An act to amend Sections 25100 and 25102 of the Corporations Code, relating to securities.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 577, as amended, Hueso. Securities: qualification: exemptions. Existing law, the Corporate Securities Law of 1968, requires the offer and sale of securities in the state to be qualified with the Commissioner of Business Oversight, unless exempt. That law exempts specific securities or transactions from qualification, including, among others, any shares or memberships issued by a consumer cooperative corporation, provided the aggregate investment of any shareholder or member does not exceed \$300.

This bill would increase the aggregate investment amount for the exemption for qualification of shares or memberships in a consumer cooperative corporation from \$300 to \$1,000. The bill would exempt from qualification the offer or sale of a portion of a future crop, animal production, or both, of a community-supported agriculture program, as defined, provided that the aggregate purchase by a natural person does not exceed \$1,000. The bill would exempt from qualification the offer or sale of evidence of indebtedness, whether secured or unsecured, any security in a transaction that meets specified requirements that include, among others, that the aggregate amount sold to all investors within 12 months does not exceed \$100,000 or \$500,000, or a percentage of the amounts raised by the offering be allocated to acquiring either an interest in real property used for agricultural purposes or to purchase solar

photovoltaic panels, wind turbines, and related equipment. The bill would authorize the commissioner to by rule require specified issuers to file a notice of transaction, and if the issuer fails to file that notice, to pay a specified fee to the commissioner. The bill would change references throughout these provisions from husband and wife to spouses, generally.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 25100 of the Corporations Code is 2 amended to read:

3 25100. The following securities are exempted from Sections4 25110, 25120, and 25130:

5 (a) Any security (including a revenue obligation) issued or 6 guaranteed by the United States, any state, any city, county, city 7 and county, public district, public authority, public corporation, 8 public entity, or political subdivision of a state or any agency or 9 corporate or other instrumentality of any one or more of the 10 foregoing; or any certificate of deposit for any of the foregoing.

(b) Any security issued or guaranteed by Canada, any Canadian
province, any political subdivision or municipality of that province,
or by any other foreign government with which the United States
currently maintains diplomatic relations, if the security is
recognized as a valid obligation by the issuer or guarantor; or any
certificate of deposit for any of the foregoing.

(c) Any security issued or guaranteed by and representing an
interest in or a direct obligation of a national bank or a bank or
trust company incorporated under the laws of this state, and any
security issued by a bank to one or more other banks and
representing an interest in an asset of the issuing bank.

(d) Any security issued or guaranteed by a federal savings
association or federal savings bank or federal land bank or joint
land bank or national farm loan association or by any savings
association, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 5102 of the
Financial Code, which is subject to the supervision and regulation
of the Commissioner of Business Oversight of this state.

28 (e) Any security (other than an interest in all or portions of a 29 parcel or parcels of real property which are subdivided land or a

1 subdivision or in a real estate development), the issuance of which

2 is subject to authorization by the Insurance Commissioner, the

3 Public Utilities Commission, or the Real Estate Commissioner of

4 this state.

5 (f) Any security consisting of any interest in all or portions of 6 a parcel or parcels of real property that are subdivided lands or a 7 subdivision or in a real estate development; provided that the 8 exemption in this subdivision shall not be applicable to: (1) any 9 investment contract sold or offered for sale with, or as part of, that 10 interest, or (2) any person engaged in the business of selling, 11 distributing, or supplying water for irrigation purposes or domestic 12 use that is not a public utility except that the exemption is applicable to any security of a mutual water company (other than 13 14 an investment contract as described in paragraph (1)) offered or 15 sold in connection with subdivided lands pursuant to Chapter 2 16 (commencing with Section 14310) of Part 7 of Division 3 of Title

17 1.

(g) Any mutual capital certificates or savings accounts, as
defined in the Savings Association Law, issued by a savings
association, as defined by subdivision (a) of Section 5102 of the
Financial Code, and holding a license or certificate of authority
then in force from the Commissioner of Business Oversight of this
state.

(h) Any security issued or guaranteed by any federal credit
union, or by any credit union organized and supervised, or
regulated, under the Credit Union Law.

