An act to amend Sections 7574.14 and 7582.2 of the Business and Professions Code, and to amend Sections 626.9, 12001, 12025, 12026, 12026.2, and 12590 of, and to add Section 12037 to, the Penal Code, relating to firearms.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1934, as amended, Saldaña. Firearms.

Existing law, subject to exceptions, makes it an offense to carry a concealed handgun on the person or in a vehicle, as specified. Existing law provides that firearms carried openly in belt holsters are not concealed within the meaning of those provisions.

This bill would delete the exception pertaining to firearms carried openly in belt holsters. The bill would also establish an exemption to the offense for transportation of a firearm by members of specified organizations going directly to or from official parade duty or ceremonial occasions, as specified. *The bill would provide other exemptions.*

By expanding the scope of an existing offense, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Existing law, subject to exceptions, makes it an offense to carry a loaded firearm in specified public areas.

The bill would, subject to exceptions, make it a misdemeanor to openly carry an unloaded handgun on the person in specified public areas.

By creating a new offense, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

The bill would make conforming and nonsubstantive technical changes.

The bill would incorporate amendments to Section 12001 of the Penal Code, proposed by AB 1810, contingent on the prior enactment of that bill.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 7574.14 of the Business and Professions
2 Code is amended to read:

3 7574.14. This chapter shall not apply to the following:

4 (a) An officer or employee of the United States of America, or
5 of this state or a political subdivision thereof, while the officer or
6 employee is engaged in the performance of his or her official
7 duties, including uniformed peace officers employed part time by
8 a public agency pursuant to a written agreement between a chief
9 of police or sheriff and the public agency, provided the part-time
10 employment does not exceed 50 hours in any calendar month.

11 (b) A person engaged exclusively in the business of obtaining
12 and furnishing information as to the financial rating of persons.

13 (c) A charitable philanthropic society or association incorporated
14 under the laws of this state that is organized and duly maintained
15 for the public good and not for private profit.

1 (d) Patrol special police officers appointed by the police
2 commission of any city, county, or city and county under the
3 express terms of its charter who also under the express terms of
4 the charter (1) are subject to suspension or dismissal after a hearing
5 on charges duly filed with the commission after a fair and impartial
6 trial, (2) must be not less than 18 years of age nor more than 40
7 years of age, (3) must possess physical qualifications prescribed
8 by the commission, and (4) are designated by the police
9 commission as the owners of a certain beat or territory as may be
10 fixed from time to time by the police commission.

11 (e) An attorney at law in performing his or her duties as an
12 attorney at law.

13 (f) A collection agency or an employee thereof while acting
14 within the scope of his or her employment, while making an
15 investigation incidental to the business of the agency, including
16 an investigation of the location of a debtor or his or her property
17 where the contract with an assignor creditor is for the collection
18 of claims owed or due or asserted to be owed or due or the
19 equivalent thereof.

20 (g) Admitted insurers and agents and insurance brokers licensed
21 by the state, performing duties in connection with insurance
22 transacted by them.

23 (h) Any bank subject to the jurisdiction of the Commissioner
24 of Financial Institutions of the State of California under Division
25 1 (commencing with Section 99) of the Financial Code or the
26 Comptroller of Currency of the United States.

27 (i) A person engaged solely in the business of securing
28 information about persons or property from public records.

29 (j) A peace officer of this state or a political subdivision thereof
30 while the peace officer is employed by a private employer to
31 engage in off-duty employment in accordance with Section 1126
32 of the Government Code. However, nothing herein shall exempt
33 such a peace officer who either contracts for his or her services or
34 the services of others as a private patrol operator or contracts for
35 his or her services as or is employed as an armed private security
36 officer. For purposes of this subdivision, "armed security officer"
37 means an individual who carries or uses a firearm in the course
38 and scope of that contract or employment.

