An act to amend Sections 7480, 21267, and 31452.6 of, and to add Section 21510 to, the Government Code, relating to retirement systems.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 3094, as amended, Committee on Public Employees, Retirement and Social Security. Retirement systems.

The Public Employees' Retirement Law and the County Employees Retirement Law of 1937 provide that persons entitled to receive benefits from any state, county, or district retirement system may authorize the payment of the benefits to be directly deposited by electronic fund transfer into the person's account at a financial institution of his or her choice. The California Right to Financial Privacy Act prohibits an officer, employee, or agent of a state or local agency or department from requesting or receiving from a financial institution the financial information of a customer except under specified conditions.

This bill would require retirement benefit payments from any of those public retirement systems that are directly deposited by electronic

fund transfer or from the Public Employees' Retirement System that are paid by warrant, following the date of death of a person entitled to receive the benefits, as specified, to be refunded to the retirement system. The bill would add an exemption to the provisions of the California Right to Financial Privacy Act to require a financial institution to provide a public retirement system, as specified, with specified information about accounts of a customer who received direct deposit transfers from the retirement system after the date of his or her death.

This bill would incorporate additional changes in Section 7480 of the Government Code proposed by AB 1776 that would become operative only if AB 1776 and this bill are both chaptered and become effective on or before January 1, 2005, and this bill is chaptered last.

36 unlawfully discloses information he or she is authorized to request
37 under this subdivision is guilty of the unlawful disclosure of
38 confidential data, a misdemeanor, which shall be punishable as set
39 forth in Section 7485.

(d) The examination by, or disclosure to, any supervisory agency of financial records that relate solely to the exercise of its supervisory function. The scope of an agency's supervisory function shall be determined by reference to statutes that grant authority to examine, audit, or require reports of financial records or financial institutions as follows:

(1) With respect to the Commissioner of Financial Institutions by reference to Division 1 (commencing with Section 99), Division 1.5 (commencing with Section 4800), Division 2 (commencing with Section 5000), Division 5 (commencing with Section 14000), Division 7 (commencing with Section 18000), Division 15 (commencing with Section 31000), and Division 16 (commencing with Section 33000) of the Financial Code.

(2) With respect to the Controller by reference to Title 10 (commencing with Section 1300) of Part 3 of the Code of Civil Procedure.

(3) With respect to the Administrator of Local Agency Security by reference to Article 2 (commencing with Section 53630) of Chapter 4 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code.

(e) The disclosure to the Franchise Tax Board of (1) the amount of any security interest that a financial institution has in a specified asset of a customer or (2) financial records in connection with the filing or audit of a tax return or tax information return that are required to be filed by the financial institution pursuant to Part 10 (commencing with Section 17001), Part 11 (commencing with Section 23001), or Part 18 (commencing with Section 38001) of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(f) The disclosure to the State Board of Equalization of any of the following:

(1) The information required by Sections 6702, 6703, 8954, 8957, 30313, 30315, 32383, 32387, 38502, 38503, 40153, 40155, 41122, 41123.5, 43443, 43444.2, 44144, 45603, 45605, 46404, 46406, 50134, 50136, 55203, 55205, 60404, and 60407 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(2) The financial records in connection with the filing or audit of a tax return required to be filed by the financial institution pursuant to Part 1 (commencing with Section 6001), Part 2 (commencing with Section 7301), Part 3 (commencing with Section 8601), Part 13 (commencing with Section 30001), Part 14

(commencing with Section 32001), and Part 17 (commencing with Section 37001) of Division 2 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(3) The amount of any security interest a financial institution has in a specified asset of a customer, if the inquiry is directed to the branch or office where the interest is held.

(g) The disclosure to the Controller of the information required by Section 7853 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

(h) The disclosure to the Employment Development Department of the amount of any security interest a financial institution has in a specified asset of a customer, if the inquiry is directed to the branch or office where the interest is held.

(i) The disclosure by a construction lender, as defined in Section 3087 of the Civil Code, to the Registrar of Contractors, of information concerning the making of progress payments to a prime contractor requested by the registrar in connection with an investigation under Section 7108.5 of the Business and Professions Code.

(j) Upon receipt of a written request from a local child support agency referring to a support order pursuant to Section 17400 of the Family Code, a financial institution shall disclose the following information concerning the account or the person named in the request, whom the local child support agency shall identify, whenever possible, by social security number:

(1) If the request states the identifying number of an account at a financial institution, the name of each owner of the account.

(2) Each account maintained by the person at the branch to which the request is delivered, and, if the branch is able to make a computerized search, each account maintained by the person at any other branch of the financial institution located in this state.

(3) For each account disclosed pursuant to paragraphs (1) and (2), the account number, current balance, street address of the branch where the account is maintained, and, to the extent available through the branch's computerized search, the name and address of any other person listed as an owner.

(4) Whenever the request prohibits the disclosure, a financial institution shall not disclose either the request or its response, to an owner of the account or to any other person, except the officers and employees of the financial institution who are involved in responding to the request and to attorneys, employees of the local child support agencies, auditors, and regulatory authorities who

1 have a need to know in order to perform their duties, and except
2 as disclosure may be required by legal process.

3 (5) No financial institution, or any officer, employee, or agent
4 thereof, shall be liable to any person for (A) disclosing information
5 in response to a request pursuant to this subdivision, (B) failing to
6 notify the owner of an account, or complying with a request under
7 this paragraph not to disclose to the owner, the request or
8 disclosure under this subdivision, or (C) failing to discover any
9 account owned by the person named in the request pursuant to a
10 computerized search of the records of the financial institution.

