Code, including, but not 30 limited to, any medical claims information, policyholder 31 information provided that nothing in this paragraph shall be 32 interpreted to prevent an insurance agent or broker from obtaining 33 proprietary information or other information authorized by law to 34 be obtained by the agent or broker, and information on rates,

35 pricing, and claims handling received from brokers.

36 (5) (A) Records that are trade secrets pursuant to Section 37 6276.44, or Article 11 (commencing with Section 1060) of Chapter

38 4 of Division 8 of the Evidence Code, including without limitation,

39 instructions, advice, or training provided by the State Compensation

40 Insurance Fund to its board members, officers, and employees

1 regarding the fund's special investigation unit, internal audit unit,

and informational security, marketing, rating, pricing, underwriting,claims handling, audits, and collections.

4 (B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A), the portions of records

5 containing trade secrets shall be available for review by the Joint

6 Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits, Division

7 of Workers' Compensation, and the Department of Insurance to8 ensure compliance with applicable law.

9 (6) (A) Internal audits containing proprietary information and 10 the following records that are related to an internal audit:

11 (i) Personal papers and correspondence of any person providing

12 assistance to the fund when that person has requested in writing 13 that his or her papers and correspondence be kept private and

14 confidential. Those papers and correspondence shall become public

records if the written request is withdrawn, or upon order of the fund.

(ii) Papers, correspondence, memoranda, or any substantiveinformation pertaining to any audit not completed or an internalaudit that contains proprietary information.

20 (B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A), the portions of records 21 containing proprietary information, or any information specified

22 in subparagraph (A) shall be available for review by the Joint

Legislative Audit Committee, the Bureau of State Audits, Divisionof Workers' Compensation, and the Department of Insurance to

25 ensure compliance with applicable law.

(7) (A) Except as provided in subparagraph (C), contracts
entered into pursuant to Chapter 4 (commencing with Section
11770) of Part 3 of Division 2 of the Insurance Code shall be open
to inspection one year after the contract has been fully executed.

30 (B) If a contract entered into pursuant to Chapter 4 (commencing

31 with Section 11770) of Part 3 of Division 2 of the Insurance Code

32 is amended, the amendment shall be open to inspection one year

33 after the amendment has been fully executed.

34 (C) Three years after a contract or amendment is open to 35 inspection pursuant to this subdivision, the portion of the contract

or amendment containing the rates of payment shall be open to inspection.

38 (D) Notwithstanding any other law, the entire contract or 39 amendments to a contract shall be open to inspection by the Joint

40 Legislative Audit Committee. The committee shall maintain the

confidentiality of the contracts and amendments thereto until the
 contract or amendments to a contract are open to inspection

3 pursuant to this paragraph.

4 (E) This paragraph is not intended to apply to documents related 5 to contracts with public entities that are not otherwise expressly 6 confidential as to that public entity.

7 (F) For purposes of this paragraph, "fully executed" means the 8 point in time when all of the necessary parties to the contract have 9 signed the contract.

10 This section does not prevent any agency from opening its 11 records concerning the administration of the agency to public 12 inspection, unless disclosure is otherwise prohibited by law.

This section does not prevent any health facility from disclosing
to a certified bargaining agent relevant financing information
pursuant to Section 8 of the National Labor Relations Act (29
U.S.C. Sec. 158).

(ae) Any audio or video recording that depicts the death or
serious bodily injury of a peace officer.

19 SEC. 2. The Legislature finds and declares that Section 1 of this act, which amends Section 6254 of the Government Code, 20 21 imposes a limitation on the public's right of access to the meetings 22 of public bodies or the writings of public officials and agencies 23 within the meaning of Section 3 of Article I of the California 24 Constitution. Pursuant to that constitutional provision, the 25 Legislature makes the following findings to demonstrate the interest 26 protected by this limitation and the need for protecting that interest: 27 In order to ensure the privacy of victims, witnesses, and other 28 persons involved in law enforcement complaints and investigations, 29 related audio or video recordings should not be disclosed. 30 Furthermore, to protect the public from graphic sounds and images 31 that may be contained in an audio or video recording depicting the 32 death or serious bodily injury of a peace officer, such a recording 33 should not be disclosed, thus it is necessary that this act take effect.

SEC. 3. The Legislature finds and declares that Section 1 of
this act, which amends Section 6254 of the Government Code,
furthers, within the meaning of paragraph (7) of subdivision (b)
of Section 3 of Article I of the California Constitution, the purposes
of that constitutional section as it relates to the right of public

access to the meetings of local public bodies or the writings oflocal public officials and local agencies. Pursuant to paragraph (7)

- 1 of subdivision (b) of Section 3 of Article I of the California
- 2 Constitution, the Legislature makes the following findings:
- 3 Because the California Public Records Act balances access to
- 4 information with the legitimate need of law enforcement to
- 5 maintain confidential investigatory or security files, the act furthers
- 6 the purpose of Section 3 of Article I of the California Constitution.
- 7 SEC. 4. No reimbursement is required by this act pursuant to
- 8 Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution because
- 9 the only costs that may be incurred by a local agency or school
- 10 district under this act would result from a legislative mandate that
- 11 is within the scope of paragraph (7) of subdivision (b) of Section
- 12 3 of Article I of the California Constitution.

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