39 (k) A retired peace officer of the state or political subdivision
40 thereof when the retired peace officer is employed by a private

1 employer in employment approved by the chief law enforcement
2 officer of the jurisdiction where the employment takes place,
3 provided that the retired officer is in a uniform of a public law
4 enforcement agency, has registered with the bureau on a form
5 approved by the director, and has met any training requirements
6 or their equivalent as established for security personnel under
7 Section 7583.5. This officer may not carry an unloaded and
8 exposed handgun unless exempted by Section 12037 of the Penal
9 Code, or a loaded or concealed firearm unless he or she is exempted
10 under the provisions of subdivision (a) of Section 12027 of the
11 Penal Code or paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 12031
12 of the Penal Code or has met the requirements set forth in Section
13 12033 of the Penal Code. However, nothing herein shall exempt
14 the retired peace officer who contracts for his or her services or
15 the services of others as a private patrol operator.

16 (l) A licensed insurance adjuster in performing his or her duties
17 within the scope of his or her license as an insurance adjuster.

18 (m) Any savings association subject to the jurisdiction of the
19 Commissioner of Financial Institutions or the Office of Thrift
20 Supervision.

21 (n) Any secured creditor engaged in the repossession of the
22 creditor's collateral and any lessor engaged in the repossession of
23 leased property in which it claims an interest.

24 (o) A peace officer in his or her official police uniform acting
25 in accordance with subdivisions (c) and (d) of Section 70 of the
26 Penal Code.

27 (p) An unarmed, uniformed security person employed
28 exclusively and regularly by a motion picture studio facility
29 employer who does not provide contract security services for other
30 entities or persons in connection with the affairs of that employer
31 only and where there exists an employer-employee relationship if
32 that person at no time carries or uses any deadly weapon, as defined
33 in subdivision (a), in the performance of his or her duties, which
34 may include, but are not limited to, the following business
35 purposes:

36 (1) The screening and monitoring access of employees of the
37 same employer.

38 (2) The screening and monitoring access of prearranged and
39 preauthorized invited guests.

40 (3) The screening and monitoring of vendors and suppliers.

1 (4) Patrolling the private property facilities for the safety and
2 welfare of all who have been legitimately authorized to have access
3 to the facility.

4 (q) An armored contract carrier operating armored vehicles
5 pursuant to the authority of the Department of the California
6 Highway Patrol or the Public Utilities Commission, or an armored
7 vehicle guard employed by an armored contract carrier.

8 SEC. 2. Section 7582.2 of the Business and Professions Code
9 is amended to read:

10 7582.2. This chapter does not apply to the following:

11 (a) A person who does not meet the requirements to be a
12 proprietary private security officer, as defined in Section 7574.1,
13 and is employed exclusively and regularly by any employer who
14 does not provide contract security services for other entities or
15 persons, in connection with the affairs of the employer only and
16 where there exists an employer-employee relationship if that person
17 at no time carries or uses any deadly weapon in the performance
18 of his or her duties. For purposes of this subdivision, “deadly
19 weapon” is defined to include any instrument or weapon of the
20 kind commonly known as a blackjack, slingshot, billy, sandclub,
21 sandbag, metal knuckles, any dirk, dagger, pistol, revolver, or any
22 other firearm, any knife having a blade longer than five inches,
23 any razor with an unguarded blade and any metal pipe or bar used
24 or intended to be used as a club.

25 (b) An officer or employee of the United States of America, or
26 of this state or a political subdivision thereof, while the officer or
27 employee is engaged in the performance of his or her official
28 duties, including uniformed peace officers employed part time by
29 a public agency pursuant to a written agreement between a chief

16 Supervision.

17 (o) Any secured creditor engaged in the repossession of the
18 creditor's collateral and any lessor engaged in the repossession of
19 leased property in which it claims an interest.

20 (p) A peace officer in his or her official police uniform acting
21 in accordance with subdivisions (c) and (d) of Section 70 of the
22 Penal Code.

23 (q) An unarmed, uniformed security person employed
24 exclusively and regularly by a motion picture studio facility
25 employer who does not provide contract security services for other
26 entities or persons in connection with the affairs of that employer
27 only and where there exists an employer-employee relationship if
28 that person at no time carries or uses any deadly weapon, as defined
29 in subdivision (a), in the performance of his or her duties, which
30 may include, but are not limited to, the following business
31 purposes:

32 (1) The screening and monitoring access of employees of the
33 same employer.

34 (2) The screening and monitoring access of prearranged and
35 preauthorized invited guests.

36 (3) The screening and monitoring of vendors and suppliers.