11 (6) The local child support agency may request information
12 pursuant to this subdivision only when the local child support
13 agency has received at least one of the following types of physical
14 evidence:

15 (A) Any of the following, dated within the last three years:

16 (i) Form 599.

17 (ii) Form 1099.

18 (iii) A bank statement.

19 (iv) A check.

20 (v) A bank passbook.

21 (vi) A deposit slip.

22 (vii) A copy of a federal or state income tax return.

23 (viii) A debit or credit advice.

24 (ix) Correspondence that identifies the child support obligor by
25 name, the bank, and the account number.

26 (x) Correspondence that identifies the child support obligor by
27 name, the bank, and the banking services related to the account of
28 the obligor.

29 (xi) An asset identification report from a federal agency.

30 (B) A sworn declaration of the custodial parent during the 12
31 months immediately preceding the request that the person named
32 in the request has had or may have had an account at an office or
33 branch of the financial institution to which the request is made.

34 (7) Information obtained by a local child support agency
35 pursuant to this subdivision shall be used only for purposes that are
36 directly connected with the administration of the duties of the local
37 child support agency pursuant to Section 17400 of the Family
38 Code.

39 (k) (1) As provided in paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of
40 Section 666 of Title 42 of the United States Code, upon receipt of

an administrative subpoena on the current federally approved interstate child support enforcement form, as approved by the federal Office of Management and Budget, a financial institution shall provide the information or documents requested by the administrative subpoena.

(2) The administrative subpoena shall refer to the current federal Office of Management and Budget control number and be signed by a person who states that he or she is an authorized agent of a state or county agency responsible for implementing the child support enforcement program set forth in Part D (commencing with Section 651) of Subchapter IV of Chapter 7 of Title 42 of the United States Code. A financial institution may rely on the statements made in the subpoena and has no duty to inquire into the truth of any statement in the subpoena.

(3) If the person who signs the administrative subpoena directs a financial institution in writing not to disclose either the subpoena or its response to any owner of an account covered by the subpoena, the financial institution shall not disclose the subpoena or its response to the owner.

(4) No financial institution, or any officer, employee, or agent thereof, shall be liable to any person for (A) disclosing information or providing documents in response to a subpoena pursuant to this subdivision, (B) failing to notify any owner of an account covered by the subpoena or complying with a request not to disclose to the owner, the subpoena or disclosure under this subdivision, or (C) failing to discover any account owned by the person named in the subpoena pursuant to a computerized search of the records of the financial institution.

(I) The dissemination of financial information and records pursuant to any of the following:

(1) Compliance by a financial institution with the requirements of Section 2892 of the Probate Code.

(2) Compliance by a financial institution with the requirements of Section 2893 of the Probate Code.

(3) An order by a judge upon a written ex parte application by a peace officer showing specific and articulable facts that there are reasonable grounds to believe that the records or information sought are relevant and material to an ongoing investigation of a felony violation of Section 186.10 or of any felony subject to the enhancement set forth in Section 186.11.

1 (A) The ex parte application shall specify with particularity the
2 records to be produced, which shall be only those of the individual
3 or individuals who are the subject of the criminal investigation.

4 (B) The ex parte application and any subsequent judicial order
5 shall be open to the public as a judicial record unless ordered sealed
6 by the court, for a period of 60 days. The sealing of these records
7 may be extended for 60-day periods upon a showing to the court
8 that it is necessary for the continuance of the investigation.
9 Sixty-day extensions may continue for up to one year or until
10 termination of the investigation of the individual or individuals,
11 whichever is sooner.

12 (C) The records ordered to be produced shall be returned to the
13 peace officer applicant or his or her designee within a reasonable
14 time period after service of the order upon the financial institution.

15 (D) Nothing in this subdivision shall preclude the financial
16 institution from notifying a customer of the receipt of the order for
17 production of records unless a court orders the financial institution
18 to withhold notification to the customer upon a finding that the
19 notice would impede the investigation.

20 (E) Where a court has made an order pursuant to this paragraph
21 to withhold notification to the customer under this paragraph, the
22 peace officer or law enforcement agency who obtained the
23 financial information shall notify the customer by delivering a
24 copy of the ex parte order to the customer within 10 days of the
25 termination of the investigation.

26 (4) No financial institution, or any officer, employee, or agent
27 thereof, shall be liable to any person for any of the following:

28 (A) Disclosing information to a probate court pursuant to

14 certifies in writing to a financial institution that a benefit recipient

17 benefit recipient's date of death, the financial institution shall
18 furnish the retirement system the name and address of any
19 coowner, cosigner, or any other person who had access to the funds
20 in the account following the date of the benefit recipients death, or
21 if the account has been closed, the name and address of the person
22 who closed the account.

23 (o) When the retirement board of a retirement system
24 established under the County Employees Retirement Law of 1937
25 certifies in writing to a financial institution that a retired member
26 or the beneficiary of a retired member has died and that transfers
27 to the account of the retired member or beneficiary of a retired
28 member at the financial institution from the retirement system
29 occurred after the date of death of the retired member or
30 beneficiary of a retired member, the financial institution shall
31 furnish the retirement system the name and address of any
32 coowner, cosigner, or any other person who had access to the funds
33 in the account following the date of death of the retired member
34 or beneficiary of a retired member, or if the account has been
35 closed, the name and address of the person who closed the account.
