## **ASSEMBLY BILL**

**No. 1545**

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**Introduced by Assembly Member V. Manuel Pérez**

January 25, 2012

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An act to amend Sections 63000, 63010, 63025.1, 63045, and 63084 of, and to add Article 5.5 (commencing with Section 63047.1) to Chapter 2 of Division 1 of Title 6.7 of, the Government Code, relating to economic development, and making an appropriation therefor.

### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1545, as amended, V. Manuel Pérez. Economic development projects.

The Bergeson-Peace Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank Act authorizes the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank, governed by a board of directors, to make loans and provide other assistance to public and private entities for various types of economic development projects, among other things. The activities of the bank under these provisions are funded from the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank Fund, which is continuously appropriated for these purposes.

This bill would authorize the board to enter into development and financing agreements for projects within the California-Mexico border region, as defined. The bill would authorize the bank to establish and participate in a binational financing authority to facilitate and support the economic development of communities within the border region. The bill would require the bank to develop guidelines for the selection,

review, and approval of border region projects and authorize the bank to issue bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in the Binational Development Account, which the bill would create within the fund. By expanding the purposes for which a continuously appropriated fund may be used, the bill would make an appropriation. *The bill would state that certain provisions of this bill shall become operative only if the Executive Director of the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank determines that there are sufficient funds available to implement those provisions and submits a letter to the Legislature to that effect.*

*The people of the State of California do enact as follows:*

1     SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of the  
2     following:  
3     (a) Mexico is California's largest trading partner in the world.  
4     The two economies are highly integrated with a substantial  
5     dependence on cross-border trade, especially in southern California.  
6     A modern border that provides for safe and efficient movement  
7     of people and goods is therefore critical to both entities to maintain  
8     continued growth in the economy and trade.  
9     (b) The increased security demands since September 11, 2001,  
10    have resulted in the need to have an even greater focus on the  
11    operations of border crossings and approaches so that efficiency  
12    improvements are made in concert with the implementation of  
13    enhanced safety and security measures.  
14    (c) One barrier to the expansion of trade and binational  
15    commerce is the deficit in border infrastructure, which has not  
16    kept pace with increases in trade and transit since ratification of  
17    the North American Free Trade Agreement. Increased federal  
18    spending on ports of entry is essential, as well as encouraging  
19    recapitalization of binational border financing entities that include  
20    the North American Development Bank. Even with increased  
21    federal funding, however, the long-term success of the binational  
22    region is attracting more private sector investment. Attracting new  
23    private capital will require new ways of financing infrastructure  
24    and other economic development-related projects and streamlining  
25    local and environmental approvals.

(d) A binational approach to economic development also serves to provide a vital, yet often overlooked, component to comprehensive immigration reform. Workers from Mexico have historically served a valuable role within many California industry sectors including the agriculture and tourism sectors. In some instances, however, immigration creates economic and social challenges to the sending and receiving countries, as well as workers and businesses. It is therefore in the interest of the state to find appropriate, cost-effective actions to limit immigration by supporting economic development and job creation.

(e) Funding business development and job creation activities along the California-Mexico border region is a practical strategy for minimizing and discouraging undocumented flows of immigration from Mexico. Economic development projects along the border and within the north-south economic corridors benefit communities on both sides of the border. Projects that stimulate job creation and strengthen the local and regional economies can serve as a cost-effective immigration control method, while strengthening the manufacturing, trade, and goods movement capacity of California communities.

(f) A coherent economic strategy for the border region, based on expediting legitimate commerce, relaxing federally imposed restrictions on what border communities can do to build new infrastructure, and endowing existing development institutions with greater authority will result in immediate and long-term benefits to the people of California.

*(g) Supporting economic development activities within the border region is not in conflict with Clause 3 of Section 8 of Article 1 of the United States Constitution because facilitating economic development activities does not rise to the level of regulating commerce with foreign nations and is consistent with the prior actions of the United States Congress that have sanctioned and defined the trade and commerce relationship between the United States and Mexico through a range of legislative actions including, but not limited to, the approval of the North American Free Trade Agreement.*

SEC. 2. Section 63000 of the Government Code is amended to read:

63000. The Legislature finds and declares the following:

1 (a) Economic revitalization, future development, and a healthy  
2 climate for jobs in California will depend upon a well-conceived  
3 system of public improvements that are essential to the economic  
4 well-being of the citizens of the state and are necessary to maintain,  
5 as well as create, employment within the state for business.