37 (4) Patrolling the private property facilities for the safety and
38 welfare of all who have been legitimately authorized to have access
39 to the facility.

(r) The changes made to this section by the act adding this subdivision during the 2005–06 Regular Session of the Legislature shall apply as follows:

(1) On and after July 1, 2006, to a person hired as a security officer on and after January 1, 2006.

(2) On and after January 1, 2007, to a person hired as a security officer before January 1, 2006.

SEC. 3. Section 626.9 of the Penal Code is amended to read:

626.9. (a) This section shall be known, and may be cited, as the Gun-Free School Zone Act of 1995.

(b) Any person who possesses a firearm in a place that the person knows, or reasonably should know, is a school zone, as defined in paragraph (1) of subdivision (e), unless it is with the written permission of the school district superintendent, his or her designee, or equivalent school authority, shall be punished as specified in subdivision (f).

(c) Subdivision (b) does not apply to the possession of a firearm under any of the following circumstances:

(1) Within a place of residence or place of business or on private property, if the place of residence, place of business, or private property is not part of the school grounds and the possession of the firearm is otherwise lawful.

(2) When the firearm is an unloaded handgun and is in a locked container or within the locked trunk of a motor vehicle.

This section does not prohibit or limit the otherwise lawful transportation of any other firearm, other than a handgun, in accordance with state law.

(3) When the person possessing the firearm reasonably believes that he or she is in grave danger because of circumstances forming the basis of a current restraining order issued by a court against another person or persons who has or have been found to pose a threat to his or her life or safety. This subdivision may not apply when the circumstances involve a mutual restraining order issued pursuant to Division 10 (commencing with Section 6200) of the Family Code absent a factual finding of a specific threat to the person's life or safety. Upon a trial for violating subdivision (b), the trier of a fact shall determine whether the defendant was acting out of a reasonable belief that he or she was in grave danger.

1 (4) When the person is exempt from the prohibition against
2 carrying a concealed firearm pursuant to subdivision (b), (d), (e),
3 or (h) of Section 12027.

4 (d) Except as provided in subdivision (b), it shall be unlawful
5 for any person, with reckless disregard for the safety of another,
6 to discharge, or attempt to discharge, a firearm in a school zone,
7 as defined in paragraph (1) of subdivision (e).

8 The prohibition contained in this subdivision does not apply to
9 the discharge of a firearm to the extent that the conditions of
10 paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) are satisfied.

11 (e) As used in this section, the following definitions shall apply:

12 (1) "School zone" means an area in, or on the grounds of, a
13 public or private school providing instruction in kindergarten or
14 grades 1 to 12, inclusive, or within a distance of 1,000 feet from
15 the grounds of the public or private school.

16 (2) "Firearm" has the same meaning as that term is given in
17 Section 12001.

18 (3) "Locked container" has the same meaning as that term is
19 given in subdivision (c) of Section 12026.1.

20 (4) "Concealed firearm" has the same meaning as that term is
21 given in Sections 12025 and 12026.1.

22 (f) (1) Any person who violates subdivision (b) by possessing
23 a firearm in, or on the grounds of, a public or private school
24 providing instruction in kindergarten or grades 1 to 12, inclusive,
25 shall be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for two,
26 three, or five years.

27 (2) Any person who violates subdivision (b) by possessing a
28 firearm within a distance of 1,000 feet from the grounds of a public
29 or private school providing instruction in kindergarten or grades
30 1 to 12, inclusive, shall be punished as follows:

31 (A) By imprisonment in the state prison for two, three, or five
32 years, if any of the following circumstances apply:

33 (i) If the person previously has been convicted of any felony,
34 or of any crime made punishable by Chapter 1 (commencing with
35 Section 12000) of Title 2 of Part 4.

36 (ii) If the person is within a class of persons prohibited from
37 possessing or acquiring a firearm pursuant to Section 12021 or
38 12021.1 of this code or Section 8100 or 8103 of the Welfare and
39 Institutions Code.

1 (iii) If the firearm is any handgun and the offense is punished
2 as a felony pursuant to Section 12025.

3 (B) By imprisonment in a county jail for not more than one year
4 or by imprisonment in the state prison for two, three, or five years,
5 in all cases other than those specified in subparagraph (A).

