GOVERNOR'S SIGNING MESSAGES

To the Members of the California State Legislature:

I am pleased to sign Senate Bill 335 and Assembly Bill XI 21.

Returning the state's finances to long term balance remains my number one priority. This year's budget plan is balanced, honest and responsible.



It closed a \$26.6 billion deficit and reduced future deficits from up to \$21.5 billion to less than \$5 billion.

Senate Bill 335 and Assembly Bill XI 21 represent a solid partnership between private businesses and the state to fund vital health care services while living within our means and delivering on key elements of this year's difficult budget agreement.

The quality assurance fee on hospital providers in Senate Bill 335 will raise \$7 billion in revenue. It will bring in an additional \$6.1 billion in new federal funds and save the General Fund more than \$850 million over a 30-month period. This amounts to over \$500 million more in savings to the State General Fund than previously estimated. With these new funds, many hospitals can continue to serve low-income, vulnerable patients and the state can maintain funding for children's health services.

Extending the tax on health care service managed care plans for an additional year through Assembly Bill XI 21 will raise more than \$200 million in new revenue, bring in an additional \$300 million in federal funds, and save the General Fund \$103 million this fiscal year. This will help maintain funding for the Healthy Families low-cost health insurance program for children and teens.

I have signed Senate Bill 202. This bill makes two important and practical changes to existing law.

First, this measure restores the original understanding of constitutional law that initiatives were to be considered at a general election or at a special election called for critical questions requiring swift resolution by the people. This was the historic practice for more than fifty years. It was not until 1970 that initiatives were first placed on a primary ballot and that practice has continued ever since, including twice when I was the Secretary of State.

The backers of this measure point out that there are dramatically more voters at a general rather than a primary election. In 2010, for example, only 5.7 million people voted in the primary compared to 10.3 million in the general election—a pattern that has held true over time. The idea of direct democracy is to involve as many voters as possible. This bill accomplishes that objective.

Second, this law moves the date when voters will be asked to approve changes to the state's rainy-day fund. These changes, combined with today's historically low revenues caused by the recession, would divert billions of dollars into a reserve fund while the state still has a structural budget deficit. The result would be to abruptly increase California's budget shortfall and drive massive additional cuts to education and public safety.

There's no question that setting aside reserves for a rainy day is prudent. But families can't put money into a savings account when they can't pay their bills and neither should the state. This needed reform must wait until we have recovered from the current recession and securely balanced our budget.

For the future, I however, would favor legislation authorizing PERB to award damages to a public employer in the event of an unlawful strike or strike threat that necessitates expenditures by the employer to preserve the health and safety of the public. The employer should be required to prove that the claimed expenses were reasonable, were necessary to preserve the public health and safety, and that the employer had no alternative to respond to the emergency without incurring the claimed expenses.

I am signing Senate Bill 946. It requires health plans and insurers to provide behavioral health treatments for individuals with autism and pervasive developmental disorder. The new law is effective as of July 1, 2012, and expires July 1, 2014.

While this bill provides relief for families of autistic children and some clarity for health plans, insurers and providers, there are remaining questions about effectiveness, duration, and the cost of the covered treatments that must be sorted out.

Under national health care reform, the federal government will establish "essential health benefits." If the coverage established by this bill is not included as an essential benefit, the mandate of Senate Bill 946 will automatically expire.

The Institute of Medicine said in its recent report that the top priority in defining the essential health benefits is finding the right balance between making coverage available for people to get the care they need and doing so at a cost we can all afford. The report also emphasized the need to distinguish services and treatments that are medical from those that are not.

There is still much work to be done.

I am returning **Senate Bill 356** without my signature.

This bill would require the Department of Parks and Recreation (Parks) to notify a county or city that intends to fully close a park in its jurisdiction and give the locality the option of voluntarily assuming responsibility for the park.

