LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 1284, as amended, Committee on Judiciary. Courts: personnel.

(1) Existing law specifies the number, compensation, and classification of court personnel in specified counties.

This bill would revise the number, compensation, and classification of specified court personnel in Alameda, Contra Costa, El Dorado, Fresno, Imperial, Kern, Kings, Nevada, Orange, San Joaquin, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Shasta,

Stanislaus, Tulare, and Ventura Counties, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program by requiring a higher level of service of existing local agencies.

~~(2) The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement, including the creation of a State Mandates Claims Fund to pay the costs of mandates that do not exceed \$1,000,000 statewide and other procedures for claims whose statewide costs exceed \$1,000,000.~~

~~This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to these statutory provisions:~~

~~(2) The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.~~

~~This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.~~

 14 The references to a numbered salary range in this
 15 section are to the salary schedule in the Personnel and
 16 Salary Resolution of the County of Orange.

17 All personnel appointed pursuant to this section shall
 18 serve at the pleasure of the majority of the judges and may
 19 at any time be removed by the majority of the judges in
 20 their discretion or of the Superior Court Executive
 21 Officer when so delegated.

22 With the approval of the board of supervisors, the
 23 superior court may establish any additional positions,
 24 titles and pay rates as are required, and may appoint and
 25 employ any additional commissioners, officers, assistants,
 26 and other employees it deems necessary for the
 27 performance of the duties and exercise of the powers
 28 conferred by law upon the court and its members. Rates
 29 of compensation of all officers, assistants, and other
 30 employees authorized by this section, except those of
 31 court commissioners, may be adjusted by joint action and
 32 approval of the board of supervisors and a majority of the
 33 judges of the court, the Superior Court Executive
 34 Committee or the Superior Court Executive Officer
 35 when so delegated.

36 All court personnel shall be entitled to any step
 37 advancement, vacation, sick leave, holiday benefits, other
 38 leaves of absence, lump-sum payments for sick leave and
 39 vacation when separated from the service, inclusion in
 40 the retirement system of the County of Orange and other



1 benefits as may be adopted in a memorandum of
2 understanding with a recognized employee organization
3 or as may be directed by rules adopted by a majority of
4 the judges as are provided to county employees of the
5 county.

6 Superior court commissioners shall be entitled to any
7 benefits as may be directed by rules adopted by the
8 majority of the judges.

9 Where statutes require implementation by local
10 ordinances for the extension of benefits to local officers
11 and employees, these benefits may be made applicable,
12 by rule, to those employees.

13 Rules of the court may include other matters
14 pertaining to the general administration of the court,
15 including conditions of employment of personnel. When
16 the rules are adopted by a majority of the judges and filed
17 with the Judicial Council they shall have the same status
18 as other rules of court adopted pursuant to Section 68070.

19 When requested to do so by the court, the county shall
20 furnish to the superior court any services as may be
21 required in connection with the recruitment and
22 employment of personnel.

23 All such personnel and judges shall be allowed actual
24 traveling and necessary expenses incurred while engaged
25 in the duties of their employment or office outside of the
26 county.

27 SEC. 2. Section 70046.2 of the Government Code is
28 amended to read:

29 70046.2. In Fresno County, each reporter shall be paid
30 an annual salary established according to the following
31 salary schedule:

- 32 Step 1. \$42,130
- 33 Step 2. \$44,241
- 34 Step 3. \$46,431
- 35 Step 4. \$48,753

36 Reporters shall initially be placed at step 1 of the salary
37 schedule except reporters may be placed at a higher step
38 with the approval of the county administrative officer,
39 and shall advance one step annually upon the anniversary
40 date of the employment. If, because of recruitment



1 difficulties, it is necessary to appoint a court reporter at
2 a step of the salary schedule which is above the step at
3 which any court reporters are currently employed, all
4 court reporters below that step will move to the higher
5 step at the discretion of the judges of the court.

6 Each pro tempore reporter shall be paid one hundred
7 sixty-two dollars and four cents (\$162.04) for a full day on
8 duty under order of the court. For purposes of receiving
9 the above compensation, one or more of the following
10 shall apply:

11 (1) The court has indicated in advance that the pro
12 tempore assignment is for a full day.

13 (2) The pro tempore reporter, having accepted a
14 full-day assignment, has not voluntarily relinquished his
15 or her services at or before the end of four hours of
16 service.