6 (3) Any person who violates subdivision (d) shall be punished
7 by imprisonment in the state prison for three, five, or seven years.

8 (g) (1) Every person convicted under this section for a
9 misdemeanor violation of subdivision (b) who has been convicted
10 previously of a misdemeanor offense enumerated in Section
11 12001.6 shall be punished by imprisonment in a county jail for
12 not less than three months, or if probation is granted or if the
13 execution or imposition of sentence is suspended, it shall be a
14 condition thereof that he or she be imprisoned in a county jail for
15 not less than three months.

16 (2) Every person convicted under this section of a felony
17 violation of subdivision (b) or (d) who has been convicted
18 previously of a misdemeanor offense enumerated in Section
19 12001.6, if probation is granted or if the execution of sentence is
20 suspended, it shall be a condition thereof that he or she be
21 imprisoned in a county jail for not less than three months.

22 (3) Every person convicted under this section for a felony
23 violation of subdivision (b) or (d) who has been convicted
24 previously of any felony, or of any crime made punishable by
25 Chapter 1 (commencing with Section 12000) of Title 2 of Part 4,
26 if probation is granted or if the execution or imposition of sentence
27 is suspended, it shall be a condition thereof that he or she be
28 imprisoned in a county jail for not less than three months.

29 (4) The court shall apply the three-month minimum sentence
30 specified in this subdivision, except in unusual cases where the
31 interests of justice would best be served by granting probation or
32 suspending the execution or imposition of sentence without the
33 minimum imprisonment required in this subdivision or by granting
34 probation or suspending the execution or imposition of sentence
35 with conditions other than those set forth in this subdivision, in
36 which case the court shall specify on the record and shall enter on
37 the minutes the circumstances indicating that the interests of justice
38 would best be served by this disposition.

39 (h) Notwithstanding Section 12026, any person who brings or
40 possesses a loaded firearm upon the grounds of a campus of, or

buildings owned or operated for student housing, teaching, research, or administration by, a public or private university or college, that are contiguous or are clearly marked university property, unless it is with the written permission of the university or college president, his or her designee, or equivalent university or college authority, shall be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for two, three, or four years. Notwithstanding subdivision (k), a university or college shall post a prominent notice at primary entrances on noncontiguous property stating that firearms are prohibited on that property pursuant to this subdivision.

(i) Notwithstanding Section 12026, any person who brings or possesses a firearm upon the grounds of a campus of, or buildings owned or operated for student housing, teaching, research, or administration by, a public or private university or college, that are contiguous or are clearly marked university property, unless it is with the written permission of the university or college president, his or her designee, or equivalent university or college authority, shall be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for one, two, or three years. Notwithstanding subdivision (k), a university or college shall post a prominent notice at primary entrances on noncontiguous property stating that firearms are prohibited on that property pursuant to this subdivision.

(j) For purposes of this section, a firearm shall be deemed to be loaded when there is an unexpended cartridge or shell, consisting of a case that holds a charge of powder and a bullet or shot, in, or attached in any manner to, the firearm, including, but not limited to, in the firing chamber, magazine, or clip thereof attached to the firearm. A muzzle-loader firearm shall be deemed to be loaded when it is capped or primed and has a powder charge and ball or shot in the barrel or cylinder.

(k) This section does not require that notice be posted regarding the proscribed conduct.

(l) This section does not apply to a duly appointed peace officer as defined in Chapter 4.5 (commencing with Section 830) of Title 3 of Part 2, a full-time paid peace officer of another state or the federal government who is carrying out official duties while in California, any person summoned by any of these officers to assist in making arrests or preserving the peace while he or she is actually engaged in assisting the officer, a member of the military forces of this state or of the United States who is engaged in the

1 performance of his or her duties, a person holding a valid license
2 to carry the firearm pursuant to Article 3 (commencing with Section
3 12050) of Chapter 1 of Title 2 of Part 4, or an armored vehicle
4 guard, engaged in the performance of his or her duties, as defined
5 in subdivision (d) of Section 7582.1 of the Business and
6 Professions Code.

7 (m) This section does not apply to a security guard authorized
8 to carry a loaded firearm pursuant to Section 12031 or to openly
9 carry an unloaded handgun pursuant to Section 12037.

