SENATE BILL

An act to ~~amend Section 25249.7 of~~ *add Section 25249.37 to the Health and Safety Code, relating to toxic substances.*

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 1722, as amended, Ducheny. Proposition 65: enforcement: judgments.

(1) The existing Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (Proposition 65) prohibits any person, in the course of doing business, from knowingly and intentionally exposing any individual to a chemical known to the state to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity without giving a specified warning, or from discharging or releasing such a chemical into any source of drinking water, except as specified. The act imposes civil penalties upon persons who violate those prohibitions, and provides for the enforcement of those prohibitions by the Attorney General, a district attorney, or specified city attorneys or prosecutors, and by any person in the public interest. Existing law requires 75% of all civil and criminal penalties collected pursuant to the act be deposited in the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Fund in the State Treasury, which may be expended by the director of the lead agency, who is designated by the Governor to implement the act, to implement and administer the act, upon appropriation by the Legislature. Existing law requires 25% of all civil and criminal penalties collected pursuant to the act be paid to the prosecuting office

or the person who brought the action in the public interest. The act requires any person bringing an action in the public interest, or any private person filing an action in which a violation of the act is alleged, to notify the Attorney General that such an action has been filed.

This bill would ~~additionally require that an action brought in the public interest not be barred by the doctrine of res judicata. The bill would provide that a person who files an action in the public interest is deemed to be in privity with any other person who files an action in the public interest provide that where a court finds that the doctrine of res judicata bars the relitigation of an issue or a cause of action, a later action would be barred.~~

(2) The bill, in conformance with the requirements of Proposition 65, would make a legislative finding and declaration that this change would further the purposes of the act.

16 ~~25249.6 shall be liable for a civil penalty not to exceed two~~
17 ~~thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) per day for each violation~~
18 ~~in addition to any other penalty established by law. That civil~~
19 ~~penalty may be assessed and recovered in a civil action brought in~~
20 ~~any court of competent jurisdiction.~~

6 ~~(D) Whether the violator took good faith measures to comply~~

8 ~~(E) The willfulness of the violator's misconduct.~~

9 ~~(F) The deterrent effect that the imposition of the penalty~~

13 ~~(c) Actions pursuant to this section may be brought by the~~
14 ~~Attorney General in the name of the people of the State of~~
15 ~~California, by any district attorney, by any city attorney of a city~~
16 ~~having a population in excess of 750,000, or, with the consent of~~
17 ~~the district attorney, by a city prosecutor in any city or city and~~
18 ~~county having a full-time city prosecutor, or as provided in~~
19 ~~subdivision (d).~~

20 ~~(d) Actions pursuant to this section may be brought by any~~
21 ~~person in the public interest if all of the following requirements are~~
22 ~~met:~~

23 ~~(1) The private action is commenced more than 60 days from~~
24 ~~the date that the person has given notice of an alleged violation of~~
25 ~~Section 25249.5 or 25249.6 that is the subject of the private action~~
26 ~~to the Attorney General and the district attorney, city attorney, or~~
27 ~~prosecutor in whose jurisdiction the violation is alleged to have~~
28 ~~occurred, and to the alleged violator. If the notice alleges a~~
29 ~~violation of Section 25249.6, the notice of the alleged violation~~
30 ~~shall include a certificate of merit executed by the attorney for the~~
31 ~~noticing party, or by the noticing party, if the noticing party is not~~
32 ~~represented by an attorney. The certificate of merit shall state that~~
33 ~~the person executing the certificate has consulted with one or more~~
34 ~~persons with relevant and appropriate experience or expertise who~~
35 ~~has reviewed facts, studies, or other data regarding the exposure~~
36 ~~to the listed chemical that is the subject of the action, and that,~~
37 ~~based on that information, the person executing the certificate~~
38 ~~believes there is a reasonable and meritorious case for the private~~
39 ~~action. Factual information sufficient to establish the basis of the~~
40 ~~certificate of merit, including the information identified in~~



1 paragraph (2) of subdivision (h), shall be attached to the certificate
2 of merit that is served on the Attorney General.