This bill is unnecessary. Parks has already made its list of closures available to the public and a separate notification process for cities and counties would be duplicative. Moreover, Parks already has signed agreements with localities willing to operate state parks and intends to sign more.

The bill also would reappropriate expired funds for the California State Railroad Museum Boiler Shop restoration project. I will address this in the budget.

This bill offers some needed and clear improvements to the law such as specifying a minimum buffer of 3 feet. However, Caltrans and the California Highway Patrol have raised legitimate concerns about other provisions such as the 15mph requirement. On streets with speed limits



of 35 or 40mph, slowing to 15mph to pass a bicycle could cause rear end collisions. On other roads, a bicycle may travel at or near 15mph creating a long line of cars behind the cyclist.

This bill is yet another siren song of school reform. It renames the Academic Performance Index (API) and reduces its significance by adding three other quantitative measures.

While I applaud the author's desire to improve the API, I don't believe that this bill would make our state's accountability regime either more probing or more fair.

This bill requires a new collection of indices called the "Education Quality Index" (EQI), consisting of "multiple indicators," many of which are ill-defined and some impossible to design. These "multiple indicators" are expected to change over time, causing measurement instability and muddling the picture of how schools perform.

SB 547 would also add significant costs and confusion to the implementation of the newly-adopted Common Core standards which must be in place by 2014. This bill would require us to introduce a whole new system of accountability at the same time we are required to carry out extensive revisions to school curriculum, teaching materials and tests. That doesn't make sense.

Finally, while SB 547 attempts to improve the API, it relies on the same quantitative and standardized paradigm at the heart of the current system. The criticism of the API is that it has led schools to focus too narrowly on tested subjects and ignore other subjects and matters that are vital to a well-rounded education. SB 547 certainly would add more things to measure, but it is doubtful that it would actually improve our schools. Adding more speedometers to a broken car won't turn it into a high-performance machine.

Over the last 50 years, academic "experts" have subjected California to unceasing pedagogical change and experimentation. The current fashion is to collect endless quantitative data to populate ever-changing indicators of performance to distinguish the educational "good" from the educational "bad." Instead of recognizing that perhaps we have reached testing nirvana, editorialists and academics alike call for ever more measurement "visions and revisions."

A sign hung in Albert Einstein's office read "Not everything that counts can be counted, and not everything that can be counted counts."

SB 547 nowhere mentions good character or love of learning. It does allude to student excitement and creativity, but does not take these qualities seriously because they can't be placed in a data stream. Lost in the bill's turgid mandates is any recognition that **quality** is fundamentally different from **quantity**.

There are other ways to improve our schools—to indeed focus on quality. What about a system that relies on locally convened panels to visit schools, observe teachers, interview students, and examine student work?



Such a system wouldn't produce an API number, but it could improve the quality of our schools.

I look forward to working with the author to craft more inspiring ways to encourage our students to do their best.

To the Members of the California State Senate:

I am returning **Senate Bill 833** without my signature.

This bill would prohibit the construction of a particular waste disposal project in San Diego County. This project—which has been the subject of vigorous local debate for over 20 years—has been put to a vote of the people of San Diego twice and approved both times.

The primary concerns about this project relate to its proximity both to a river and to a site sacred to federally recognized tribes.

Protection of the river is the duty and responsibility of the San Diego Regional Water Quality Control Board, with a right of appeal to the State Water Board. Numerous other regulatory agencies also have responsibilities for protecting the river. In other words, there is already in place a fully sufficient process to make a thoughtful and informed environmental decision about this project.

I am deeply concerned about the objections raised with respect to the sacred site, but I don't believe it is appropriate for the Legislature to now intervene and overturn this hard fought local land-use decision.

This dispute pains me given the unspeakable injustices the native peoples have endured and the profound importance of their spirituality and connection to the land. There's no question that more thought needs to be given to how we resolve this inherently difficult decision and to find ways for native peoples and their fellow Californians to coexist in an inexorably modernizing world.