6 (b) It is necessary for public policy to support the efforts of  
7 businesses attempting to expand, businesses seeking to locate in  
8 California, and local economic development organizations, public  
9 agencies, and new entrepreneurs by dedicating public fiscal  
10 resources to confront obstacles and barriers that impede economic  
11 growth.

12 (c) Existing mechanisms that coordinate federal, state, local,  
13 and private financial resources are inadequate to attract and sustain  
14 ~~that~~ *the* level of private investment that is essential to a growth  
15 economy.

16 (d) In order to secure and enhance the economic well-being of  
17 Californians, promote economic development in the state, and  
18 provide a healthy climate for the creation of jobs, it is necessary  
19 for public policy to support the efforts of expanding businesses,  
20 businesses seeking to locate in California, local development  
21 organizations, public bodies, and new entrepreneurs to gain access  
22 to capital through current and potential operations of financial  
23 markets.

24 (e) The high cost and the lack of availability of industrial loans  
25 for small- and medium-size businesses is making it difficult for  
26 thousands of these enterprises to get established, to maintain their  
27 present employment levels, or to expand employment.

28 (f) The problem of access to capital is acute in the high  
29 technology industry clusters because companies must often finance  
30 large capital expenditures early in their development cycle, and  
31 cannot obtain financing sufficient to cover the cost of those  
32 expenditures. Consideration should be given to industry clusters  
33 that may include the following:

- 34 (1) Health care technology.  
35 (2) Multimedia.  
36 (3) Environmental technology.  
37 (4) Information technology.

38 (g) The high cost and limited availability of loans and capital  
39 has led a number of states to take action to remedy these conditions

1 through concerted public and private investment programs that  
2 include efforts to do the following:

3 (1) Use the state's access to capital markets more effectively  
4 for economic development.

5 (2) Create financing pools to access national and international  
6 capital markets or help government sponsors and public-private  
7 economic development organizations obtain credit enhancement  
8 on their own.

9 (3) Facilitate credit enhancement for selected specific projects.

10 (4) Provide or arrange for loan insurance.

11 (5) Create and support secondary markets for loan portfolios of  
12 urban and rural economic development corporations and others.

13 (6) Improve access to international capital markets.

14 (7) Provide opportunities for public pension funds and other  
15 institutional investors to play a larger role in state economic  
16 development.

17 (8) Arrange for or provide subordinated debt for selected  
18 projects.

19 (9) Increase support for local, regional, and state infrastructure  
20 development.

21 (10) Improve access to global markets by supporting  
22 manufacturing-linked goods and movement-related infrastructure  
23 within state, national, and international transportation corridors.

24 (h) Local governments in California bear a primary  
25 responsibility for the business of promoting job creation and  
26 economic development efforts. California's continued reliance on  
27 autonomous local entities often fails to adequately consider regional  
28 impacts of business expansion. Projects of a regional nature need  
29 the benefit of a state coordinating function to augment and enhance  
30 local economic development and environmental efforts.

31 (i) The State of California has not embarked on a major  
32 infrastructure financing effort since the decade of the ~~1960's~~ 1960s,  
33 despite persistent unemployment and soaring population growth.

34 (j) California's ability to compete in a global economy depends  
35 upon its capacity to implement policies that take maximum  
36 advantage of public and private resources at the local, regional,  
37 state, and national levels. These policies should be coordinated  
38 with any future legislative plan involving growth management  
39 strategies designed to make economic growth compatible with  
40 environmental protections. It is the intent of the Legislature in

1 enacting this act to create a mechanism to finance projects needed  
2 to implement economic development and job creation and growth  
3 management strategies, and to provide a secure and stable funding  
4 source for implementation of this act in order to meet critical  
5 economic, social, and environmental concerns.

6 (k) The State of California needs a financing entity structured  
7 with broad authority to issue bonds, provide guarantees, and  
8 leverage state and federal funds using techniques that will target  
9 public investment to facilitate private sector economic growth.  
10 The goal is to expand private sector investment within the state  
11 and produce more private sector jobs with less public sector  
12 investment.