3 (2) Neither the Attorney General, any district attorney, any city
4 attorney, nor any prosecutor has commenced and is diligently
5 prosecuting an action against the violation.

6 (3) (A) The action is not barred by the doctrine of res judicata.

7 (B) For purposes of this paragraph, any person who files an
8 action in the public interest pursuant to this subdivision shall be
9 deemed to be in privity with any other person who files an action
10 in the public interest pursuant to this subdivision.

11 (e) Any person bringing an action in the public interest
12 pursuant to subdivision (d) and any person filing any action in
13 which a violation of this chapter is alleged shall notify the Attorney
14 General that the action has been filed. Neither this subdivision nor
15 the procedures provided in subdivisions (f) to (j), inclusive, shall
16 affect the requirements imposed by statute or a court decision in
17 existence on January 1, 2002, concerning whether any person
18 filing any action in which a violation of this chapter is alleged is
19 required to comply with the requirements of subdivision (d).

20 (f) (1) Any person filing an action in the public interest
21 pursuant to subdivision (d), any private person filing any action in
22 which a violation of this chapter is alleged, or any private person
23 settling any violation of this chapter alleged in a notice given
24 pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (d), shall, after the action
25 or violation is subject either to a settlement or to a judgment,
26 submit to the Attorney General a reporting form that includes the
27 results of that settlement or judgment and the final disposition of
28 the case, even if dismissed. At the time of the filing of any
29 judgment pursuant to an action brought in the public interest
30 pursuant to subdivision (d), or any action brought by a private
31 person in which a violation of this chapter is alleged, the plaintiff
32 shall file an affidavit verifying that the report required by this

4 ~~specifies the information that shall be reported, including, but not~~

7 ~~subdivision, the amount of the settlement or civil penalty assessed,~~

3 ~~(2) Upon the conclusion of an action brought pursuant to~~
4 ~~subdivision (d) with respect to any defendant, if the trial court~~
5 ~~determines that there was no actual or threatened exposure to a~~
6 ~~listed chemical, the court may, upon the motion of that alleged~~
7 ~~violation or upon the court's own motion, review the basis for the~~
8 ~~belief of the person executing the certificate of merit, expressed in~~
9 ~~the certificate of merit, that an exposure to a listed chemical had~~
10 ~~occurred or was threatened. The information in the certificate of~~
11 ~~merit, including the identity of the persons consulted with and~~
12 ~~relied on by the certifier, and the facts, studies, or other data~~
13 ~~reviewed by those persons, shall be disclosed to the court in an~~
14 ~~in-camera proceeding at which the moving party shall not be~~
15 ~~present. If the court finds that there was no credible factual basis~~
16 ~~for the certifier's belief that an exposure to a listed chemical had~~
17 ~~occurred or was threatened, then the action shall be deemed~~
18 ~~frivolous within the meaning of Section 128.6 or 128.7 of the Code~~
19 ~~of Civil Procedure, whichever provision is applicable to the action.~~
20 ~~The court shall not find a factual basis credible on the basis of a~~
21 ~~legal theory of liability that is frivolous within the meaning of~~
22 ~~Section 128.6 or 128.7 of the Code of Civil Procedure, whichever~~
23 ~~provision is applicable to the action.~~

24 ~~(i) The Attorney General may provide the factual information~~
25 ~~submitted to establish the basis of the certificate of merit on~~
26 ~~request to any district attorney, city attorney, or prosecutor within~~
27 ~~whose jurisdiction the violation is alleged to have occurred, or to~~
28 ~~any other state or federal government agency, but in all other~~
29 ~~respects the Attorney General shall maintain, and ensure that all~~
30 ~~recipients maintain, the submitted information as confidential~~
31 ~~official information to the full extent authorized in Section 1040~~
32 ~~of the Evidence Code.~~

33 ~~(j) In any action brought by the Attorney General, a district~~
34 ~~attorney, a city attorney, or a prosecutor pursuant to this chapter,~~
35 ~~the Attorney General, district attorney, city attorney, or prosecutor~~
36 ~~may seek and recover costs and attorney's fees on behalf of any~~
37 ~~party who provides a notice pursuant to subdivision (d) and who~~