27 (i) Any security issued or guaranteed by any railroad, other 28 common carrier, public utility, or public utility holding company 29 which is (1) subject to the jurisdiction of the Interstate Commerce 30 Commission or its successor or (2) a holding company registered 31 with the Securities and Exchange Commission under the Public 32 Utility Holding Company Act of 1935 or a subsidiary of that 33 company within the meaning of that act or (3) regulated in respect 34 of the issuance or guarantee of the security by a governmental 35 authority of the United States, of any state, of Canada or of any 36 Canadian province; and the security is subject to registration with 37 or authorization of issuance by that authority.

38 (j) Any security (except evidences of indebtedness, whether 39 interest bearing or not) of an issuer (1) organized exclusively for

40 educational, benevolent, fraternal, religious, charitable, social, or

reformatory purposes and not for pecuniary profit, if no part of the 1 2 net earnings of the issuer inures to the benefit of any private 3 shareholder or individual, or (2) organized as a chamber of 4 commerce or trade or professional association. The fact that 5 amounts received from memberships or dues or both will or may 6 be used to construct or otherwise acquire facilities for use by 7 members of the nonprofit organization does not disqualify the 8 organization for this exemption. This exemption does not apply 9 to the securities of any nonprofit organization if any promoter 10 thereof expects or intends to make a profit directly or indirectly 11 from any business or activity associated with the organization or 12 operation of that nonprofit organization or from remuneration 13 received from that nonprofit organization.

(k) Any agreement, commonly known as a "life income 14 15 contract," of an issuer (1) organized exclusively for educational, benevolent, fraternal, religious, charitable, social, or reformatory 16 17 purposes and not for pecuniary profit and (2) which the commissioner designates by rule or order, with a donor in 18 19 consideration of a donation of property to that issuer and providing for the payment to the donor or persons designated by him or her 20 21 of income or specified periodic payments from the donated 22 property or other property for the life of the donor or those other 23 persons.

24 (*l*) Any note, draft, bill of exchange, or banker's acceptance 25 which is freely transferable and of prime quality, arises out of a 26 current transaction or the proceeds of which have been or are to 27 be used for current transactions, and which evidences an obligation 28 to pay cash within nine months of the date of issuance, exclusive 29 of days of grace, or any renewal of that paper which is likewise 30 limited, or any guarantee of that paper or of that renewal, provided 31 that the paper is not offered to the public in amounts of less than 32 twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) in the aggregate to any one 33 purchaser. In addition, the commissioner may, by rule or order, 34 exempt any issuer of any notes, drafts, bills of exchange or banker's 35 acceptances from qualification of those securities when the 36 commissioner finds that the qualification is not necessary or 37 appropriate in the public interest or for the protection of investors. 38 (m) Any security issued by any corporation organized and 39 existing under the provisions of Chapter 1 (commencing with 40 Section 54001) of Division 20 of the Food and Agricultural Code.

1 (n) Any beneficial interest in an employees' pension. 2 profit-sharing, stock bonus or similar benefit plan which meets the 3 requirements for qualification under Section 401 of the federal 4 Internal Revenue Code or any statute amendatory thereof or 5 supplementary thereto. A determination letter from the Internal 6 Revenue Service stating that an employees' pension, profit-sharing, 7 stock bonus or similar benefit plan meets those requirements shall be conclusive evidence that the plan is an employees' pension, 8 9 profit-sharing, stock bonus or similar benefit plan within the 10 meaning of the first sentence of this subdivision until the date the 11 determination letter is revoked in writing by the Internal Revenue 12 Service, regardless of whether or not the revocation is retroactive. 13 (o) Any security listed or approved for listing upon notice of 14 issuance on a national securities exchange, if the exchange has

14 issuance on a national securities exchange, if the exchange has 15 been certified by rule or order of the commissioner and any warrant 16 or right to purchase or subscribe to the security. The exemption 17 afforded by this subdivision does not apply to securities listed or 18 approved for listing upon notice of issuance on a national securities 19 exchange, in a rollup transaction unless the rollup transaction is 20 an eligible rollup transaction as defined in Section 25014.7.

