An act to add Section 10004.5 to the Water Code, relating to water.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 1062, as amended, Poochigian. The California Water Plan.

Existing law requires the Department of Water Resources to update, every 5 years, the California Water Plan, which is the plan for the control, protection, conservation, development, and utilization of the water resources of the state.

This bill would require the department, in connection with the updating of the plan, to include in the plan a discussion of various strategies, including those strategies relating to the development of new water storage facilities. water conservation, recycling, and marketing and recycling, desalination, conjunctive use, and water transfers, that may be pursued to meet the future water needs of the state, as prescribed. The bill would make related legislative findings and declarations.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

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The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of 2 the following:

3 (a) A long-term, reliable supply of water is essential to 4 protect the productivity of California's businesses and 5 economic climate.

6 (b) The Department of Finance projects that 7 California's population will increase to over 47 million persons by 2020, increasing the need for the development 8 9 of additional safe and reliable water supplies that are 10 critical to the health, safety. and welfare of all 11 *Californians, including the state's future generations.*

12 (c) Water-related infrastructure investment needs are 13 growing rapidly as a result of a growing population and 14 economy, environmental and public health 15 requirements, and aging water delivery systems.

16 (d) The Department of Water Resources projects that 17 Californians will experience chronic water shortages, as 18 early as 2000, unless actions are taken to increase the 19 amount of developed water available for use in California.

20 (e) Water conservation, water recycling, voluntary 21 water transfers, conjunctive use, and desalination 22 programs and projects will continue to be an integral part 23 of California's water management strategy.

24 (f) The review, planning, and development of new 25 water storage facilities and the renewed operation or 26 enlargement of existing water storage facilities should be 27 pursued to ensure that a reliable, high quality supply of 28 water is available to meet the current and future needs 29 of all beneficial uses of water, including urban, 30 agricultural, and environmental uses.

31 SEC. 2. Section 10004.5 is added to the Water Code, to 32 read:

33 10004.5. As of the requirement of the part The California 34 department to update Water Plan 35 pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 10004, the 36 department shall include in the plan a discussion of various strategies, including, but not limited to, those 37 to the development of new water storage 38 relating

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1 facilities, water conservation, water recycling and water 2 marketing, and the potential advantages and 3 disadvantages of those strategies, that may be pursued in 4 order to meet the future water needs of the state., 5 desalination, conjunctive use, and water transfers that 6 may be pursued in order to meet the future water needs 7 of the state. The department shall include in the plan a 8 discussion of the potential advantages and disadvantages 9 of each strategy and an identification of all federal and 10 state permits, approvals, or entitlements that are 11 anticipated to be required in order to implement the 12 various components of the strategy.

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
