An act to amend Sections 1230, 1230.1, and 6025 of the Penal Code, relating to probation.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2031, as amended, Fuentes. Probation: community corrections program.

Existing law authorizes each county to establish a Community Corrections Performance Incentives Fund to receive state moneys to implement a community corrections program consisting of a system of felony probation supervision services to, among other things, manage and reduce offender risk while under felony probation supervision and upon reentry from jail into the community. Existing law requires a community corrections program to be implemented by probation and advised by a local Community Corrections Partnership, consisting of specified members, including, but not limited to, the sheriff and the heads of various county social services programs. Existing law requires a Community Corrections Partnership to recommend a local plan to the county board of supervisors for the implementation of public safety realignment.

This bill would add a rank-and-file deputy sheriff ~~and~~, a rank-and-file probation officer or deputy probation officer, *a rank-and-file social worker, and a counselor employed by a county alcohol and substance*

abuse program, to be appointed by a local labor organization, to the membership of a Community Corrections Partnership ~~and. The bill would require their votes the vote of the rank-and-file probation officer or deputy probation officer on the local plan.~~

Existing law establishes the Board of State and Community Corrections to provide statewide leadership, coordination, and technical assistance to promote effective state and local efforts and partnerships in California's adult and juvenile criminal justice system. The board is comprised of specified members, including, but not limited to, *a public member and county sheriffs and probation officers.*

This bill would add *one more public member and a rank-and-file juvenile probation officer or deputy juvenile probation officer, a rank-and-file adult probation officer or deputy adult probation officer, a rank-and-file deputy sheriff, and a state parole officer or agent rank-and-file social worker with specified experience* to the membership of the board, to be appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate confirmation.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 1230 of the Penal Code is amended to

- 3 1230. (a) Each county is hereby authorized to establish in each
- 4 county treasury a Community Corrections Performance Incentives
- 5 Fund (CCPIF), to receive all amounts allocated to that county for
- 6 purposes of implementing this chapter.
- 7 (b) In any fiscal year for which a county receives moneys to be
- 8 expended for the implementation of this chapter, the moneys,
- 9 including interest, shall be made available to the CPO of that
- 10 county, within 30 days of the deposit of those moneys into the
- 11 fund, for the implementation of the community corrections program
- 12 authorized by this chapter.
- 13 (1) The community corrections program shall be developed and
- 14 implemented by probation and advised by a local Community
- 15 Corrections Partnership.
- 16 (2) The local Community Corrections Partnership shall be
- 17 chaired by the CPO and comprised of the following membership:

1 (A) The presiding judge of the superior court, or his or her
2 designee.

3 (B) A county supervisor or the chief administrative officer for
4 the county or a designee of the board of supervisors.

5 (C) The district attorney.

6 (D) The public defender.

7 (E) The sheriff.

8 (F) A rank-and-file deputy sheriff, to be appointed by the local
9 labor organization.

10 (G) A chief of police.

11 (H) A rank-and-file probation officer or deputy probation officer,
12 to be appointed by the local labor organization.

13 (I) The head of the county department of social services.

14 *(J) A rank-and-file social worker employed by the county*
15 *department of social services, to be appointed by the local labor*
16 *organization.*

22 (M) The head of the county alcohol and substance abuse
23 programs.

24 *(N) A counselor employed by a county alcohol and substance*
25 *abuse program, to be appointed by the local labor organization.*

29 (P) A representative from a community-based organization with
30 experience in successfully providing rehabilitative services to
31 persons who have been convicted of a criminal offense.

33 (Q) An individual who represents the interests of victims.

34 (3) Funds allocated to probation pursuant to this act shall be
35 used to provide supervision and rehabilitative services for adult
36 felony offenders subject to probation, and shall be spent on
37 evidence-based community corrections practices and programs,
38 as defined in subdivision (d) of Section 1229, which may include,
39 but are not limited to, the following:

1 (A) Implementing and expanding evidence-based risk and needs
2 assessments.

3 (B) Implementing and expanding intermediate sanctions that
4 include, but are not limited to, electronic monitoring, mandatory
5 community service, home detention, day reporting, restorative
6 justice programs, work furlough programs, and incarceration in
7 county jail for up to 90 days.

8 (C) Providing more intensive probation supervision.

9 (D) Expanding the availability of evidence-based rehabilitation
10 programs, including, but not limited to, drug and alcohol treatment,
11 mental health treatment, anger management, cognitive behavior
12 programs, and job training and employment services.

13 (E) Evaluating the effectiveness of rehabilitation and supervision
14 programs and ensuring program fidelity.

15 (4) The CPO shall have discretion to spend funds on any of the
16 above practices and programs consistent with this act but, at a
17 minimum, shall devote at least 5 percent of all funding received
18 to evaluate the effectiveness of those programs and practices
19 implemented with the funds provided pursuant to this chapter. A
20 CPO may petition the Administrative Office of the Courts to have
21 this restriction waived, and the Administrative Office of the Courts
22 shall have the authority to grant such a petition, if the CPO can
23 demonstrate that the department is already devoting sufficient
24 funds to the evaluation of these programs and practices.

25 (5) Each probation department receiving funds under this chapter
26 shall maintain a complete and accurate accounting of all funds
27 received pursuant to this chapter.