13 (l) The mechanisms for financing public improvements and  
14 private job creation strategies provided for in this act are in the  
15 public interest, serve a public purpose, and will promote the health,  
16 welfare, and safety of the citizens of the state.

17 (m) The lack of economic development along the border region  
18 with Mexico has caused economic challenges to the state. The  
19 existence of an economic development authority that addresses  
20 economic development needs in these areas serves a public purpose  
21 and promotes the health, welfare, and safety of the citizens of the  
22 state.

23 (n) The public policies and responsibilities of the state, including  
24 all of the above purposes and functions, cannot be fully obtained  
25 without the use of financing assistance and can be most effectively  
26 furthered by the creation of the California Infrastructure and  
27 Economic Development Bank.

28 SEC. 3. Section 63010 of the Government Code is amended  
29 to read:

30 63010. For purposes of this division, the following words and  
31 terms shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly  
32 indicates or requires another or different meaning or intent:

33 (a) “Act” means the Bergeson-Peace Infrastructure and  
34 Economic Development Bank Act.

35 (b) “Bank” means the California Infrastructure and Economic  
36 Development Bank.

37 (c) “Board” or “bank board” means the Board of Directors of  
38 the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank.

39 (d) “Bond purchase agreement” means a contractual agreement  
40 executed between the bank and a sponsor, or a special purpose

1 trust authorized by the bank or a sponsor, or both, whereby the  
2 bank or special purpose trust authorized by the bank agrees to  
3 purchase bonds of the sponsor for retention or sale.

4 (e) (1) "Bonds" means bonds, including structured, senior, and  
5 subordinated bonds or other securities; loans; notes, including  
6 bond, revenue, tax, or grant anticipation notes; commercial paper;  
7 floating rate and variable maturity securities; and any other  
8 evidences of indebtedness or ownership, including certificates of  
9 participation or beneficial interest, asset backed certificates, or  
10 lease-purchase or installment purchase agreements, whether taxable  
11 or excludable from gross income for federal income taxation  
12 purposes.

13 (2) "Border region" means the area within 125 miles on each  
14 side of the California-Mexico border, including areas along the  
15 north-south and east-west transportation networks on both sides  
16 of the border.

17 (f) "Cost," as applied to a project or portion thereof financed  
18 under this division, means all or any part of the cost of construction,  
19 renovation, and acquisition of all lands, structures, real or personal  
20 property, rights, rights-of-way, franchises, licenses, easements,  
21 and interests acquired or used for a project; the cost of demolishing  
22 or removing any buildings or structures on land so acquired,  
23 including the cost of acquiring any lands to which the buildings  
24 or structures may be moved; the cost of all machinery, equipment,  
25 and financing charges; interest prior to, during, and for a period  
26 after completion of construction, renovation, or acquisition, as  
27 determined by the bank; provisions for working capital; reserves  
28 for principal and interest and for extensions, enlargements,  
29 additions, replacements, renovations, and improvements; and the  
30 cost of architectural, engineering, financial and legal services,  
31 plans, specifications, estimates, administrative expenses, and other  
32 expenses necessary or incidental to determining the feasibility of  
33 any project or incidental to the construction, acquisition, or  
34 financing of any project, and transition costs in the case of an  
35 electrical corporation.

36 (g) "Economic development facilities" means real and personal  
37 property, structures, buildings, equipment, and supporting  
38 components thereof that are used to provide industrial, recreational,  
39 research, commercial, utility, goods movement, or service  
40 enterprise facilities, community, educational, cultural, or social

1 welfare facilities and any parts or combinations thereof, and all  
2 facilities or infrastructure necessary or desirable in connection  
3 therewith, including provision for working capital, but shall not  
4 include any housing.

5 (h) “Electrical corporation” has the meaning set forth in Section  
6 218 of the Public Utilities Code.

7 (i) “Executive director” means the Executive Director of the  
8 California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank  
9 appointed pursuant to Section 63021.