17 (3) The pro tempore reporter was on duty for more
18 than four hours.

19 Each pro tempore reporter shall be paid one hundred
20 eight dollars and seven cents (\$108.07) for one-half day of
21 duty under order of the court when (a) the court has
22 indicated in advance that the pro tempore assignment is
23 for a half day and the pro tempore reporter is on duty for
24 four hours or less, generally exclusive of the noon recess;
25 or (b) the court has indicated in advance that the pro
26 tempore assignment is for a full day but the pro tempore
27 reporter is on duty for four hours or less and consents to
28 being released for the balance of the day.

29 Where a pro tempore reporter has agreed to a one-half
30 day assignment, the courts shall make every practicable
31 effort to assure that the pro tempore reporter shall not be
32 on duty for longer than four hours, unless the pro tempore
33 reporter agrees with the court to work beyond four hours.
34 In the latter case, the full-day pro tempore rate of one
35 hundred sixty-two dollars and four cents (\$162.04) shall
36 apply.

37 Nothing herein shall be construed to limit the court's
38 authority to in all instances pay a pro tempore reporter
39 at the rate of one hundred sixty-two dollars and four cents
40 (\$162.04) when, in the court's judgment, said rate is



1 necessary to obtain pro tempore reporter services for the
2 court.

3 In addition to the salary herein provided, each
4 regularly employed reporter shall accrue and be entitled
5 to receive sick leave benefits at the rate of 3.6924 hours of
6 sick leave with pay for each pay period or major fraction
7 thereof, served up to an accumulative total of 156 working
8 days. Each such reporter shall accrue and receive
9 vacation at the same rate as judges of such court not to
10 exceed 21 working days a year which may be accrued not
11 to exceed 42 days to be taken at such time as the judge to
12 which he *or she* has been assigned consents.

13 SEC. 3. Section 73075.2 is added to the Government
14 Code, to read:

15 73075.2. (a) Each of the municipal court districts
16 established in Alameda County shall have the number of
17 commissioners set out below opposite the name of the
18 judicial district:

32 receive a salary in accordance with Section 73089.1.
33 Commissioners shall be members of the Alameda County
34 Retirement System and receive and be entitled to the
35 same fringe benefits as provided to any other
36 management employee in the classified service of
37 Alameda County.

36 rates as are required and may appoint additional deputy
37 clerks, officers, assistants, and other employees as deemed
38 necessary for the powers conferred by law upon the court
39 and its members. Rates of compensation of the clerk and
40 administrative officers, deputy clerks, officers, assistants,



1 and other employees may be adjusted by joint action and
2 approval of the board of supervisors and the judges in
3 each respective municipal court within the county.

4 If the board of supervisors provides by ordinance or
5 resolution for any increase in the number or rate of
6 compensation of any municipal court personnel pursuant
7 to this section, that increase shall be effective only until
8 January 1, 1998, and shall be effective at the same time
9 and in the same manner as increases for Alameda County
10 employees generally.

11 SEC. 9. Section 73096 of the Government Code is
12 amended to read:

13 73096. Official reporters of municipal courts in
14 Alameda County, in lieu of any other compensation
15 provided by law for their services in reporting testimony
16 and proceedings in such court, shall receive one of the
17 following:

18 (a) Two hundred seven dollars and sixty-three cents
19 (\$207.63) a day for the days they actually are on duty
20 under order of the court.

21 (b) A minimum payment of one hundred three dollars
22 and eighty-two cents (\$103.82) for serving four hours or
23 less a day.

24 (c) Regular official court reporters shall receive a
25 salary, vacation leave, and sick leave, in the same amounts
26 as the official reporters of the Superior Court in Alameda
27 County as set forth in Alameda County Salary Ordinance
28 for item number classification 1625.

