An act to add Chapter 7.3 (commencing with Section 18420) to Part 6 of Division 9 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, relating to public social services.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2547, as introduced, Blumenfield. Homeless youth: Statewide Office of the Homeless Youth Advocate.

Under existing law, several state agencies have prescribed responsibilities relating to homeless youth. Existing law requires the California Emergency Management Agency to administer a program to provide shelter and other services to runaway and nonrunaway youth and their families.

This bill would establish the Statewide Office of the Homeless Youth Advocate in the California Health and Human Services Agency. This bill would require the office, among other things, to provide information and assistance to reduce the provision of overlapping services to, identify obstacles to the provision of services to, make recommendations to remove those obstacles and improve the quality of services provided to, and obtain and disseminate information from service providers relating to services available for, homeless youth. This bill would require these provisions to be implemented only after the Director of Finance determines that federal, state, or private funds in an amount sufficient to support the activities of the office have been deposited with the state, and would provide that it is the intent of the Legislature that these

provisions become inoperative if the Director of Finance determines there are insufficient funds to support the activities of the office.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

8 18420. (a) The Statewide Office of the Homeless Youth
9 Advocate is established within the California Health and Human
10 Services Agency. The Office of the Homeless Youth Advocate
11 shall seek to do all of the following:

12 (1) Coordinate current services, and facilitate interagency
13 collaboration to identify gaps in, remove barriers and improve
14 access to, and share, information related to homeless youth.

15 (2) Identify and remove obstacles to the provision of services
16 to homeless youth.

17 (3) Improve the quality of services that are provided to homeless
18 youth.

19 (4) Reduce needless expenditures that are caused by the
20 provision of overlapping services.

21 (5) Identify housing and supportive services funding resources
22 that are available to entities serving homeless youth.

23 (b) The Statewide Office of the Homeless Youth Advocate is
24 strongly encouraged to work with other departments within the
25 California Health and Human Services Agency, the State
26 Department of Education, the Administrative Office of the Courts,
27 nonprofit organizations, appropriate departments of the federal
28 government, and other key stakeholders when performing the
29 functions described in subdivision (a).

30 (c) The Statewide Office of the Homeless Youth Advocate shall
31 have all of, but not be limited to, the following responsibilities:

32 (1) Provide information, coordination assistance, and technical
33 assistance as necessary to reduce needless expenditures that are

1 associated with the provision of overlapping services, and to
2 improve the quality of services provided to homeless youth.

3 (2) Identify both procedural and substantive obstacles to the
4 provision of services to homeless youth, and make
5 recommendations to the entities specified in this section relating
6 to the procedural, regulatory, or statutory changes that are necessary
7 to remove obstacles to the provision of services to homeless youth.

8 (3) Obtain information from service providers relating to
9 services that are known to be available to the homeless youth
10 population in the state, and post the information on its Internet
11 Web site.

12 (4) Develop, maintain, and disseminate information that is
13 relevant to the homeless youth population, including, but not
14 limited to, information relating to the legal, educational, and other
15 rights of homeless youth, and a list of legal, educational, and
16 victim's rights organizations that serve the homeless youth
17 population.

18 (5) Obtain information relating to funding sources that are
19 known to be available to assist the homeless youth population in
20 the state.

21 (6) Work with entities to identify issues relating to the sharing
22 of information when providing services to homeless youth, and to
23 facilitate resolution of information-sharing issues.

24 (7) Prepare and submit an annual report, beginning on the date
25 that is one year after this section is implemented pursuant to
26 subdivision (e), to the Governor and the Legislature regarding the
27 activities and performance of the Statewide Office of the Homeless
28 Youth Advocate. The report shall also include the following
29 information:

30 (A) The data that the State Department of Education annually
31 compiles on the number of homeless youth who are enrolled in
32 public schools in the state, the types of homelessness experienced
33 by the youth, and a list of services that are provided to the homeless
34 youth.

35 (B) The data that the United States Department of Housing and
36 Urban Development annually publishes on the federally mandated
37 point-in-time count of the homeless population, which includes
38 homeless youth.

39 (d) As used in this section, unless the context otherwise requires:

1 (1) “Entity” means a state agency, a state-operated program, or
2 a nonprofit community-based organization.

3 (2) “Homeless youth” means a homeless youth as defined in
4 paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of Section 11139.3 of the
5 Government Code.

6 (e) This section shall be implemented only if the Director of
7 Finance makes a determination that federal, state, or private funds
8 in an amount sufficient to fully support the activities of this section,
9 including staffing the Statewide Office of the Homeless Youth
10 Advocate, have been deposited with the state for the purposes of
11 this section. If the Director of Finance makes a determination that
12 sufficient funds have or have not been deposited with the state for
13 the purposes of this section, the director shall execute a declaration
14 stating that the determination has been made. The declaration
15 executed pursuant to this subdivision shall be retained by the
16 director, and, within five working days of the execution of the
17 declaration, a copy shall be provided to the fiscal and appropriate
18 policy committees of the Legislature, the Secretary of State, the
19 Secretary of the Senate, the Chief Clerk of the Assembly, and the
20 Legislative Counsel, and posted on the Internet Web site of the
21 Department of Finance.

22 (f) Pursuant to subdivision (e), if the Director of Finance
23 determines that insufficient funds have been deposited with the
24 state to support the activities of this section, this section shall
25 become inoperative.

26 (g) (1) The requirement for submitting a report imposed under
27 paragraph (7) of subdivision (c) is inoperative on the date that is
28 four years after the date the first report is submitted, pursuant to
29 Section 10231.5 of the Government Code.

30 (2) A report to be submitted pursuant to paragraph (7) of
31 subdivision (c) shall be submitted in compliance with Section 9795
32 of the Government Code.