10 (j) “Financial assistance” in connection with a project, includes,  
11 but is not limited to, any combination of grants, loans, the proceeds  
12 of bonds issued by the bank or special purpose trust, insurance,  
13 guarantees or other credit enhancements or liquidity facilities, and  
14 contributions of money, property, labor, or other things of value,  
15 as may be approved by resolution of the board or the sponsor, or  
16 both; the purchase or retention of bank bonds, the bonds of a  
17 sponsor for their retention or for sale by the bank, or the issuance  
18 of bank bonds or the bonds of a special purpose trust used to fund  
19 the cost of a project for which a sponsor is directly or indirectly  
20 liable, including, but not limited to, bonds, the security for which  
21 is provided in whole or in part pursuant to the powers granted by  
22 Section 63025; bonds for which the bank has provided a guarantee  
23 or enhancement, including, but not limited to, the purchase of the  
24 subordinated bonds of the sponsor, the subordinated bonds of a  
25 special purpose trust, or the retention of the subordinated bonds  
26 of the bank pursuant to Chapter 4 (commencing with Section  
27 63060); or any other type of assistance deemed appropriate by the  
28 bank or the sponsor, except that no direct loans shall be made to  
29 nonpublic entities other than in connection with the issuance of  
30 rate reduction bonds pursuant to a financing order or in connection  
31 with a financing for an economic development facility located  
32 within the state or the border region, or both. Financial assistance  
33 within areas outside of California shall meet the requirements  
34 under Article 5.5 (commencing with Section 63047.1).

35 For purposes of this subdivision, “grant” does not include grants  
36 made by the bank except when acting as an agent or intermediary  
37 for the distribution or packaging of financing available from  
38 federal, private, or other public sources.

39 (k) “Financing order” has the meaning set forth in Section 840  
40 of the Public Utilities Code.

1 (l) “Guarantee trust fund” means the California Infrastructure  
2 Guarantee Trust Fund.

3 (m) “Infrastructure bank fund” means the California  
4 Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank Fund.

5 (n) “Loan agreement” means a contractual agreement executed  
6 between the bank or a special purpose trust and a sponsor that  
7 provides that the bank or special purpose trust will loan funds to  
8 the sponsor and that the sponsor will repay the principal and pay  
9 the interest and redemption premium, if any, on the loan.

10 (o) “Participating party” means any person, company,  
11 corporation, association, state, international, or municipal  
12 governmental entity, partnership, firm, or other entity or group of  
13 entities, whether organized for profit or not for profit, engaged in  
14 business or operations within the state or border region and that  
15 applies for financing from the bank in conjunction with a sponsor  
16 for the purpose of implementing a project. However, in the case  
17 of a project relating to the financing of transition costs or the  
18 acquisition of transition property, or both, on the request of an  
19 electrical corporation, or in connection with a financing for an  
20 economic development facility, or for the financing of insurance  
21 claims, the participating party shall be deemed to be the same  
22 entity as the sponsor for the financing.

23 (p) “Project” means designing, acquiring, planning, permitting,  
24 entitling, constructing, improving, extending, restoring, financing,  
25 and generally developing public development facilities or economic  
26 development facilities within the state or border region or financing  
27 transition costs or the acquisition of transition property, or both,  
28 upon approval of a financing order by the Public Utilities  
29 Commission, as provided in Article 5.5 (commencing with Section  
30 840) of Chapter 4 of Part 1 of Division 1 of the Public Utilities  
31 Code. Projects within areas outside of California shall meet the  
32 requirements under Article 5.5 (commencing with Section  
33 63047.1).

34 (q) “Public development facilities” means real and personal  
35 property, structures, conveyances, equipment, thoroughfares,  
36 buildings, and supporting components thereof, excluding any  
37 housing, that are directly related to providing the following:

38 (1) “City streets” including any street, avenue, boulevard, road,  
39 parkway, drive, or other way that is any of the following:

40 (A) An existing municipal roadway.

1 (B) Is shown upon a plat approved pursuant to law and includes  
2 the land between the street lines, whether improved or unimproved,  
3 and may comprise pavement, bridges, shoulders, gutters, curbs,  
4 guardrails, sidewalks, parking areas, benches, fountains, plantings,  
5 lighting systems, and other areas within the street lines, as well as  
6 equipment and facilities used in the cleaning, grading, clearance,  
7 maintenance, and upkeep thereof.

8 (2) “County highways” including any county highway as defined  
9 in Section 25 of the Streets and Highways Code, that includes the  
10 land between the highway lines, whether improved or unimproved,  
11 and may comprise pavement, bridges, shoulders, gutters, curbs,  
12 guardrails, sidewalks, parking areas, benches, fountains, plantings,  
13 lighting systems, and other areas within the street lines, as well as  
14 equipment and facilities used in the cleaning, grading, clearance,  
15 maintenance, and upkeep thereof.