29 Rates of compensation of regular official reporters and
30 official reporters pro tempore may be adjusted by joint
31 action and approval of the board of supervisors and a

33 that any changes in compensation which are made

38 amended to read:

39 73348. (a) In Contra Costa County, the annual salary
40 of each regular official reporter shall be based on a



1 four-step salary plan with one-year increments. Effective
2 July 1, 1994, the four salary steps are as follows:

3 Step 1. Forty-six thousand six hundred thirty-two
4 dollars (\$46,632).

5 Step 2. Forty-eight thousand nine hundred sixty
6 dollars (\$48,960).

7 Step 3. Fifty-one thousand four hundred eight dollars
8 (\$51,408).

9 Step 4. Fifty-three thousand nine hundred
10 seventy-six dollars (\$53,976).

11 The step of entry to the above schedule shall be Step 1.
12 However, the judges of the court may appoint a court
13 reporter to a duly allocated exempt position at a higher
14 step if, in the opinion of the appointing judge, an
15 individual to be appointed has the experience and
16 qualifications to entitle that individual to the higher
17 initial step, and if the higher initial salary has the approval
18 of the presiding judge of the court and the board of
19 supervisors, but in no case may the initial salary be above
20 the third step of the salary range. Except as provided
21 below, official reporters shall advance to the next higher
22 step on the salary plan annually. The compensation of
23 each official reporter pro tempore shall be an amount
24 which is equivalent to 1.05 times the daily wage of the
25 fourth step in the salary range for full-time official
26 reporters in Contra Costa County for each day the
27 reporter actually is on duty under order of the court
28 which per diem rate shall apply when an official reporter
29 is appointed pursuant to Section 869 of the Penal Code.

30 Irrespective of the step of the salary range to which
31 initially appointed, an official court reporter shall be
32 eligible for advancement to the next higher step in the
33 salary range after six months' service, and thereafter shall
34 advance on the salary range based on annual reviews.

35 (b) During the hours which the court is open for the
36 transaction of judicial business, the regular official
37 reporter shall perform the duties required by law. When
38 not engaged in the performance of any other duty
39 imposed upon him or her by law, he or she shall render
40 stenographic or clerical assistance to the judge of the



1 court to which he or she is assigned as the judge may
2 direct.

3 (c) The board of supervisors shall adjust the salary of
4 regular official reporters as part of its regular review of
5 county employee compensation. The adjustment shall be
6 to that salary level closest to the average percentage
7 adjustment in basic salaries of the county classes of
8 superior court clerk, legal clerk, secretary, and clerk
9 (experienced level). The reporter salary adjustment shall
10 be effective on the same day as the effective date of the
11 board's action as to all of the aforesaid county
12 classifications, but for official reporters of each municipal
13 court district shall be effective only until January 1 of the
14 second year following the calendar year in which the
15 adjustment is made. The compensation of each official
16 reporter pro tempore shall remain at the rate specified in
17 subdivision (a) for the days he or she actually is on duty
18 until changed by the board of supervisors at the same
19 time and on the same basis as regular official reporters.

20 SEC. 11. Section 73351 of the Government Code is
21 amended to read:

22 73351. There are the following classes of positions into
23 which each of the positions of the municipal courts shall
24 be assigned as prescribed in the section pertaining to each
25 court:

26 (a) Deputy clerk-beginning level, which shall include
27 all municipal court employments assigned routine
28 clerical tasks under continuous immediate supervision.

29 (b) Deputy clerk-data entry operator I, which shall
30 include all municipal court employments at the entry
31 level assigned to operate data entry devices for the
32 purpose of entering and verifying a wide variety of data
33 from coded or uncoded source documents.

34 (c) Deputy clerk-experienced level, which shall
35 include all municipal court employments assigned
36 clerical tasks requiring exercise of discretion as to
37 methods and priorities and for which supervision is
38 available on a periodic basis only.

39 (d) Deputy clerk-data entry operator II, which shall
40 include all municipal court employments at the



1 experienced working level assigned to operate data entry
2 devices for the purpose of entering and verifying a wide
3 variety of data from coded or uncoded source documents.

4 (e) Deputy clerk-senior level, which shall include all
5 municipal court employments assigned complex clerical
6 work involving responsibility for the establishment,
7 maintenance, calendaring, issuance of process, and
8 updating of case records using manual and automated
9 systems.

10 (f) Deputy clerk-specialist level, which shall include
11 all municipal court employments assigned lead direction
12 of a work unit or assigned clerical duties of a complex
13 administrative nature, requiring exercise of initiative and
14 discretion in work organization, methods, and priorities.

15 (g) Deputy clerk-courtroom clerk, which shall include
16 all municipal court employments assigned clerical duties
17 involving responsibility for keeping the minutes of court
18 proceedings and the processing and maintenance of a
19 variety of documents and records.

20 (h) Municipal court division supervisor, which shall
21 include all municipal court employments assigned
22 responsibility for planning, organizing, and directing the
23 clerical activities of a division in a municipal court