28 SEC. 2. Section 1230.1 of the Penal Code is amended to read:

29 1230.1. (a) Each county local Community Corrections
30 Partnership established pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 1230
31 shall recommend a local plan to the county board of supervisors
32 for the implementation of the 2011 public safety realignment.

33 (b) The plan shall be voted on by an executive committee of
34 each county's Community Corrections Partnership consisting of
35 the chief probation officer of the county as chair, a chief of police,
36 the sheriff, ~~a rank-and-file deputy sheriff~~, the District Attorney,
37 the Public Defender, the presiding judge of the superior court, or
38 his or her designee, a rank-and-file probation officer or deputy
39 probation officer, and one department representative listed in either
40 subparagraph (G), (H), or (J) of paragraph (2) of subdivision (b)

1 of Section 1230, as designated by the county board of supervisors
2 for purposes related to the development and presentation of the
3 plan.

4 (c) The plan shall be deemed accepted by the county board of
5 supervisors unless the board rejects the plan by a vote of four-fifths
6 of the board, in which case the plan goes back to the Community
7 Corrections Partnership for further consideration.

8 (d) Consistent with local needs and resources, the plan may
9 include recommendations to maximize the effective investment
10 of criminal justice resources in evidence-based correctional
11 sanctions and programs, including, but not limited to, day reporting
12 centers, drug courts, residential multiservice centers, mental health
13 treatment programs, electronic and GPS monitoring programs,
14 victim restitution programs, counseling programs, community
15 service programs, educational programs, and work training
16 programs.

17 SEC. 3. Section 6025 of the Penal Code, as amended by Section
18 32 of Chapter 36 of the Statutes of 2011, is amended to read:

19 6025. (a) Commencing July 1, 2012, the Board of State and
20 Community Corrections shall be composed of 16 members, as
21 follows:

22 (1) The Chair of the Board of State and Community Corrections,
23 who shall be the Secretary of the Department of Corrections and
24 Rehabilitation.

25 (2) The Director of the Division of Adult Parole Operations for
26 the Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.

27 (3) A county sheriff in charge of a local detention facility which
28 has a Corrections Standards Authority rated capacity of 200 or
29 less inmates, appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate
30 confirmation.

31 (4) A county sheriff in charge of a local detention facility which
32 has a Corrections Standards Authority rated capacity of over 200
33 inmates, appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate
34 confirmation.

35 (5) A county supervisor or county administrative officer. This
36 member shall be appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate
37 confirmation.

38 (6) A chief probation officer from a county with a population
39 over 200,000, appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate
40 confirmation.

1 (7) A chief probation officer from a county with a population
2 under 200,000, appointed by the Governor, subject to Senate
3 confirmation.

4 (8) A judge appointed by the Judicial Council of California.

5 (9) A chief of police, appointed by the Governor, subject to
6 Senate confirmation.

7 (10) A community provider of rehabilitative treatment or
8 services for adult offenders, appointed by the Speaker of the
9 Assembly.

10 (11) A community provider or advocate with expertise in
11 effective programs, policies, and treatment of at-risk youth and
12 juvenile offenders, appointed by the Senate Committee on Rules.

13 (12) ~~A—Two public—member members~~, appointed by the
14 Governor, subject to Senate confirmation.

15 (13) ~~Four~~ Three rank-and-file representatives, to be appointed
16 by the Governor and subject to Senate confirmation, including all
17 of the following:

18 (A) One ~~juvenile~~ probation officer or a deputy ~~juvenile~~ probation
19 officer.

20 ~~(B) One adult probation officer or a deputy adult probation~~
21 ~~officer.~~

23 (B) One deputy sheriff who is a sergeant or lower rank.

24 ~~(D) One state parole officer or parole agent.~~

25 (C) *One social worker with experience serving at-risk youth,*
26 *adult criminal offenders, or persons with alcohol or substance*
27 *abuse problems.*

28 (b) The terms of the members appointed by the Governor shall
29 expire as follows: three on July 1, 2014, and eight on July 1, 2015,
30 as specified by the Governor. The term of the member appointed
31 by the Senate Committee on Rules shall expire on July 1, 2014.
32 The term of the member appointed by the Speaker of the Assembly
33 shall expire on July 1, 2015. The term of the member appointed
34 by the Judicial Council shall expire on July 1, 2015. Successor
35 members shall hold office for terms of three years, each term to
36 commence on the expiration date of the predecessor. Any
37 appointment to a vacancy that occurs for any reason other than
38 expiration of the term shall be for the remainder of the unexpired
39 term. Members are eligible for reappointment.

1 (c) The board shall select a vice chairperson from among its
2 members, who shall be either a chief probation officer or a sheriff.
3 Seven members of the board shall constitute a quorum.

4 (d) When the board is hearing charges against any member, the
5 individual concerned shall not sit as a member of the board for the
6 period of hearing of charges and the determination of
7 recommendations to the Governor.

8 (e) If any appointed member is not in attendance for three
9 meetings in any calendar year, the board shall inform the
10 appointing authority, which may remove that member and make
11 a new appointment, as provided in this section, for the remainder
12 of the term.