16 (3) “Drainage, water supply, and flood control” including, but  
17 not limited to, ditches, canals, levees, pumps, dams, conduits,  
18 pipes, storm sewers, and dikes necessary to keep or direct water  
19 away from people, equipment, buildings, and other protected areas  
20 as may be established by lawful authority, as well as the  
21 acquisition, improvement, maintenance, and management of  
22 floodplain areas and all equipment used in the maintenance and  
23 operation of the foregoing.

24 (4) “Educational facilities” including libraries, child care  
25 facilities, including, but not limited to, day care facilities, and  
26 employment training facilities.

27 (5) “Environmental mitigation measures” including required  
28 construction or modification of public infrastructure and purchase  
29 and installation of pollution control and noise abatement  
30 equipment.

31 (6) “Parks and recreational facilities” including local parks,  
32 recreational property and equipment, parkways, and property.

33 (7) “Port facilities” including airports, landports, waterports,  
34 railports, docks, harbors, ports of entry, piers, ships, small boat  
35 harbors and marinas, and any other facilities, additions, or  
36 improvements in connection therewith, that transport goods or  
37 persons.

38 (8) “Power and communications” including facilities for the  
39 transmission or distribution of electrical energy, natural gas, and  
40 telephone and telecommunications service.

1 (9) "Public transit" including air and rail transport, airports,  
2 guideways, vehicles, rights-of-way, passenger stations,  
3 maintenance and storage yards, and related structures, including  
4 public parking facilities, *and* equipment used to provide or enhance  
5 transportation by bus, rail, ferry, or other conveyance, either  
6 publicly or privately owned, that provides to the public general or  
7 special service on a regular and continuing basis.

8 (10) "Sewage collection and treatment" including pipes, pumps,  
9 and conduits that collect wastewater from residential,  
10 manufacturing, and commercial establishments, the equipment,  
11 structures, and facilities used in treating wastewater to reduce or  
12 eliminate impurities or contaminants, and the facilities used in  
13 disposing of, or transporting, remaining sludge, as well as all  
14 equipment used in the maintenance and operation of the foregoing.

15 (11) "Solid waste collection and disposal" including vehicles,  
16 vehicle-compatible waste receptacles, transfer stations, recycling  
17 centers, sanitary landfills, and waste conversion facilities necessary  
18 to remove solid waste, except that which is hazardous as defined  
19 by law, from its point of origin.

20 (12) "Water treatment and distribution" including facilities in  
21 which water is purified and otherwise treated to meet residential,  
22 manufacturing, or commercial purposes and the conduits, pipes,  
23 and pumps that transport it to places of use.

24 (13) "Defense conversion" including, but not limited to, facilities  
25 necessary for successfully converting military bases consistent  
26 with an adopted base reuse plan.

27 (14) "Public safety facilities" including, but not limited to, police  
28 stations, fire stations, court buildings, jails, juvenile halls, and  
29 juvenile detention facilities.

30 (15) "State highways" including any state highway as described  
31 in Chapter 2 (commencing with Section 230) of Division 1 of the  
32 Streets and Highways Code, and the related components necessary  
33 for safe operation of the highway.

34 (16) (A) "Military infrastructure;" including, but not limited  
35 to, facilities on or near a military installation, that enhance the  
36 military operations and mission of one or more military  
37 installations in this state. To be eligible for funding, the project  
38 shall be endorsed by the Office of Military and Aerospace Support  
39 established pursuant to Section 13998.2.

(B) For purposes of this subdivision, “military installation” means any facility under the jurisdiction of the Department of Defense, as defined in paragraph (1) of subsection (e) of Section 2687 of Title 10 of the United States Code.

(17) “Goods movement-related infrastructure” including port facilities, roads, rail, and other facilities and projects that move goods, energy, and information.

(r) “Rate reduction bonds” has the meaning set forth in Section 840 of the Public Utilities Code.