21 That certification of any exchange shall be made by the 22 commissioner upon the written request of the exchange if the 23 commissioner finds that the exchange, in acting on applications 24 for listing of common stock, substantially applies the minimum 25 standards set forth in either subparagraph (A) or (B) of paragraph 26 (1), and, in considering suspension or removal from listing, 27 substantially applies each of the criteria set forth in paragraph (2). 28 (1) Listing standards:

29 (A) (i) Shareholders' equity of at least four million dollars30 (\$4,000,000).

(ii) Pretax income of at least seven hundred fifty thousand
dollars (\$750,000) in the issuer's last fiscal year or in two of its
last three fiscal years.

(iii) Minimum public distribution of 500,000 shares (exclusive
of the holdings of officers, directors, controlling shareholders, and
other concentrated or family holdings), together with a minimum
of 800 public holders or minimum public distribution of 1,000,000
shares together with a minimum of 400 public holders. The
exchange may also consider the listing of a company's securities
if the company has a minimum of 500,000 shares publicly held, a

minimum of 400 shareholders and daily trading volume in the 1 2 issue has been approximately 2,000 shares or more for the six 3 months preceding the date of application. In evaluating the 4 suitability of an issue for listing under this trading provision, the 5 exchange shall review the nature and frequency of that activity and any other factors as it may determine to be relevant in 6 7 ascertaining whether the issue is suitable for trading. A security 8 that trades infrequently shall not be considered for listing under 9 this paragraph even though average daily volume amounts to 2,000 10 shares per day or more.

11 Companies whose securities are concentrated in a limited 12 geographical area, or whose securities are largely held in block by 13 institutional investors, normally may not be considered eligible 14 for listing unless the public distribution appreciably exceeds 15 500,000 shares.

(iv) Minimum price of three dollars (\$3) per share for a
reasonable period of time prior to the filing of a listing application;
provided, however, in certain instances an exchange may favorably
consider listing an issue selling for less than three dollars (\$3) per
share after considering all pertinent factors, including market

21 conditions in general, whether historically the issue has sold above

- three dollars (\$3) per share, the applicant's capitalization, and the number of outstanding and publicly held shares of the issue.
- (v) An aggregate market value for publicly held shares of atleast three million dollars (\$3,000,000).
- 26 (B) (i) Shareholders' equity of at least four million dollars 27 (\$4,000,000).
- (ii) Minimum public distribution set forth in clause (iii) ofsubparagraph (A) of paragraph (1).
- 30 (iii) Operating history of at least three years.
- 31 (iv) An aggregate market value for publicly held shares of at
 32 least fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000).
- 33 (2) Criteria for consideration of suspension or removal from34 listing:
- (i) If a company that (A) has shareholders' equity of less than
 one million dollars (\$1,000,000) has sustained net losses in each
 of its two most recent fiscal years, or (B) has net tangible assets
- 38 of less than three million dollars (\$3,000,000) and has sustained
- 39 net losses in three of its four most recent fiscal years.
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(ii) If the number of shares publicly held (excluding the holdings
 of officers, directors, controlling shareholders and other
 concentrated or family holdings) is less than 150,000.

4 (iii) If the total number of shareholders is less than 400 or if the 5 number of shareholders of lots of 100 shares or more is less than 6 300.

7 (iv) If the aggregate market value of shares publicly held is less8 than seven hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000).

9 (v) If shares of common stock sell at a price of less than three 10 dollars (\$3) per share for a substantial period of time and the issuer 11 shall fail to effectuate a reverse stock split of the shares within a 12 reasonable period of time after being requested by the exchange 13 to take that action.

14 A national securities exchange, certified by rule or order of the 15 commissioner under this subdivision, shall file annual reports when 16 requested to do so by the commissioner. The annual reports shall 17 contain, by issuer: the variances granted to an exchange's listing 18 standards, including variances from corporate governance and 19 voting rights' standards, for any security of that issuer; the reasons 20 for the variances; a discussion of the review procedure instituted 21 by the exchange to determine the effect of the variances on 22 investors and whether the variances should be continued; and any 23 other information that the commissioner deems relevant. The 24 purpose of these reports is to assist the commissioner in 25 determining whether the quantitative and qualitative requirements 26 of this subdivision are substantially being met by the exchange in 27 general or with regard to any particular security.