10 (n) This section does not apply to an existing shooting range at
11 a public or private school or university or college campus.

12 (o) This section does not apply to an honorably retired peace
13 officer authorized to carry a concealed or loaded firearm pursuant
14 to subdivision (a) or (i) of Section 12027 or paragraph (1) or (8)
15 of subdivision (b) of Section 12031 or to openly carry an unloaded
16 handgun pursuant to Section 12037.

17 SEC. 4. Section 12001 of the Penal Code is amended to read:

18 12001. (a) (1) As used in this title, the terms “pistol,”
19 “revolver,” and “firearm capable of being concealed upon the
20 person” shall apply to and include any device designed to be used
21 as a weapon, from which is expelled a projectile by the force of
22 any explosion, or other form of combustion, and that has a barrel
23 less than 16 inches in length. These terms also include any device
24 that has a barrel 16 inches or more in length which is designed to
25 be interchanged with a barrel less than 16 inches in length.

26 (2) As used in this title, the term “handgun” means any “pistol,”
27 “revolver,” or “firearm capable of being concealed upon the
28 person.”

29 (b) As used in this title, “firearm” means any device, designed
30 to be used as a weapon, from which is expelled through a barrel,
31 a projectile by the force of any explosion or other form of
32 combustion.

33 (c) As used in Sections 12021, 12021.1, 12070, 12071, 12072,
34 12073, 12078, 12101, and 12801 of this code, and Sections 8100,
35 8101, and 8103 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, the term
36 “firearm” includes the frame or receiver of the weapon.

37 (d) For the purposes of Sections 12025 and 12031, the term
38 “firearm” also shall include any rocket, rocket propelled projectile
39 launcher, or similar device containing any explosive or incendiary

1 material whether or not the device is designed for emergency or
2 distress signaling purposes.

3 (e) For purposes of Sections 12037, 12070, 12071, and
4 paragraph (8) of subdivision (a), and subdivisions (b), (c), (d), and
5 (f) of Section 12072, the term “firearm” does not include an
6 unloaded firearm that is defined as an “antique firearm” in Section
7 921(a)(16) of Title 18 of the United States Code.

8 (f) Nothing shall prevent a device defined as a “handgun,”
9 “pistol,” “revolver,” or “firearm capable of being concealed upon
10 the person” from also being found to be a short-barreled shotgun
11 or a short-barreled rifle, as defined in Section 12020.

12 (g) For purposes of Sections 12551 and 12552, the term “BB
13 device” means any instrument that expels a projectile, such as a
14 BB or a pellet, not exceeding 6mm caliber, through the force of
15 air pressure, gas pressure, or spring action, or any spot marker gun.

16 (h) As used in this title, “wholesaler” means any person who is
17 licensed as a dealer pursuant to Chapter 44 (commencing with
18 Section 921) of Title 18 of the United States Code and the
19 regulations issued pursuant thereto who sells, transfers, or assigns
20 firearms, or parts of firearms, to persons who are licensed as
21 manufacturers, importers, or gunsmiths pursuant to Chapter 44
22 (commencing with Section 921) of Title 18 of the United States
23 Code, or persons licensed pursuant to Section 12071, and includes
24 persons who receive finished parts of firearms and assemble them
25 into completed or partially completed firearms in furtherance of
26 that purpose.

27 “Wholesaler” shall not include a manufacturer, importer, or
28 gunsmith who is licensed to engage in those activities pursuant to
29 Chapter 44 (commencing with Section 921) of Title 18 of the
30 United States Code or a person licensed pursuant to Section 12071
31 and the regulations issued pursuant thereto. A wholesaler also does
32 not include those persons dealing exclusively in grips, stocks, and
33 other parts of firearms that are not frames or receivers thereof.

34 (i) As used in Section 12071 or 12072, “application to purchase”
35 means any of the following:

36 (1) The initial completion of the register by the purchaser,
37 transferee, or person being loaned the firearm as required by
38 subdivision (b) of Section 12076.

39 (2) The initial completion and transmission to the department
40 of the record of electronic or telephonic transfer by the dealer on

1 the purchaser, transferee, or person being loaned the firearm as
2 required by subdivision (c) of Section 12076.

