CARL A. COHN, ED.D., has been reappointed to the California State Board of Education, where he has served since 2011. Cohn has been a professor and co-director of the Urban Leadership Program at Claremont Graduate University since 2009. He was a distinguished leader in residence at San Diego State University from 2007 to 2008 and superintendent of schools at the San Diego Unified School District from 2005 to 2007. Cohn was a clinical professor at the University of Southern California Rossier School of Education from 2002 to 2005 and superintendent of schools at the Long Beach Unified School District from 1992 to 2002. He is a member of the Association of California School Administrators. Cohn earned a Doctor of Education degree in administration and policy studies from the University of California, Los Angeles and a Master of Arts degree in counseling from Chapman University. Reappointed 01/16/2014. Effective 01/16/2014.

Member, California State Board of Education, vice, self, reappointed. Term ending 01/15/2018.

MICHAEL W. KIRST, PH.D., has been reappointed to the California State Board of Education, where he has served since 2011. Kirst is professor emeritus at Stanford University, where he has been a member of the faculty since 1969. He was director of program planning for the U.S. Office of Education and staff director for the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on Manpower, Employment, and Poverty from 1967 to 1969.