The commissioner after appropriate notice and opportunity for hearing in accordance with the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act, Chapter 5 (commencing with Section 11500) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, may, in his or her discretion, by rule or order, decertify any exchange previously certified that ceases substantially to apply the minimum

34 standards or criteria as set forth in paragraphs (1) and (2).

A rule or order of certification shall conclusively establish that
any security listed or approved for listing upon notice of issuance
on any exchange named in a rule or order of certification, and any
warrant or right to purchase or subscribe to that security, is exempt

39 under this subdivision until the adoption by the commissioner of

40 any rule or order decertifying the exchange.

1 (p) A promissory note secured by a lien on real property, which 2 is neither one of a series of notes of equal priority secured by 3 interests in the same real property nor a note in which beneficial

4 interests are sold to more than one person or entity.

5 (q) Any unincorporated interindemnity or reciprocal or interinsurance contract, that qualifies under the provisions of 6 7 Section 1280.7 of the Insurance Code, between members of a 8 cooperative corporation, organized and operating under Part 2 9 (commencing with Section 12200) of Division 3 of Title 1, and whose members consist only of physicians and surgeons licensed 10 in California, which contracts indemnify solely in respect to 11 12 medical malpractice claims against the members, and which do 13 not collect in advance of loss any moneys other than contributions 14 by each member to a collective reserve trust fund or for necessary 15 expenses of administration.

16 (1) Whenever it appears to the commissioner that any person 17 has engaged or is about to engage in any act or practice constituting a violation of any provision of Section 1280.7 of the Insurance 18 19 Code, the commissioner may, in the commissioner's discretion, 20 bring an action in the name of the people of the State of California 21 in the superior court to enjoin the acts or practices or to enforce 22 compliance with Section 1280.7 of the Insurance Code. Upon a 23 proper showing a permanent or preliminary injunction, a restraining 24 order, or a writ of mandate shall be granted and a receiver or 25 conservator may be appointed for the defendant or the defendant's 26 assets. 27 (2) The commissioner may, in the commissioner's discretion,

(A) make public or private investigations within or outside of this
state as the commissioner deems necessary to determine whether
any person has violated or is about to violate any provision of
Section 1280.7 of the Insurance Code or to aid in the enforcement
of Section 1280.7, and (B) publish information concerning the
violation of Section 1280.7.

(3) For the purpose of any investigation or proceeding under
this section, the commissioner or any officer designated by the
commissioner may administer oaths and affirmations, subpoena
witnesses, compel their attendance, take evidence, and require the
production of any books, papers, correspondence, memoranda,
agreements, or other documents or records which the commissioner
deems relevant or material to the inquiry.

1 (4) In case of contumacy by, or refusal to obey a subpoena 2 issued to, any person, the superior court, upon application by the 3 commissioner, may issue to the person an order requiring the 4 person to appear before the commissioner, or the officer designated 5 by the commissioner, to produce documentary evidence, if so 6 ordered, or to give evidence touching the matter under investigation 7 or in question. Failure to obey the order of the court may be 8 punished by the court as a contempt.

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9 (5) No person is excused from attending or testifying or from 10 producing any document or record before the commissioner or in 11 obedience to the subpoena of the commissioner or any officer 12 designated by the commissioner, or in any proceeding instituted 13 by the commissioner, on the ground that the testimony or evidence (documentary or otherwise), required of the person may tend to 14 15 incriminate the person or subject the person to a penalty or 16 forfeiture, but no individual may be prosecuted or subjected to any 17 penalty or forfeiture for or on account of any transaction, matter, 18 or thing concerning which the person is compelled, after validly 19 claiming the privilege against self-incrimination, to testify or 20 produce evidence (documentary or otherwise), except that the 21 individual testifying is not exempt from prosecution and 22 punishment for perjury or contempt committed in testifying.

23 (6) The cost of any review, examination, audit, or investigation 24 made by the commissioner under Section 1280.7 of the Insurance 25 Code shall be paid to the commissioner by the person subject to the review, examination, audit, or investigation, and the 26 27 commissioner may maintain an action for the recovery of these 28 costs in any court of competent jurisdiction. In determining the 29 cost, the commissioner may use the actual amount of the salary or 30 other compensation paid to the persons making the review, 31 examination, audit, or investigation plus the actual amount of 32 expenses including overhead reasonably incurred in the 33 performance of the work.