3 (j) For purposes of Section 12023, a firearm shall be deemed

1 carry a concealed firearm pursuant to Section 12027 or a loaded
2 firearm pursuant to Section 12031.

3 (2) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by any person
4 to the extent that person may carry a loaded firearm pursuant to
5 Section 12031.

6 (3) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun as merchandise
7 by a person who is engaged in the business of manufacturing,
8 importing, wholesaling, repairing, or dealing in firearms and who
9 is licensed to engage in that business or the authorized
10 representative or authorized agent of that person while engaged
11 in the lawful course of the business.

12 (4) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by duly
13 authorized military or civil organizations while parading or while
14 rehearsing or practicing parading, or the members thereof when
15 at the meeting places of their respective organizations.

16 (5) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by a member of
17 any club or organization organized for the purpose of practicing
18 shooting at targets upon established target ranges, whether public
19 or private, while the members are using handguns upon the target
20 ranges or incident to the use of a handgun at that target range.

21 (6) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by a licensed
22 hunter while engaged in hunting or while transporting that handgun
23 when going to or returning from that hunting expedition.

24 (7) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun incident to
25 transportation of a handgun by a person operating a licensed
26 common carrier or an authorized agent or employee thereof when
27 transported in conformance with applicable federal law.

28 (8) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by a member of
29 an organization chartered by the Congress of the United States or
30 a nonprofit mutual or public benefit corporation organized and
31 recognized as a nonprofit tax-exempt organization by the Internal
32 Revenue Service while on official parade duty or ceremonial
33 occasions of that organization or while rehearsing or practicing
34 for official parade duty or ceremonial occasions.

35 (9) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun within a gun
36 show conducted pursuant to Sections 12071.1 and 12071.4.

37 (10) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun within a school
38 zone, as defined in Section 626.9, with the written permission of
39 the school district superintendent, his or her designee, or equivalent
40 school authority.

1 (11) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun when in
2 accordance with the provisions of Section 171b.

3 (12) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by any person
4 while engaged in the act of making or attempting to make a lawful
5 arrest.

6 (13) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun incident to
7 loaning, selling, or transferring the same in accordance with Section
8 12072 or any of the exemptions from subdivision (d) of Section
9 12072 so long as that handgun is possessed within private property
10 and the possession and carrying is with the permission of the owner
11 or lessee of that private property.

12 (14) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by a person
13 engaged in firearms-related activities, while on the premises of a
14 fixed place of business which is licensed to conduct and conducts,
15 as a regular course of its business, activities related to the sale,
16 making, repair, transfer, pawn, or the use of firearms, or related
17 to firearms training.

18 (15) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by an authorized
19 participant in, or an authorized employee or agent of a supplier of
20 firearms for, a motion picture, television or video production, or
21 entertainment event when the participant lawfully uses the handgun
22 as part of that production or event, as part of rehearsing or
23 practicing for participation in that production or event, or while
24 the participant or authorized employee or agent is at that production
25 or event, or rehearsal or practice for that production or event.

26 (16) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun incident to
27 obtaining an identification number or mark assigned for that
28 handgun from the Department of Justice pursuant to Section 12092.

29 (17) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun at established
30 target ranges, whether public or private, while the person is using
31 the handgun upon the target ranges.

32 (18) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by a person
33 when that person is summoned by a peace officer to assist in
34 making arrests or preserving the peace while he or she is actually
35 engaged in assisting that officer.

36 (19) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun incident to:

37 (A) Complying with paragraph (2) or (3) of subdivision (f) of
38 Section 12072 as it pertains to that handgun.

39 (B) Subdivision (l) of Section 12078 as it pertains to that
40 handgun.

1 (C) Paragraph (6) of subdivision (a) of Section 12078 as it
2 pertains to that handgun.

3 (D) Complying with subdivision (c) or (i) of Section 12078 as
4 it pertains to that handgun.

5 (20) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun incident to and
6 in the course and scope of training of or by an individual to become
7 a sworn peace officer as part of a course of study approved by the
8 Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training.

9 (21) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun incident to and
10 in the course and scope of training of or by an individual to become
11 licensed pursuant to Section 12050 as part of a course of study
12 necessary or authorized by the person authorized to issue the
13 license pursuant to Section 12050.