(s) “Revenues” means all receipts, purchase payments, loan repayments, lease payments, and all other income or receipts derived by the bank or a sponsor from the sale, lease, or other financing arrangement undertaken by the bank, a sponsor, or a participating party, including, but not limited to, all receipts from a bond purchase agreement; and any income or revenue derived from the investment of any money in any fund or account of the bank or a sponsor and any receipts derived from transition property. Revenues shall not include moneys in the General Fund of the state.

(t) “Special purpose trust” means a trust, partnership, limited partnership, association, corporation, nonprofit corporation, or other entity authorized under the laws of the state to serve as an instrumentality of the state to accomplish public purposes and authorized by the bank to acquire, by purchase or otherwise, for retention or sale, the bonds of a sponsor or of the bank made or entered into pursuant to this division and to issue special purpose trust bonds or other obligations secured by these bonds or other sources of public or private revenues. Special purpose trust also means any entity authorized by the bank to acquire transition property or to issue rate reduction bonds, or both, subject to the approvals by the bank and powers of the bank as are provided by the bank in its resolution authorizing the entity to issue rate reduction bonds.

(u) “Sponsor” means any subdivision of the state or local government including departments, agencies, commissions, cities, counties, nonprofit corporations formed on behalf of a sponsor, special districts, assessment districts, and joint powers authorities within the state or any combination of these subdivisions that makes an application to the bank for financial assistance in connection with a project in a manner prescribed by the bank. This

1 definition shall not be construed to require that an applicant have  
2 an ownership interest in the project. In addition, an electrical  
3 corporation shall be deemed to be the sponsor as well as the  
4 participating party for any project relating to the financing of  
5 transition costs and the acquisition of transition property on the  
6 request of the electrical corporation and any person, company,  
7 corporation, partnership, firm, or other entity or group engaged in  
8 business or operation within the state that applies for financing of  
9 any economic development facility, shall be deemed to be the  
10 sponsor as well as the participating party for the project relating  
11 to the financing of that economic development facility.

12 (v) "State" means the State of California.

13 (w) "Transition costs" has the meaning set forth in Section 840  
14 of the Public Utilities Code.

15 (x) "Transition property" has the meaning set forth in Section  
16 840 of the Public Utilities Code.

17 SEC. 4. Section 63025.1 of the Government Code is amended  
18 to read:

19 63025.1. The bank board may do or delegate the following to  
20 the executive director:

21 (a) Sue and be sued in its own name.

22 (b) As provided in Chapter 5 (commencing with Section 63070),  
23 issue bonds and authorize special purpose trusts to issue bonds,  
24 including, at the option of the board, bonds bearing interest that  
25 is taxable for the purpose of federal income taxation, or borrow  
26 money to pay all or any part of the cost of any project, or to  
27 otherwise carry out the purposes of this division.

28 (c) Engage the services of private consultants to render  
29 professional and technical assistance and advice in carrying out  
30 the purposes of this division.

31 (d) Employ attorneys, financial consultants, and other advisers  
32 as may, in the bank's judgment, be necessary in connection with  
33 the issuance and sale, or authorization of special purpose trusts for  
34 the issuance and sale, of any bonds, notwithstanding Sections  
35 11042 and 11043.

36 (e) Contract for engineering, architectural, accounting, or other  
37 services of appropriate state agencies as may, in its judgment, be  
38 necessary for the successful development of a project.

39 (f) Pay the reasonable costs of consulting engineers, architects,  
40 accountants, and construction, land use, recreation, and

1 environmental experts employed by any sponsor or participating  
2 party if, in the bank's judgment, those services are necessary for  
3 the successful development of a project.

4 (g) Acquire, take title to, and sell by installment sale or  
5 otherwise, lands, structures, real or personal property, rights,  
6 rights-of-way, franchises, easements, and other interests in lands  
7 that are located within the state, or transition property as the bank  
8 may deem necessary or convenient for the financing of the project,  
9 upon terms and conditions that it considers to be reasonable.

10 (h) Receive and accept from any source, including, but not  
11 limited to, the federal government, the state, or any agency thereof,  
12 loans, contributions, or grants, in money, property, labor, or other  
13 things of value, for, or in aid of, a project, or any portion thereof.

14 (i) Make loans to any sponsor or participating party, either  
15 directly or by making a loan to a lending institution, in connection  
16 with the financing of a project in accordance with an agreement  
17 between the bank and the sponsor or a participating party, either  
18 as a sole lender or in participation with other lenders. However,  
19 no loan shall exceed the total cost of the project as determined by  
20 the sponsor or the participating party and approved by the bank.