The recoverable cost of each review, examination, audit, or investigation made by the commissioner under Section 1280.7 of the Insurance Code shall not exceed twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), except that costs exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) shall be recoverable if the costs are necessary to prevent a violation of any provision of Section 1280.7 of the Insurance Code.

1 (r) Any shares or memberships issued by any corporation 2 organized and existing pursuant to the provisions of Part 2 3 (commencing with Section 12200) of Division 3 of Title 1, 4 provided the aggregate investment of any shareholder or member 5 in shares or memberships sold pursuant to this subdivision does not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000). This exemption does 6 7 not apply to the shares or memberships of that corporation if any 8 promoter thereof expects or intends to make a profit directly or 9 indirectly from any business or activity associated with the corporation or the operation of the corporation or from 10 remuneration, other than reasonable salary, received from the 11 12 corporation. This exemption does not apply to nonvoting shares 13 or memberships of that corporation issued to any person who does 14 not possess, and who will not acquire in connection with the 15 issuance of nonvoting shares or memberships, voting power (Section 12253) in the corporation. This exemption also does not 16 17 apply to shares or memberships issued by a nonprofit cooperative 18 corporation organized to facilitate the creation of an unincorporated 19 interindemnity arrangement that provides indemnification for 20 medical malpractice to its physician and surgeon members as set 21 forth in subdivision (q).

(s) Any security consisting of or representing an interest in a
 pool of mortgage loans that meets each of the following
 requirements:

25 (1) The pool consists of whole mortgage loans or participation 26 interests in those loans, which loans were originated or acquired 27 in the ordinary course of business by a national bank or federal 28 savings association or federal savings bank having its principal 29 office in this state, by a bank incorporated under the laws of this 30 state or by a savings association as defined in subdivision (a) of 31 Section 5102 of the Financial Code and which is subject to the 32 supervision and regulation of the Commissioner of Financial Institutions, and each of which at the time of transfer to the pool 33 34 is an authorized investment for the originating or acquiring 35 institution.

36 (2) The pool of mortgage loans is held in trust by a trustee which
37 is a financial institution specified in paragraph (1) as trustee or
38 otherwise.

39 (3) The loans are serviced by a financial institution specified in40 paragraph (1).

1 (4) The security is not offered in amounts of less than 2 twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) in the aggregate to any one 3 purchaser.

4 (5) The security is offered pursuant to a registration under the 5 Securities Act of 1933, or pursuant to an exemption under 6 Regulation A under that act, or in the opinion of counsel for the 7 issuer, is offered pursuant to an exemption under Section 4(2) of 8 that act.

9 (t) (1) Any security issued or guaranteed by and representing 10 an interest in or a direct obligation of an industrial loan company 11 incorporated under the laws of the state and authorized by the

12 Commissioner of Financial Institutions to engage in industrial loan13 business.

(2) Any investment certificate in or issued by any industrial
loan company that is organized under the laws of a state of the
United States other than this state, that is insured by the Federal
Deposit Insurance Corporation, and that maintains a branch office
in this state.

19 SEC. 2. Section 25102 of the Corporations Code is amended 20 to read:

21 25102. The following transactions are exempted from the22 provisions of Section 25110:

23 (a) Any offer (but not a sale) not involving any public offering 24 and the execution and delivery of any agreement for the sale of securities pursuant to the offer if (1) the agreement contains 25 26 substantially the following provision: "The sale of the securities 27 that are the subject of this agreement has not been qualified with 28 the Commissioner of Corporations of the State of California and 29 the issuance of the securities or the payment or receipt of any part 30 of the consideration therefor prior to the qualification is unlawful, 31 unless the sale of securities is exempt from the qualification by 32 Section 25100, 25102, or 25105 of the California Corporations 33 Code. The rights of all parties to this agreement are expressly 34 conditioned upon the qualification being obtained, unless the sale is so exempt"; and (2) no part of the purchase price is paid or 35 received and none of the securities are issued until the sale of the 36 37 securities is qualified under this law unless the sale of securities 38 is exempt from the qualification by this section, Section 25100,

39 or 25105.