14 (22) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun incident to and
15 at the request of a sheriff or chief or other head of a municipal
16 police department.

17 (23) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun by a person
18 when done within a place of business, a place of residence, or on
19 private property, if done with the permission of a person who, by
20 virtue of subdivision (a) of Section 12026, may carry openly an
21 unloaded handgun within that place of business, place of residence,
22 or on that private property owned or lawfully possessed by that
23 person.

24 (24) The open carrying of an unloaded handgun at an auction
25 or similar event of a nonprofit public benefit or mutual benefit
26 corporation at which firearms are auctioned or otherwise sold to
27 fund the activities of that corporation or the local chapters of that
28 corporation if that handgun is a handgun that is to be auctioned or
29 otherwise sold for that nonprofit public benefit or mutual benefit
30 and it is to be delivered by a person licensed pursuant to, and
31 operating in accordance with, Section 12071.

32 (e) Notwithstanding the fact that the term “an unloaded
33 handgun” is used in this section, each handgun shall constitute a
34 distinct and separate offense under this section.

35 (f) For purposes of this section, the following shall apply:

36 (1) A handgun shall be deemed unloaded if it is not “loaded”
37 within the meaning of subdivision (g) of Section 12031.

38 (2) The term “prohibited area” means any place where it is
39 unlawful to discharge a weapon.

1 (3) The term “public place” shall have the same meaning as in
2 Section 12031.

3 (g) *The open carrying of an unloaded handgun pursuant to*
4 *paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Section 171c is not a violation*
5 *of this section. Operation of this subdivision is contingent on AB*
6 *2668 adding Section 171c to the Penal Code, and being enacted*
7 *and becoming effective on or before January 1, 2011.*

8 (h) *The open carrying of an unloaded handgun pursuant to*
9 *subparagraph (F) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (c) of Section*
10 *171.7 is not a violation of this section. Operation of this subdivision*
11 *is contingent on AB 2324 adding Section 171.7 to the Penal Code,*
12 *and being enacted and becoming effective on or before January*
13 *1, 2011.*

14 SEC. 9. Section 12590 of the Penal Code is amended to read:

15 12590. (a) Any person who does any of the following acts
16 while engaged in picketing, or other informational activities in a
17 public place relating to a concerted refusal to work, is guilty of a
18 misdemeanor:

19 (1) Carries concealed upon his or her person or within any
20 vehicle which is under his or her control or direction any handgun.

21 (2) Carries a loaded firearm upon his or her person or within
22 any vehicle which is under his or her control or direction.

23 (3) Carries a deadly weapon.

24 (4) Wears the uniform of a peace officer, whether or not the
25 person is a peace officer.

26 (5) Carries an unloaded handgun openly on his or her person
27 outside of a vehicle.

28 (b) This section shall not be construed to authorize or ratify any
29 picketing or other informational activities not otherwise authorized
30 by law.

31 (c) Section 12027 shall not be construed to authorize any
32 conduct described in paragraph (1) of subdivision (a), nor shall
33 subdivision (b) of Section 12031 be construed to authorize any
34 conduct described in paragraph (2) of subdivision (a), nor shall
35 subdivision (d) of Section 12037 be construed to authorize any
36 conduct described in paragraph (5) of subdivision (a).

37 SEC. 9.5. *Section 4.5 of this bill incorporates amendments to*
38 *Section 12001 of the Penal Code proposed by both this bill and*
39 *AB 1810. It shall only become operative if (1) both bills are enacted*
40 *and become effective on or before January 1, 2011, (2) each bill*

1 *amends Section 12001 of the Penal Code, and (3) this bill is*
2 *enacted after AB 1810, in which case Section 4 of this bill shall*
3 *not become operative.*

4 SEC. 10. No reimbursement is required by this act pursuant to
5 Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution because
6 the only costs that may be incurred by a local agency or school
7 district will be incurred because this act creates a new crime or
8 infraction, eliminates a crime or infraction, or changes the penalty
9 for a crime or infraction, within the meaning of Section 17556 of
10 the Government Code, or changes the definition of a crime within
11 the meaning of Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California
12 Constitution.