21 (j) Make loans to any sponsor or participating party, either  
22 directly or by making a loan to a lending institution, in accordance  
23 with an agreement between the bank and the sponsor or  
24 participating party to refinance indebtedness incurred by the  
25 sponsor or participating party in connection with projects  
26 undertaken and completed prior to any agreement with the bank  
27 or expectation that the bank would provide financing, either as a  
28 sole lender or in participation with other lenders.

29 (k) Mortgage all or any portion of the bank's interest in a project  
30 and the property on which any project is located, whether owned  
31 or thereafter acquired, including the granting of a security interest  
32 in any property, tangible or intangible.

33 (l) Assign or pledge all or any portion of the bank's interests in  
34 transition property and the revenues therefrom, or assets, things  
35 of value, mortgages, deeds of trust, bonds, bond purchase  
36 agreements, loan agreements, indentures of mortgage or trust, or  
37 similar instruments, notes, and security interests in property,  
38 tangible or intangible and the revenues therefrom, of a sponsor or  
39 a participating party to which the bank has made loans, and the

1 revenues therefrom, including payment or income from any interest  
2 owned or held by the bank, for the benefit of the holders of bonds.

3 (m) Make, receive, or serve as a conduit for the making of, or  
4 otherwise provide for, grants, contributions, guarantees, insurance,  
5 credit enhancements or liquidity facilities, or other financial  
6 enhancements to a sponsor or a participating party as financial  
7 assistance for a project.

8 (n) Lease the project being financed to a sponsor or a  
9 participating party, upon terms and conditions that the bank deems  
10 proper but shall not be leased at a loss; charge and collect rents  
11 therefor; terminate any lease upon the failure of the lessee to  
12 comply with any of the obligations thereof; include in any lease,  
13 if desired, provisions that the lessee shall have options to renew  
14 the lease for a period or periods, and at rents determined by the  
15 bank; purchase any or all of the project; or, upon payment of all  
16 the indebtedness incurred by the bank for the financing of the  
17 project, the bank may convey any or all of the project to the lessee  
18 or lessees.

19 (o) Charge and equitably apportion among sponsors and  
20 participating parties the bank's administrative costs and expenses  
21 incurred in the exercise of the powers and duties conferred by this  
22 division.

23 (p) Issue, obtain, or aid in obtaining, from any department or  
24 agency of the United States, from other agencies of the state, or  
25 from any private company, any insurance or guarantee to, or for,  
26 the payment or repayment of interest or principal, or both, or any  
27 part thereof, on any loan, lease, or obligation or any instrument  
28 evidencing or securing the same, made or entered into pursuant to  
29 this division.

30 (q) Notwithstanding any other provision of this division, enter  
31 into any agreement, contract, or any other instrument with respect  
32 to any insurance or guarantee; accept payment in the manner and  
33 form as provided therein in the event of default by a sponsor or a  
34 participating party; and issue or assign any insurance or guarantee  
35 as security for the bank's bonds.

36 (r) Enter into any agreement or contract, execute any instrument,  
37 and perform any act or thing necessary or convenient to, directly  
38 or indirectly, secure the bank's bonds, the bonds issued by a special  
39 purpose trust, or a sponsor's obligations to the bank or to a special  
40 purpose trust, including, but not limited to, bonds of a sponsor

1 purchased by the bank or a special purpose trust for retention or  
2 sale, with funds or moneys that are legally available and that are  
3 due or payable to the sponsor by reason of any grant, allocation,  
4 apportionment or appropriation of the state or agencies thereof, to  
5 the extent that the Controller shall be the custodian at any time of  
6 these funds or moneys, or with funds or moneys that are or will  
7 be legally available to the sponsor, the bank, or the state or any  
8 agencies thereof by reason of any grant, allocation, apportionment,  
9 or appropriation of the federal government or agencies thereof;  
10 and in the event of written notice that the sponsor has not paid or  
11 is in default on its obligations to the bank or a special purpose  
12 trust, direct the Controller to withhold payment of those funds or  
13 moneys from the sponsor over which it is or will be custodian and  
14 to pay the same to the bank or special purpose trust or their  
15 assignee, or direct the state or any agencies thereof to which any  
16 grant, allocation, apportionment or appropriation of the federal  
17 government or agencies thereof is or will be legally available to  
18 pay the same upon receipt by the bank or special purpose trust or  
19 their assignee, until the default has been cured and the amounts  
20 then due and unpaid have been paid to the bank or special purpose  
21 trust or their assignee, or until arrangements satisfactory to the  
22 bank or special purpose trust have been made to cure the default.