1 (b) Any offer (but not a sale) of a security for which a 2 registration statement has been filed under the Securities Act of 3 1933 but has not yet become effective, or for which an offering 4 statement under Regulation A has been filed but has not yet been 5 qualified, if no stop order or refusal order is in effect and no public proceeding or examination looking towards an order is pending 6 7 under Section 8 of the act and no order under Section 25140 or 8 subdivision (a) of Section 25143 is in effect under this law.

9 (c) Any offer (but not a sale) and the execution and delivery of 10 any agreement for the sale of securities pursuant to the offer as 11 may be permitted by the commissioner upon application. Any 12 negotiating permit under this subdivision shall be conditioned to 13 the effect that none of the securities may be issued and none of 14 the consideration therefor may be received or accepted until the 15 sale of the securities is qualified under this law.

16 (d) Any transaction or agreement between the issuer and an 17 underwriter or among underwriters if the sale of the securities is 18 qualified, or exempt from qualification, at the time of distribution 19 thereof in this state, if any.

(e) Any offer or sale of any evidence of indebtedness, whether
secured or unsecured, and any guarantee thereof, in a transaction
not involving any public offering.

(f) Any offer or sale of any security in a transaction (other than
an offer or sale to a pension or profit-sharing trust of the issuer)
that meets each of the following criteria:

26 (1) Sales of the security are not made to more than 35 persons,27 including persons not in this state.

28 (2) All purchasers either have a preexisting personal or business relationship with the offeror or any of its partners, officers, 29 30 directors or controlling persons, or managers (as appointed or 31 elected by the members) if the offeror is a limited liability 32 company, or by reason of their business or financial experience or the business or financial experience of their professional advisers 33 34 who are unaffiliated with and who are not compensated by the 35 issuer or any affiliate or selling agent of the issuer, directly or 36 indirectly, could be reasonably assumed to have the capacity to 37 protect their own interests in connection with the transaction.

38 (3) Each purchaser represents that the purchaser is purchasing 39 for the purchaser's own account (or a trust account if the purchaser 1 is a trustee) and not with a view to or for sale in connection with2 any distribution of the security.

3 (4) The offer and sale of the security is not accomplished by 4 the publication of any advertisement. The number of purchasers 5 referred to above is exclusive of any described in subdivision (i), 6 any officer, director, or affiliate of the issuer, or manager (as 7 appointed or elected by the members) if the issuer is a limited 8 liability company, and any other purchaser who the commissioner 9 designates by rule. For purposes of this section, spouses (together 10 with any custodian or trustee acting for the account of their minor 11 children) are counted as one person and a partnership, corporation, 12 or other organization that was not specifically formed for the 13 purpose of purchasing the security offered in reliance upon this 14 exemption, is counted as one person. been given, paid, or incurred in connection therewith.

4 (2) The consideration to be received by the issuer for the stock 5 to be issued consists of any of the following:

(A) Only assets (which may include cash) of an existing business 6 enterprise transferred to the issuer upon its initial organization, of 7 8 which all of the persons who are to receive the stock to be issued 9 pursuant to this exemption were owners during, and the enterprise was operated for, a period of not less than one year immediately 10 preceding the proposed issuance, and the ownership of the 11 12 enterprise immediately prior to the proposed issuance was in the

13 same proportions as the shares of stock are to be issued.

14 (B) Only cash or cancellation of indebtedness for money 15 borrowed, or both, upon the initial organization of the issuer, provided all of the stock is issued for the same price per share. 16

17 (C) Only cash, provided the sale is approved in writing by each 18 of the existing shareholders and the purchaser or purchasers are 19 existing shareholders.

(D) In a case where after the proposed issuance there will be 20 21 only one owner of the stock of the issuer, only any legal 22 consideration.

23 (3) No promotional consideration has been given, paid, or incurred in connection with the issuance. Promotional consideration 24 25 means any consideration paid directly or indirectly to a person 26 who, acting alone or in conjunction with one or more other persons, 27 takes the initiative in founding and organizing the business or 28 enterprise of an issuer for services rendered in connection with the 29 founding or organizing.

30 (4) A notice in a form prescribed by rule of the commissioner, 31 signed by an active member of the State Bar of California, is filed 32 with or mailed for filing to the commissioner not later than 10 business days after receipt of consideration for the securities by 33 34 the issuer. That notice shall contain an opinion of the member of 35 the State Bar of California that the exemption provided by this subdivision is available for the offer and sale of the securities. The 36 37 failure to file the notice as required by this subdivision and the 38 rules of the commissioner shall not affect the availability of this 39 exemption. An issuer who fails to file the notice within the time 40 specified by this subdivision shall, within 15 business days after

1 discovery of the failure to file the notice or after demand by the 2 commissioner, whichever occurs first, file the notice and pay to 3 the commissioner a fee equal to the fee payable had the transaction 4 been qualified under Section 25110. The notice, except when filed 5 on behalf of a California corporation, shall be accompanied by an 6 irrevocable consent, in the form that the commissioner by rule 7 prescribes, appointing the commissioner or his or her successor in 8 office to be the issuer's attorney to receive service of any lawful 9 process in any noncriminal suit, action, or proceeding against it 10 or its successor that arises under this law or any rule or order 11 hereunder after the consent has been filed, with the same force and 12 validity as if served personally on the issuer. An issuer on whose 13 behalf a consent has been filed in connection with a previous 14 qualification or exemption from qualification under this law (or 15 application for a permit under any prior law if the application or 16 notice under this law states that the consent is still effective) need 17 not file another. Service may be made by leaving a copy of the 18 process in the office of the commissioner, but it is not effective 19 unless (A) the plaintiff, who may be the commissioner in a suit, 20 action, or proceeding instituted by him or her, forthwith sends 21 notice of the service and a copy of the process by registered or 22 certified mail to the defendant or respondent at its last address on 23 file with the commissioner, and (B) the plaintiff's affidavit of 24 compliance with this section is filed in the case on or before the 25 return day of the process, if any, or within the further time as the 26 court allows.

(5) Each purchaser represents that the purchaser is purchasing
for the purchaser's own account, or a trust account if the purchaser
is a trustee, and not with a view to or for sale in connection with
any distribution of the stock.

For the purposes of this subdivision, all securities held by spouses, whether or not jointly, shall be considered to be owned by one person, and all securities held by a corporation that has issued stock pursuant to this exemption shall be considered to be held by the shareholders to whom it has issued the stock.

All stock issued by a corporation pursuant to this subdivision as it existed prior to the effective date of the amendments to this section made during the 1996 portion of the 1995–96 Regular Session that required the issuer to have stamped or printed prominently on the face of the stock certificate a legend in a form

1 prescribed by rule of the commissioner restricting transfer of the

stock in a manner provided for by that rule shall not be subject to 2

3 the transfer restriction legend requirement and, by operation of 4

law, the corporation is authorized to remove that transfer restriction

5 legend from the certificates of those shares of stock issued by the

6 corporation pursuant to this subdivision as it existed prior to the 7

effective date of the amendments to this section made during the 8 1996 portion of the 1995–96 Regular Session.

9 (i) Any offer or sale (1) to a bank, savings and loan association, 10 trust company, insurance company, investment company registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, pension or 11 12 profit-sharing trust (other than a pension or profit-sharing trust of 13 the issuer, a self-employed individual retirement plan, or individual 14 retirement account), or other institutional investor or governmental 15 agency or instrumentality that the commissioner may designate by rule, whether the purchaser is acting for itself or as trustee, or 16 17 (2) to any corporation with outstanding securities registered under 18 Section 12 of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 or any wholly 19 owned subsidiary of the corporation that after the offer and sale will own directly or indirectly 100 percent of the outstanding 20 21 capital stock of the issuer, provided the purchaser represents that 22 it is purchasing for its own account (or for the trust account) for 23 investment and not with a view to or for sale in connection with

24 any distribution of the security.

25 (i) Any offer or sale of any certificate of interest or participation 26 in an oil or gas title or lease (including subsurface gas storage and 27 payments out of production) if either of the following apply:

28 (1) All of the purchasers meet one of the following requirements:

29 (A) Are and have been during the preceding two years engaged 30 primarily in the business of drilling for, producing, or refining oil 31 or gas (or whose corporate predecessor, in the case of a corporation,

32 has been so engaged).