23 (s) Enter into any agreement or contract, execute any instrument,  
24 and perform any act or thing necessary, convenient, or appropriate  
25 to carry out any power expressly given to the bank by this division,  
26 including, but not limited to, agreements for the sale of all or any  
27 part, including principal, interest, redemption rights or any other  
28 rights or obligations, of bonds of the bank or of a special purpose  
29 trust, liquidity agreements, contracts commonly known as interest  
30 rate swap agreements, forward payment conversion agreements,  
31 futures or contracts providing for payments based on levels of, or  
32 changes in, interest rates or currency exchange rates, or contracts  
33 to exchange cashflows or a series of payments, or contracts,  
34 including options, puts or calls to hedge payments, rate, spread,  
35 currency exchange, or similar exposure, or any other financial  
36 instrument commonly known as a structured financial product.

37 (t) Purchase, with the proceeds of the bank's bonds, transition  
38 property or bonds issued by, or for the benefit of, any sponsor in  
39 connection with a project, pursuant to a bond purchase agreement  
40 or otherwise. Bonds or transition property purchased pursuant to

1 this division may be held by the bank, pledged or assigned by the  
2 bank, or sold to public or private purchasers at public or negotiated  
3 sale, in whole or in part, separately or together with other bonds  
4 issued by the bank, and notwithstanding any other provision of  
5 law, may be bought by the bank at private sale.

6 (u) (1) Enter into purchase and sale agreements with all entities,  
7 public and private, including state and local government pension  
8 funds, with respect to the sale or purchase of bonds or transition  
9 property.

10 (2) Enter into development and financing agreements for projects  
11 within the border region, as prescribed in Article 5.5 (commencing  
12 with Section 63047.1).

13 (v) Invest any moneys held in reserve or sinking funds, or any  
14 moneys not required for immediate use or disbursement, in  
15 obligations that are authorized by law for the investment of trust  
16 funds in the custody of the Treasurer.

17 (w) Authorize a special purpose trust or trusts to purchase or  
18 retain, with the proceeds of the bonds of a special purpose trust,  
19 transition property or bonds issued by, or for the benefit of, any  
20 sponsor in connection with a project or issued by the bank or a  
21 special purpose trust, pursuant to a bond purchase agreement or  
22 otherwise. Bonds or transition property purchased pursuant to this  
23 title may be held by a special purpose entity, pledged or assigned  
24 by a special purpose entity, or sold to public or private purchasers

34 other than the bank or a special purpose trust to acquire transition  
35 property upon approval of the transaction in a financing order by  
36 the Public Utilities Commission, as provided in Article 5.5  
37 (commencing with Section 840) of Chapter 4 of Part 1 of Division  
38 1 of the Public Utilities Code.

39 (z) Apply for and accept subventions, grants, loans, advances,  
40 and contributions from any source of money, property, labor, or

1 other things of value. The sources may include bond proceeds,  
2 dedicated taxes, state appropriations, federal appropriations, federal  
3 grant and loan funds, public and private sector retirement system  
4 funds, and proceeds of loans from the Pooled Money Investment

6 (aa) Do all things necessary and convenient to carry out its

7 63047.1. The bank is hereby authorized to establish and  
8 participate in a binational financing authority for the purpose of  
9 facilitating and supporting the economic development of  
10 communities within both sides of the border region, thereby  
11 advancing job opportunities for the economic well-being of the  
12 people of California. Other participants in the authority may  
13 include, but are not limited to, cities, counties, and other local  
14 government entities within the Imperial Valley, San Diego County,  
15 the Coachella Valley, the North American Development Bank,  
16 and governmental entities within the border region of Mexico.

17 63047.2. (a) The bank may enter into an agreement with any  
18 federal, state, local, or foreign economic and infrastructure

22 within the border region. The bank's purpose is to serve a role that