33 (B) Are persons described in paragraph (1) of subdivision (i).

34 (C) Have been found by the commissioner upon written 35 application to be substantially engaged in the business of drilling 36 for, producing, or refining oil or gas so as not to require the 37 protection provided by this law (which finding shall be effective 38 until rescinded).

39 (2) The security is concurrently hypothecated to a bank in the 40 ordinary course of business to secure a loan made by the bank,

1 provided that each purchaser represents that it is purchasing for 2 its own account for investment and not with a view to or for sale

4 (k) Any offer or sale of any security under, or pursuant to, a 5 plan of reorganization under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy 6 law that has been confirmed or is subject to confirmation by the 7 decree or order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

(*l*) Any offer or sale of an option, warrant, put, call, or straddle,
and any guarantee of any of these securities, by a person who is
not the issuer of the security subject to the right, if the transaction,
had it involved an offer or sale of the security subject to the right
by the person, would not have violated Section 25110 or 25130.

13 (m) Any offer or sale of a stock to a pension, profit-sharing, 14 stock bonus, or employee stock ownership plan, provided that (1) 15 the plan meets the requirements for qualification under Section 16 401 of the Internal Revenue Code, and (2) the employees are not 17 required or permitted individually to make any contributions to 18 the plan. The exemption provided by this subdivision shall not be 19 affected by whether the stock is contributed to the plan, purchased 20 from the issuer with contributions by the issuer or an affiliate of 21 the issuer, or purchased from the issuer with funds borrowed from 22 the issuer, an affiliate of the issuer, or any other lender.

(n) Any offer or sale of any security in a transaction, other than

17 (E) With respect to the offer and sale of one class of voting 18 common stock of an issuer or of preferred stock of an issuer entitling the holder thereof to at least the same voting rights as the 19 issuer's one class of voting common stock, provided that the issuer 20 21 has only one-class voting common stock outstanding upon 22 consummation of the offer and sale, a natural person who, either 23 individually or jointly with the person's spouse, (i) has a minimum net worth of two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) and 24 25 had, during the immediately preceding tax year, gross income in 26 excess of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) and reasonably 27 expects gross income in excess of one hundred thousand dollars 28 (\$100,000) during the current tax year or (ii) has a minimum net 29 worth of five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000). "Net worth" 30 shall be determined exclusive of home, home furnishings, and 31 automobiles. Other assets included in the computation of net worth 32 may be valued at fair market value. 33 Each natural person specified above, by reason of his or her

business or financial experience, or the business or financial experience of his or her professional adviser, who is unaffiliated with and who is not compensated, directly or indirectly, by the issuer or any affiliate or selling agent of the issuer, can be reasonably assumed to have the capacity to protect his or her interests in connection with the transaction. The amount of the investment of each natural person shall not exceed 10 percent of

9 (4) Each natural person purchaser, including a corporation, 10 partnership, or other organization specifically formed by natural persons for the purpose of acquiring the securities offered by the 11 12 issuer, receives, at least five business days before securities are 13 sold to, or a commitment to purchase is accepted from, the 14 purchaser, a written offering disclosure statement that shall meet 15 the disclosure requirements of Regulation D (17 C.F.R. 230.501 16 et seq.), and any other information as may be prescribed by rule 17 of the commissioner, provided that the issuer shall not be obligated 18 pursuant to this paragraph to provide this disclosure statement to 19 a natural person qualified under Section 260.102.13 of Title 10 of 20 the California Code of Regulations. The offer or sale of securities 21 pursuant to a disclosure statement required by this paragraph that 22 is in violation of Section 25401, or that fails to meet the disclosure 23 requirements of Regulation D (17 C.F.R. 230.501 et seq.), shall 24 not render unavailable to the issuer the claim of an exemption from 25 Section 25110 afforded by this subdivision. This paragraph does

not impose, directly or indirectly, any additional disclosure
obligation with respect to any other exemption from qualification

28 available under any other provision of this section.

(5) (A) A general announcement of proposed offering may be
published by written document only, provided that the general
announcement of proposed offering sets forth the following
required information:
