An act relating to the Budget Act of 2012. An act to amend Section 7575 of, and to add Section 7582 to, the Government Code, to amend Sections 123865, 123870, 123875, 123940, and 123955 of the Health and Safety Code, to add Chapter 16.2 (commencing with Section 12694.1) to Part 6.2 of Division 2 of the Insurance Code, and to amend Section 14105.22 of, and to add Sections 14005.26 and 14005.27 to, the Welfare and Institutions Code, relating to health coverage, and making an appropriation therefor, to take effect immediately, bill related to the budget.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 1034, as amended, Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review. ~~Budget Act of 2012.~~ *Healthy Families Program: Medi-Cal: program transition: expansion.*

Under existing law, the Robert W. Crown California Children's Services Act, the State Department of Health Care Services and each county administer the California Children's Services Program (CCS program) for treatment services for persons under 21 years of age diagnosed with severe chronic disease or severe physical limitations, as specified. Existing law generally limits eligibility for CCS program services to persons in families with an annual adjusted gross income of \$40,000 or less. Under existing law, the department, or any designated local agency administering the program, is responsible for providing medically necessary occupational and physical therapy to eligible children, as specified. Existing law requires that specified

assessments and therapy treatment services rendered to a child referred to a local education agency for an assessment or a disabled child or youth with an IEP be exempt from financial eligibility standards and family repayment requirements.

This bill would make technical, nonsubstantive changes to these provisions.

Existing law creates the Healthy Families Program, administered by the Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board (MRMIB), to arrange for the provision of health, vision, and dental benefits to eligible children pursuant to a federal program, the Children's Health Insurance Program. Existing law also provides for the Medi-Cal program, which is administered by the State Department of Health Care Services, under which basic health care services are provided to qualified low-income persons. The Medi-Cal program is, in part, governed and funded by federal Medicaid provisions.

Under existing law, the Director of Health Care Services may contract with any qualified individual, organization, or entity to provide services to, arrange for, or case manage the care of Medi-Cal beneficiaries, subject to specified requirements. Existing law requires a Medi-Cal applicant or beneficiary to be informed of the managed care and fee-for-service options available regarding methods of receiving Medi-Cal benefits.

This bill would provide for the transition of specified enrollees of the Healthy Families Program to the Medi-Cal program, to the extent that those individuals are otherwise eligible, no sooner than January 1, 2013. This bill would provide that the transition would take place in 4 phases, as specified, for individuals enrolled in either a Healthy Families Program plan that is also a Medi-Cal managed care plan (Phase 1) or enrolled in a Healthy Families Program plan that is a subcontractor of a Medi-Cal managed care plan or other specified plans (Phase 2 and Phase 3), or for individuals residing in a county that is not a Medi-Cal managed care county (Phase 4).

This bill would require the department to exercise certain options under federal law to provide benefits to optional targeted low-income children, as described, and seek appropriate federal approvals and state plan amendments, in order to implement the Healthy Families Program to Medi-Cal program transition and Medi-Cal program expansion provided for in the bill. This bill would require MRMIB to coordinate with the department to implement these provisions, and

would make related changes. This bill would make related changes to the California Children's Services Program provisions.

By increasing county responsibilities with respect to determining Medi-Cal eligibility, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Existing law provides that reimbursement for clinical laboratory or laboratory services under the Medi-Cal program, as defined, may not exceed 80% of the lowest maximum allowance established by the federal Medicare Program for the same or similar services.

This bill would, upon federal approval, change the rate methodology for clinical laboratory or laboratory services, as specified. This bill would also require that rates for clinical laboratory or laboratory services be reduced by 10% until federal approval is obtained for this new rate methodology.

This bill would appropriate \$400,000 from the Managed Care Fund to the Department of Managed Health Care for administration, as specified.

This bill would make legislative findings and declarations as to the necessity of a special statute for the Counties of Los Angeles and Sacramento.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to these statutory provisions.

This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as a bill providing for appropriations related to the Budget Bill.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 7575 of the Government Code is amended
2 to read:

1 7575. (a) (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the
2 State Department of Health *Care* Services, or any designated local
3 agency administering the California Children's Services, shall be
4 responsible for the provision of medically necessary occupational
5 therapy and physical therapy, as specified by Article 5
6 (commencing with Section 123800) of Chapter 3 of Part 2 of
7 Division 106 of the Health and Safety Code, by reason of medical
8 diagnosis and when contained in the child's individualized
9 education program.

10 (2) Related services or designated instruction and services not
11 deemed to be medically necessary by the State Department of
12 Health *Care* Services, that the individualized education program
13 team determines are necessary in order to assist a child to benefit
14 from special education, shall be provided by the local education
15 agency by qualified personnel whose employment standards are
16 covered by the Education Code and implementing regulations.

17 (b) The department shall determine whether a California
18 Children's Services eligible pupil, or a pupil with a private medical
19 referral needs medically necessary occupational therapy or physical
20 therapy. A medical referral shall be based on a written report from
21 a licensed physician and surgeon who has examined the pupil. The
22 written report shall include the following:

23 (1) The diagnosed neuromuscular, musculoskeletal, or physical
24 disabling condition prompting the referral.

25 (2) The referring physician's treatment goals and objectives.

26 (3) The basis for determining the recommended treatment goals
27 and objectives, including how these will ameliorate or improve
28 the pupil's diagnosed condition.

29 (4) The relationship of the medical disability to the pupil's need
30 for special education and related services.

31 (5) Relevant medical records.

32 (c) The department shall provide the service directly or by
33 contracting with another public agency, qualified individual, or a
34 state-certified nonpublic nonsectarian school or agency.

35 (d) Local education agencies shall provide necessary space and
36 equipment for the provision of occupational therapy and physical
37 therapy in the most efficient and effective manner.

38 (e) The department shall also be responsible for providing the
39 services of a home health aide when the local education agency

1 considers a less restrictive placement from home to school for a
2 pupil for whom both of the following conditions exist:

3 (1) The California Medical Assistance Program provides a
4 life-supporting medical service via a home health agency during
5 the time in which the pupil would be in school or traveling between
6 school and home.

7 (2) The medical service provided requires that the pupil receive
8 the personal assistance or attention of a nurse, home health aide,
9 parent or guardian, or some other specially trained adult in order
10 to be effectively delivered.

11 *SEC. 2. Section 7582 is added to the Government Code, to*
12 *read:*

13 *7582. Assessments and therapy treatment services provided*
14 *under programs of the State Department of Health Care Services,*
15 *or its designated local agencies, rendered to a child referred by*
16 *a local education agency for an assessment or a disabled child or*
17 *youth with an individualized education program, shall be exempt*
18 *from financial eligibility standards and family repayment*
19 *requirements for these services when rendered pursuant to this*
20 *chapter.*

21 *SEC. 3. Section 123865 of the Health and Safety Code is*
22 *amended to read:*

23 123865. ~~Whenever~~ If the parents or estate of a handicapped
24 child is wholly or partly unable to furnish for the child necessary
25 services, the parents or guardian may apply to the agency of the
26 county that has been designated by the board of supervisors of the
27 county of residence under the terms of Section 123850 to
28 administer the provisions for handicapped children. Residence
29 shall be determined in accordance with Sections 243 and 244 of
30 the Government Code.

31 *SEC. 4. Section 123870 of the Health and Safety Code is*
32 *amended to read:*

33 123870. (a) The department shall establish standards of
34 financial eligibility for treatment services under the California
35 Children's Services Program (CCS program).

36 (1) Financial eligibility for treatment services under this program
37 shall be limited to persons in families with an adjusted gross
38 income of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) or less in the most
39 recent tax year, as calculated for California state income tax
40 purposes. If a person is enrolled in the Healthy Families Program

(Part 6.2 (commencing with Section 12693) of Division 2 of the Insurance Code), the financial documentation required for that program in Section 2699.6600 of Title 10 of the California Code of Regulations may be used instead of the person's California state income tax return. *If a person is enrolled in the Medi-Cal program pursuant to Section 14005.26 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, the financial documentation required to establish eligibility for the Medi-Cal program may be used instead of the person's California state income tax return.* However, the director may authorize treatment services for persons in families with higher incomes if the estimated cost of care to the family in one year is expected to exceed 20 percent of the family's adjusted gross income.

(2) Children enrolled in the Healthy Families Program, *or enrolled in the Medi-Cal program pursuant to Section 14005.26 of the Welfare and Institutions Code*, who have a CCS program eligible medical condition under Section 123830, and whose families do not meet the financial eligibility requirements of paragraph (1), shall be deemed financially eligible for CCS program benefits.

(b) Necessary medical therapy treatment services under the California Children's Services Program rendered in the public schools shall be exempt from financial eligibility standards and enrollment fee requirements for the services when rendered to any handicapped child whose educational or physical development would be impeded without the services.

(c) All counties shall use the uniform standards for financial eligibility and enrollment fees established by the department. All enrollment fees shall be used in support of the California Children's Services Program.

(d) Annually, every family with a child eligible to receive services under this article shall pay a fee of twenty dollars (\$20), that shall be in addition to any other program fees for which the family is liable. This assessment shall not apply to any child who is eligible for full scope Medi-Cal benefits without a share of cost, for children receiving therapy through the California Children's Services Program as a related service in their individualized education plans, for children from families having incomes of less than 100 percent of the federal poverty level, or for children covered under the Healthy Families Program.

1 *SEC. 5. Section 123875 of the Health and Safety Code is*
2 *amended to read:*

3 123875. ~~When~~*If* the California Children’s Service medical
4 therapy unit conference team, based on a medical referral
5 recommending medically necessary occupational or physical
6 therapy in accordance with subdivision (b) of Section 7575 of the
7 Government Code, finds that a handicapped child, as defined in
8 Section 123830, needs medically necessary occupational or
9 physical therapy, that child shall be determined to be eligible for
10 therapy services. If the California Children’s Services medical
11 consultant disagrees with the determination of eligibility by the
12 California Children’s Services medical therapy unit conference
13 team, the medical consultant shall communicate with the
14 conference team to ask for further justification of its determination,
15 and shall weigh the conference team’s arguments in support of its
16 decision in reaching his or her own determination.

17 This section shall not change eligibility criteria for the California

25 123940. (a) (1) Annually, the board of supervisors shall
26 appropriate a sum of money for services for handicapped children
27 of the county, including diagnosis, treatment, and therapy services
28 for physically handicapped children in public schools, equal to 25
29 percent of the actual expenditures for the county program under
30 this article for the 1990–91 fiscal year, except as specified in
31 paragraph (2).

32 (2) If the state certifies that a smaller amount is needed in order
33 for the county to pay 25 percent of costs of the county’s program
34 from this source. The smaller amount certified by the state shall
35 be the amount that the county shall appropriate.

36 (b) In addition to the amount required by subdivision (a), the
37 county shall allocate an amount equal to the amount determined
38 pursuant to subdivision (a) for purposes of this article from
39 revenues allocated to the county pursuant to Chapter 6

(c) (1) The state shall match county expenditures for this article from funding provided pursuant to subdivisions (a) and (b).

(2) County expenditures shall be waived for payment of services for children who are eligible pursuant to paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 123870.

(d) The county may appropriate and expend moneys in addition to those set forth in subdivision (a) and (b) and the state shall match the expenditures, on a dollar-for-dollar basis, to the extent that state funds are available for this article.

(e) County appropriations under subdivisions (a) and (b) shall include county financial participation in the nonfederal share of expenditures for services for children who are enrolled in the Medi-Cal program pursuant to Section 14005.26 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, and who are eligible for services under this article pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of Section 123870, to the extent that federal financial participation is available at the enhanced federal reimbursement rate under Title XXI of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1397aa et seq.) and funds are appropriated for the California Children's Services Program in the state budget.

(f) Nothing in this section shall require the county to expend more than the amount set forth in subdivision (a) plus the amount set forth in subdivision (b) nor shall it require the state to expend more than the amount of the match set forth in subdivision (c).

(g) Notwithstanding Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, the department, without taking further regulatory action, shall implement this section by means of California Children's Services numbered letters.

SEC. 7. Section 123955 of the Health and Safety Code is amended to read:

123955. (a) The state and the counties shall share in the cost of administration of the California Children's Services Program at the local level.

(b) (1) The director shall adopt regulations establishing minimum standards for the administration, staffing, and local

1 implementation of this article subject to reimbursement by the
2 state.

3 (2) The standards shall allow necessary flexibility in the
4 administration of county programs, taking into account the
5 variability of county needs and resources, and shall be developed
6 and revised jointly with state and county representatives.

7 (c) The director shall establish minimum standards for
8 administration, staffing and local operation of the program subject
9 to reimbursement by the state.

10 (d) Until July 1, 1992, reimbursable administrative costs, to be
11 paid by the state to counties, shall not exceed 4.1 percent of the
12 gross total expenditures for diagnosis, treatment and therapy by
13 counties as specified in Section 123940.

14 (e) Beginning July 1, 1992, this subdivision shall apply with
15 respect to all of the following:

31 excluding significant deviations of cost or volume factors and with
32 consideration to geographical areas. The department shall have
33 the discretion to determine the specific methodology and factors
34 used in the development of the lowest average amount under this
35 subparagraph to ensure compliance with federal Medicaid law
36 and regulations as specified in paragraph (10).

37 (C) For purposes of subparagraph (B), the department may
38 contract with a vendor for the purposes of collecting payment data
39 reports from clinical laboratories, analyzing payment information,
40 and calculating a proposed rate.

1 (D) The proposed rates calculated by the vendor described in
2 subparagraph (C) may be used in determining the lowest
3 reimbursement rate for clinical laboratories or laboratory services
4 in accordance with paragraph (3).

5 (E) Data reports submitted to the department shall be certified
6 by the provider's certified financial officer or an authorized
7 individual.

8 (F) Clinical laboratory providers that fail to submit data reports
9 within 30 working days from the time requested by the department
10 shall be subject to the suspension provisions of subdivisions (a)
11 and (c) of Section 14123.

12 (6) Data reports provided to the department pursuant to this
13 section shall be confidential and shall be exempt from disclosure
14 under the California Public Records Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing
15 with Section 6250) of Division 7 of Title 1 of the Government
16 Code).

17 (7) The department shall seek stakeholder input on the rate
18 setting methodology.

19 (8) (A) Notwithstanding Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section
20 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code,
21 the department shall, without taking any further regulatory action,
22 implement, interpret, or make specific this section by means of
23 provider bulletins or similar instructions until regulations are
24 adopted. It is the intent of the Legislature that the department have
25 temporary authority as necessary to implement program changes
26 until completion of the regulatory process.

27 (B) The department shall adopt emergency regulations no later
28 than July 1, 2014. The department may readopt any emergency
29 regulation authorized by this section that is the same as or
30 substantially equivalent to an emergency regulation previously
31 adopted pursuant to this section. The initial adoption of emergency
32 regulations implementing the amendments to this section and the
33 one readoption of emergency regulations authorized by this section
34 shall be deemed an emergency and necessary for the immediate
35 preservation of the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare.
36 Initial emergency regulations and the one readoption of emergency
37 regulations authorized by this section shall be exempt from review
38 by the Office of Administrative Law.

39 (C) The initial emergency regulations and the one readoption
40 of emergency regulations authorized by this section shall be

1 submitted to the Office of Administrative Law for filing with the
2 Secretary of State and each shall remain in effect for no more than
3 180 days, by which time final regulations may be adopted.

4 (9) To the extent that the director determines that the new
5 methodology or payment reductions are not consistent with the
6 requirements of Section 1396a(a)(30)(A) of Title 42 of the United
7 States Code, the department may revert to the methodology under
8 subdivision (a) to ensure access to care is not compromised.

9 (10) (A) The department shall implement this section in a
10 manner that is consistent with federal Medicaid law and
11 regulations. The director shall seek any necessary federal
12 approvals for the implementation of this section. This section shall
13 be implemented only to the extent that federal approval is obtained.

14 (B) In determining whether federal financial participation is
15 available, the director shall determine whether the rates and
16 payments comply with applicable federal Medicaid requirements,
17 including those set forth in Section 1396a(a)(30)(A) of Title 42 of
18 the United States Code.

19 (C) To the extent that the director determines that the rates and
20 payments do not comply with applicable federal Medicaid
21 requirements or that federal financial participation is not available
22 with respect to any reimbursement rate, the director retains the
23 discretion not to implement that rate or payment and may revise
24 the rate or payment as necessary to comply with federal Medicaid
25 requirements. The department shall notify the Joint Legislative
26 Budget Committee 10 days prior to revising the rate or payment
27 to comply with federal Medicaid requirements.

28 SEC. 10. Section 14005.26 is added to the Welfare and
29 Institutions Code, to read:

30 14005.26. (a) The department shall exercise the option
31 pursuant to Section 1902(a)(10)(A)(ii)(XIV) of the federal Social
32 Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1396a(a)(10)(A)(ii)(XIV)) to provide
33 full-scope benefits with no share of cost under this chapter and
34 Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 14200) to children who have
35 attained six years of age but have not attained 19 years of age,
36 who are optional targeted low-income children pursuant to Section
37 1905(u)(2)(B) of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec.
38 1396d(u)(2)(B)), with family incomes up to and including 200
39 percent of the federal poverty level. The department shall seek

1 federal approval of a state plan amendment to implement this
2 subdivision.

3 (b) Pursuant to Section 1902(r)(2) of the federal Social Security
4 Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1396a(r)(2)), the department shall adopt the
5 option to use less restrictive income and resource methodologies
6 to exempt all resources and disregard income at or above 200
7 percent and up to and including 250 percent of the federal poverty
8 level for the individuals described in subdivision (a). The
9 department shall seek federal approval of a state plan amendment
10 to implement this subdivision.

11 (c) For purposes of carrying out the provisions of this section,
12 the department may adopt the option pursuant to Section
13 1902(e)(13) of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec.
14 1396a(e)(13)) to rely upon findings of the Managed Risk Medical
15 Insurance Board (MRMIB) regarding one or more components of
16 eligibility.

17 (d) (1) The department shall exercise the option pursuant to
18 Section 1916A of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec.
19 1396o-1) to impose premiums for individuals described in
20 subdivision (a) whose family income has been determined to be
21 above 150 percent and up to and including 200 percent of the
22 federal poverty level, after application of the income disregard
23 pursuant to subdivision (b). The department shall not impose
24 premiums under this subdivision for individuals described in
25 subdivision (a) whose family income has been determined to be at
26 or below 150 percent of the federal poverty level, after application
27 of the income disregard pursuant to subdivision (b). The
28 department shall obtain federal approval for the implementation
29 of this subdivision.

30 (2) All premiums imposed under this section shall equal the
31 family contributions described in paragraph (2) of subdivision (d)
32 of Section 12693.43 of the Insurance Code and shall be reduced
33 in conformity with subdivisions (e) and (f) of Section 12693.43 of
34 the Insurance Code.

35 (e) This section shall be implemented only to the extent that all
36 necessary federal approvals and waivers described in this section
37 have been obtained and the enhanced rate of federal financial
38 participation under Title XXI of the federal Social Security Act
39 (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1397aa et seq.) is available for targeted
40 low-income children pursuant to that act.

1 (f) The department shall not enroll targeted low-income children
2 described in this section in the Medi-Cal program until all
3 necessary federal approvals and waivers have been obtained, and
4 no sooner than January 1, 2013.

5 (g) (1) To the extent the new budget methodology pursuant to
6 paragraph (6) of subdivision (a) of Section 14154 is not fully
7 operational, for the purposes of implementing this section, for
8 individuals described in subdivision (a) whose family income has
9 been determined to be up to and including 150 percent of the
10 federal poverty level, as determined pursuant to subdivision (b),
11 the department shall utilize the budgeting methodology for this
12 population as contained in the November 2011 Medi-Cal Local
13 Assistance Estimate for Medi-Cal county administration costs for
14 eligibility operations.

15 (2) For purposes of implementing this section, the department
16 shall include in the Medi-Cal Local Assistance Estimate an amount
17 for Medi-Cal eligibility operations associated with the individuals
18 whose family income is determined to be above 150 percent and
19 up to and including 200 percent of the federal poverty level, after
20 application of the income disregard pursuant to subdivision (b).
21 In developing an estimate for this activity, the department shall
22 consider the projected number of final eligibility determinations
23 each county will process and projected county costs. Within 60
24 days of the passage of the annual Budget Act, the department shall
25 notify each county of their allocation for this activity based upon

27 (h) When the new budget methodology pursuant to paragraph

32 (i) Eligibility determinations and annual redeterminations made
33 pursuant to this section shall be performed by county eligibility
34 workers.

35 (j) In conducting eligibility determinations for individuals
36 pursuant to this section and Section 14005.27, the following
37 reporting and performance standards shall apply to all counties:

38 (1) Counties shall report to the department, in a manner and
39 for a time period prescribed by the department, in consultation
40 with the County Welfare Directors Association, the number of

1 applications processed on a monthly basis, a breakout of the
2 applications based on income using the federal percentage of
3 poverty levels, the final disposition of each application, including
4 information on the approved Medi-Cal program, if applicable,
5 and the average number of days it took to make the final eligibility
6 determination for applications submitted directly to the county
7 and from the single point of entry (SPE).

8 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the following
9 performance standards shall be applied to counties regarding

13 human services department from the SPE, the following standards

23 clause (i) or (ii), 90 percent shall be processed within 10 working
24 days of being received, complete and without client errors.

25 (iv) If an application described in this section also contains
26 adults, and the adult applicants are required to submit additional
27 information beyond the information provided for the children, the
28 county shall process the eligibility for the child or children without
29 delay, consistent with this section while gathering the necessary
30 information to process eligibility for the adults.

31 (B) The department, in consultation with the County Welfare
32 Directors Association, shall develop reporting requirements for
33 the counties to provide regular data to the state regarding the
34 timeliness and outcomes of applications processed by the counties
35 that are received from the SPE.

36 (C) Performance thresholds and corrective action standards as
37 set forth in Section 14154 shall apply.

38 (D) For applications submitted directly to the county, these
39 applications shall be processed by the counties in accordance with

1 the performance standards established under subdivision (d) of
2 Section 14154.

3 (3) This subdivision shall be implemented 90 days after the
4 effective date of the act that added this section, or October 1, 2012,
5 whichever is later.

6 (4) Twelve months after implementation of this section pursuant
7 to subdivision (f), the department shall provide enrollment
8 information regarding individuals determined eligible pursuant
9 to subdivision (a) to the fiscal and appropriate policy committees
10 of the Legislature.

11 (k) (1) Notwithstanding Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section
12 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code,
13 for purposes of this transition, the department, without taking any
14 further regulatory action, shall implement, interpret, or make
15 specific this section by means of all-county letters, plan letters,
16 plan or provider bulletins, or similar instructions until the time
17 regulations are adopted. It is the intent of the Legislature that the
18 department be allowed temporary authority as necessary to
19 implement program changes until completion of the regulatory
20 process.

21 (2) To the extent otherwise required by Chapter 3.5
22 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title
23 2 of the Government Code, the department shall adopt emergency
24 regulations implementing this section no later than July 1, 2014.
25 The department may thereafter readopt the emergency regulations
26 pursuant to that chapter. The adoption and readoption, by the
27 department, of regulations implementing this section shall be
28 deemed to be an emergency and necessary to avoid serious harm
29 to the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare for purposes
30 of Sections 11346.1 and 11349.6 of the Government Code, and
31 the department is hereby exempted from the requirement that it
32 describe facts showing the need for immediate action and from
33 review by the Office of Administrative Law.

34 (l) (1) If at any time the director determines that this section
35 or any part of this section may jeopardize the state's ability to
36 receive federal financial participation under the federal Patient
37 Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111-148), or any
38 amendment or extension of that act, or any additional federal funds
39 that the director, in consultation with the Department of Finance,
40 determines would be advantageous to the state, the director shall

1 give notice to the fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature
2 and to the Department of Finance. After giving notice, this section
3 or any part of this section shall become inoperative on the date
4 that the director executes a declaration stating that the department
5 has determined, in consultation with the Department of Finance,
6 that it is necessary to cease to implement this section or a part or
7 parts thereof, in order to receive federal financial participation,
8 any increase in the federal medical assistance percentage available
9 on or after October 1, 2008, or any additional federal funds that
10 the director, in consultation with the Department of Finance, has

12 (2) The director shall retain the declaration described in
13 paragraph (1), shall provide a copy of the declaration to the
14 Secretary of the State, the Secretary of the Senate, the Chief Clerk
15 of the Assembly, and the Legislative Counsel, and shall post the
16 declaration on the department's Internet Web site.

17 (3) In the event that the director makes a determination under
18 paragraph (1) and this section ceases to be implemented, the
19 children shall be enrolled back into the Healthy Families Program.

20 SEC. 11. Section 14005.27 is added to the Welfare and
21 Institutions Code, to read:

22 14005.27. (a) Individuals enrolled in the Healthy Families
23 Program pursuant to Part 6.2 (commencing with Section 12693)
24 of Division 2 of the Insurance Code on the effective date of the act
25 that added this section and who are determined eligible to receive
26 benefits pursuant to subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 14005.26,
27 shall be transitioned into Medi-Cal, pursuant to this section.

28 (b) To the extent necessary and for the purposes of carrying out
29 the provisions of this section, in performing initial eligibility
30 determinations for children enrolled in the Healthy Families
31 Program pursuant to Part 6.2 (commencing with Section 12693)
32 of Division 2 of the Insurance Code, the department shall adopt
33 the option pursuant to Section 1902(e)(13) of the federal Social
34 Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1396a(e)(13)) to allow the department
35 or county human services departments to rely upon findings made
36 by the Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board (MRMIB)
37 regarding one or more components of eligibility. The department
38 shall seek federal approval of a state plan amendment to implement
39 this subdivision.

1 (c) To the extent necessary, the department shall seek federal
2 approval of a state plan amendment or a waiver to provide
3 presumptive eligibility for the optional targeted low-income
4 category of eligibility pursuant to Section 14005.26 for individuals
5 presumptively eligible for or enrolled in the Healthy Families
6 Program pursuant to Part 6.2 (commencing with Section 12693)
7 of Division 2 of the Insurance Code. The presumptive eligibility
8 shall be based upon the most recent information contained in the
9 individual's Healthy Families Program file. The timeframe for the
10 presumptive eligibility shall begin no sooner than January 1, 2013,
11 and shall continue until a determination of Medi-Cal eligibility is
12 made, which determination shall be performed within one year of
13 the individual's Healthy Families Program annual review date.

14 (d) (1) The California Health and Human Services Agency, in
15 consultation with the Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board,

19 strategic plan for the transition of the Healthy Families Program

34 (D) Health care and dental delivery system components such
35 as standards for informing and enrollment materials, network
36 adequacy, performance measures and metrics, fiscal solvency,
37 and related factors that ensure timely access to quality health and
38 dental care for children and adolescents transitioning to Medi-Cal.

39 (E) Inclusion of applicable operational steps, timelines, and
40 key milestones.

1 (F) A time certain for the transfer of the Healthy Families
2 Advisory Board, as described in Part 6.2 (commencing with Section
3 12693) of Division 2 of the Insurance Code, to the State
4 Department of Health Care Services.

5 (2) The intent of this strategic plan is to serve as an overall
6 guide for the development of each plan for each phase of this
7 transition, pursuant to paragraphs (1) to (8), inclusive, of
8 subdivision (e), to ensure clarity and consistency in approach and
9 subscriber continuity of care. This strategic plan may also be
10 updated by the California Health and Human Services Agency as
11 applicable and provided to the Legislature upon completion.

12 (e) (1) The department shall transition individuals from the
13 Healthy Families Program to the Medi-Cal program in four phases,
14 as follows:

15 (A) Phase 1. Individuals enrolled in a Healthy Families Program
16 health plan that is a Medi-Cal managed care health plan shall be
17 enrolled in the same plan no earlier than January 1, 2013, pursuant
18 to the requirements of this section and Section 14011.6, and to the
19 extent the individual is otherwise eligible under this chapter and
20 Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 14200).

21 (B) Phase 2. Individuals enrolled in a Healthy Families Program
22 managed care health plan that is a subcontractor of a Medi-Cal
23 managed health care plan, to the extent possible, shall be enrolled
24 into a Medi-Cal managed health care plan that includes the
25 individuals' current plan pursuant to the requirements of this
26 section and Section 14011.6, and to the extent the individuals are
27 otherwise eligible under this chapter and Chapter 8 (commencing
28 with Section 14200). The transition of individuals described in
29 this subparagraph shall begin no earlier than April 1, 2013.

30 (C) Phase 3. Individuals enrolled in a Healthy Families Program
31 plan that is not a Medi-Cal managed care plan and does not
32 contract or subcontract with a Medi-Cal managed care plan shall
33 be enrolled in a Medi-Cal managed care plan in that county.
34 Enrollment shall include consideration of the individuals' primary
35 care providers pursuant to the requirements of this section and
36 Section 14011.6, and to the extent the individuals are otherwise
37 eligible under this chapter and Chapter 8 (commencing with
38 Section 14200). The transition of individuals described in this
39 subparagraph shall begin no earlier than August 1, 2013.

40 (D) Phase 4.

1 (i) Individuals residing in a county that is not a Medi-Cal
2 managed care county shall be provided services under the
3 Medi-Cal fee-for-service delivery system, subject to clause (ii).
4 The transition of individuals described in this subparagraph shall
5 begin no earlier than September 1, 2013.

6 (ii) In the event the department creates a managed health care
7 system in the counties described in clause (i), individuals residing
8 in those counties shall be enrolled in managed health care plans
9 pursuant to this chapter and Chapter 8 (commencing with Section
10 14200).

11 (2) For the transition of individuals pursuant to subparagraphs
12 (A), (B), (C), and (D) of paragraph (1), implementation plans shall
13 be developed to ensure state and county systems readiness, health
14 plan network adequacy, and continuity of care with the goal of
15 ensuring there is no disruption of service and there is continued
16 access to coverage for all transitioning individuals. If an individual
17 is not retained with his or her current primary care provider, the
18 implementation plan shall require the managed care plan to report
19 to the department as to how continuity of care is being provided.
20 Transition of individuals described in subparagraphs (A), (B), (C),
21 and (D) of paragraph (1) shall not occur until 90 days after the
22 department has submitted an implementation plan to the fiscal
23 and policy committees of the Legislature. The implementation
24 plans shall include, but not be limited to, information on health
25 and dental plan network adequacy, continuity of care, eligibility
26 and enrollment requirements, consumer protections, and family
27 notifications.

28 (3) The following requirements shall be in place prior to
29 implementation of Phase 1, and shall be required for all phases
30 of the transition:

31 (A) Managed care plan performance measures shall be
32 integrated and coordinated with the Healthy Families Program
33 performance standards including, but not limited to, child-only
34 Healthcare Effectiveness Data and Information Set (HEDIS)
35 measures, and measures indicative of performance in serving
36 children and adolescents. These performance measures shall also
37 be in compliance with all performance requirements under the
38 Knox-Keene Health Care Service Plan Act of 1975 (Chapter 2.2
39 (commencing with Section 1340) of Division 2 of the Health and
40 Safety Code) and existing Medi-Cal managed care performance

1 measurements and standards as set forth in this chapter and
2 Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 14200), Title 22 of the
3 California Code of Regulations, and all-plan letters, including,
4 but not limited to, network adequacy and linguistic services, and
5 shall be met prior to the transition of individuals pursuant to Phase
6 1.

7 (B) Medi-Cal managed care health plans shall allow enrollees
8 to remain with their current primary care provider. If an individual
9 does not remain with the current primary care provider, the plan
10 shall report to the department as to how continuity of care is being
11 provided.

12 (4) (A) As individuals are transitioned pursuant to
13 subparagraphs (A) and (B) of paragraph (1), for individuals
14 residing in all counties except the Counties of Sacramento and
15 Los Angeles, their dental coverage shall transition to
16 fee-for-service dental coverage and may be provided by their
17 current provider if the provider is a Medi-Cal fee-for-service dental
18 provider.

19 (B) For individuals residing in the County of Sacramento, their
20 dental coverage shall continue to be provided by their current
21 dental managed care plan if their plan is a Medi-Cal dental
22 managed care plan. If their plan is not a Medi-Cal dental managed
23 care plan, they shall select a Medi-Cal dental managed care plan.
24 If they do not choose a Medi-Cal dental managed care plan, they
25 shall be assigned to a plan with preference to a plan with which
26 their current provider is a contracted provider. Any children in
27 the Healthy Families Program transitioned into Medi-Cal dental
28 managed care plans shall also have access to the beneficiary dental
29 exception process, pursuant to Section 14089.09. Further, the
30 Sacramento advisory committee, established pursuant to Section
31 14089.08, shall be consulted regarding the transition of children
32 in the Healthy Families Program into Medi-Cal dental managed
33 care plans.

34 (C) (i) For individuals residing in the County of Los Angeles,
35 for purposes of continuity of care, their dental coverage shall
36 continue to be provided by their current dental managed care plan
37 if that plan is a Medi-Cal dental managed care plan. If their plan
38 is not a Medi-Cal dental managed care plan, they may select a
39 Medi-Cal dental managed care plan or choose to move into
40 Medi-Cal fee-for-service dental coverage.

1 (ii) *It is the intent of the Legislature that children transitioning*
2 *to Medi-Cal under this section have a choice in dental coverage,*
3 *as provided under existing law.*

4 (5) *Dental health plan performance measures and benchmarks*
5 *shall be in accordance with Section 14459.6.*

6 (6) *Medi-Cal managed care health and dental plans shall report*
7 *to the department, as frequently as specified by the department,*
8 *specified information pertaining to transition implementation,*
9 *enrollees, and providers, including, but not limited to, grievances*
10 *related to access to care, continuity of care requests and outcomes,*
11 *and changes to provider networks, including provider enrollment*
12 *and disenrollment changes. The plans shall report this information*
13 *by county, and in the format requested by the department.*

14 (7) *The department may develop supplemental implementation*
15 *plans to separately account for the transition of individuals from*
16 *the Healthy Families Program to specific Medi-Cal delivery*
17 *systems.*

18 (8) *The department shall consult with the Legislature and*
19 *stakeholders, including, but not limited to, consumers, families,*
20 *consumer advocates, counties, providers, and health and dental*
21 *plans, in the development of implementation plans described in*
22 *paragraph (3) for individuals who are transitioned to Medi-Cal*
23 *in Phase 2 and Phase 3, as described in subparagraphs (B) and*
24 *(C) of paragraph (1).*

25 (9) (A) *The department shall consult and collaborate with the*
26 *Department of Managed Health Care in assessing Medi-Cal*
27 *managed care health plan network adequacy in accordance with*
28 *the Knox-Keene Health Care Service Plan Act of 1975 (Chapter*
29 *2.2 (commencing with Section 1340) of Division 2 of the Health*
30 *and Safety Code) for purposes of the developed transition plans*
31 *pursuant to paragraph (2) for each of the phases.*

32 (B) *For purposes of individuals transitioning in Phase 1, as*
33 *described in subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1), network adequacy*
34 *shall be assessed as described in this paragraph and findings from*
35 *this assessment shall be provided to the fiscal and appropriate*
36 *policy committees of the Legislature 60 days prior to the effective*
37 *date of implementing this transition.*

38 (10) *The department shall provide monthly status reports to the*
39 *fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature on the transition*
40 *commencing no later than February 15, 2013. This monthly status*

1 transition report shall include, but not be limited to, information
2 on health plan grievances related to access to care, continuity of
3 care requests and outcomes, changes to provider networks,
4 including provider enrollment and disenrollment changes, and
5 eligibility performance standards pursuant to subdivision (m). A
6 final comprehensive report shall be provided within 90 days after

8 (f) (1) The department and MRMIB shall work collaboratively

12 in the Healthy Families Program of their transition to the Medi-Cal
13 program at least 60 days prior to the transition of individuals in
14 Phase 1, as described in subparagraph (A) of paragraph (1) of
15 subdivision (d), and at least 90 days prior to transition of
16 individuals in Phases 2 and 3, as described in subparagraphs (B)
17 and (C) of paragraph (1) of subdivision (d).

18 (3) Notices developed pursuant to this subdivision shall ensure
19 individuals are informed regarding the transition, including, but
20 not limited to, how individuals' systems of care may change, when
21 the changes will occur, and whom they can contact for assistance
22 when choosing a Medi-Cal managed care plan, if applicable,
23 including a toll-free telephone number, and with problems they
24 may encounter. The department shall consult with stakeholders
25 regarding notices developed pursuant to this subdivision. These
26 notices shall be developed using plain language, and written
27 translation of the notices shall be available for those who are
28 limited English proficient or non-English speaking in all Medi-Cal
29 threshold languages.

30 (4) The department shall designate department liaisons
31 responsible for the coordination of the Healthy Families Program
32 and may establish a children's –focused section for this purpose
33 and to facilitate the provision of health care services for children
34 enrolled in Medi-Cal.

35 (5) The department shall provide a process for ongoing
36 stakeholder consultation and make information publicly available,
37 including the achievement of benchmarks, enrollment data,
38 utilization data, and quality measures.

39 (g) (1) In order to aid the transition of Healthy Families
40 Program enrollees, MRMIB, on the effective date of the act that

1 added this section and continuing through the completion of the
2 transition of Healthy Families Program enrollees to the Medi-Cal
3 program, shall begin requesting and collecting from health plans
4 contracting with MRMIB pursuant to Part 6.2 (commencing with
5 Section 12693) of Division 2 of the Insurance Code, information
6 about each health plan's provider network, including, but not
7 limited to, the primary care and all specialty care providers
8 assigned to individuals enrolled in the health plan. MRMIB shall
9 obtain this information in a manner that coincides with the
10 transition activities described in subdivision (d), and shall provide
11 all of the collected information to the department within 60 days
12 of the department's request for this information to ensure timely
13 transitions of the Healthy Family Programs enrollees.

14 (2) The department shall analyze the existing Healthy Families
15 Program delivery system network and the Medi-Cal fee-for-service
16 provider networks, including, but not limited to, Medi-Cal dental
17 providers, to determine overlaps of the provider networks in each
18 county for which there are no Medi-Cal managed care plans or
19 dental managed care plans. To the extent there is a lack of existing
20 Medi-Cal fee-for-service providers available to serve the Healthy
21 Families Program enrollees, the department shall work with the
22 Healthy Families Program provider community to encourage
23 participation of those providers in the Medi-Cal program, and
24 develop a streamlined process to enroll them as Medi-Cal
25 providers.

26 (3) (A) MRMIB, within 60 days of a request by the department,
27 shall provide the department any data, information, or record
28 concerning the Healthy Families Program as is necessary to
29 implement the transition of enrollment required pursuant to this
30 section.

31 (B) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all of the
32 following shall apply:

33 (i) The term "data, information, or record" shall include, but
34 is not limited to, personal information as defined in Section 1798.3
35 of the Civil Code.

36 (ii) Any data, information, or record shall be exempt from
37 disclosure under the California Public Records Act (Chapter 3.5
38 (commencing with Section 6250) of Division 7 of the Government
39 Code) and any other law, to the same extent that it was exempt

1 from disclosure or privileged prior to the provision of the data,
2 information, or record to the department.

3 (iii) The provision of any such data, information, or record to
4 the department shall not constitute a waiver of any evidentiary
5 privilege or exemption from disclosure.

6 (iv) The department shall keep all data, information, or records
7 provided by MRMIB confidential to the full extent permitted by
8 law, including, but not limited to, the California Public Records
9 Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 6250) of Division 7
10 of the Government Code, and consistent with MRMIB's contractual
11 obligations to keep the data, information, or records confidential.

12 (h) This section shall be implemented only to the extent that all
13 necessary federal approvals and waivers have been obtained and
14 the enhanced rate of federal financial participation under Title
15 XXI of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 1397aa et
16 seq.) is available for targeted low-income children pursuant to
17 that act.

18 (i) (1) The department shall exercise the option pursuant to
19 Section 1916A of the federal Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. Sec.
20 1396o-1) to impose premiums for individuals described in
21 subdivision (a) of Section 14005.26 whose family income has been
22 determined to be above 150 percent and up to and including 200
23 percent of the federal poverty level, after application of the income
24 disregard pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 14005.26. The
25 department shall not impose premiums under this subdivision for
26 individuals described in subdivision (a) of Section 14005.26 whose
27 family income has been determined to be at or below 150 percent
28 of the federal poverty level, after application of the income
29 disregard pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 14005.26. The
30 department shall obtain federal approval for the implementation
31 of this subdivision.

32 (2) All premiums imposed under this section shall equal the
33 family contributions described in paragraph (2) of subdivision (d)
34 of Section 12693.43 of the Insurance Code and shall be reduced
35 in conformity with subdivisions (e) and (f) of Section 12693.43 of
36 the Insurance Code.

37 (j) The department shall not enroll targeted low-income children
38 described in this section in the Medi-Cal program until all
39 necessary federal approvals and waivers have been obtained, or
40 no sooner than January 1, 2013.

1 (k) (1) To the extent the new budget methodology pursuant to
2 paragraph (6) of subdivision (a) of Section 14154 is not fully
3 operational, for the purposes of implementing this section, for
4 individuals described in subdivision (a) whose family income has
5 been determined to be at or below 150 percent of the federal
6 poverty level, as determined pursuant to subdivision (b), the
7 department shall utilize the budgeting methodology for this
8 population as contained in the November 2011 Medi-Cal Local
9 Assistance Estimate for Medi-Cal county administration costs for
10 eligibility operations.

11 (2) For purposes of implementing this section, the department
12 shall include in the Medi-Cal Local Assistance Estimate an amount
13 for Medi-Cal eligibility operations associated with the transfer of
14 Healthy Families Program enrollees eligible pursuant to
15 subdivision (a) of Section 14005.26 and whose family income is
16 determined to be above 150 percent and up to and including 200
17 percent of the federal poverty level, after application of the income
18 disregard pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 14005.26. In
19 developing an estimate for this activity, the department shall
20 consider the projected number of final eligibility determinations
21 each county will process and projected county costs. Within 60
22 days of the passage of the annual Budget Act, the department shall
23 notify each county of their allocation for this activity based upon
24 the amount allotted in the annual Budget Act for this purpose.

25 (l) When the new budget methodology pursuant to paragraph
26 (6) of subdivision (a) of Section 14154 is fully operational, the
27 new budget methodology shall be utilized to reimburse counties
28 for eligibility determinations made for individuals pursuant to this
29 section.

30 (m) Except as provided in subdivision (b), eligibility
31 determinations and annual redeterminations made pursuant to
32 this section shall be performed by county eligibility workers.

33 (n) In conducting the eligibility determinations for individuals
34 pursuant to this section and Section 14005.26, the following
35 reporting and performance standards shall apply to all counties:

36 (1) Counties shall report to the department, in a manner and
37 for a time period determined by the department, in consultation
38 with the County Welfare Directors Association, the number of
39 applications processed on a monthly basis, a breakout of the
40 applications based on income using the federal percentage of

1 poverty levels, the final disposition of each application, including
2 information on the approved Medi-Cal program, if applicable,
3 and the average number of days it took to make the final eligibility
4 determination for applications submitted directly to the county
5 and from the single point of entry (SPE).

6 (2) Notwithstanding any other law, the following performance
7 standards shall be applied to counties for eligibility determinations
8 for individuals eligible pursuant to this section:

9 (A) For children whose applications are received by the county
10 human services department from the SPE, the following standards
11 shall apply:

12 (i) Applications for children who are granted accelerated
13 enrollment by the SPE shall be processed according to the
14 timeframes specified in subdivision (d) of Section 14154.

15 (ii) Applications for children who are not granted accelerated
16 enrollment by the SPE due to the existence of an already active
17 Medi-Cal case shall be processed according to the timeframes
18 specified in subdivision (d) of Section 14154.

19 (iii) For applications for children who are not described in
20 clause (i) or (ii), 90 percent shall be processed within 10 working
21 days of being received, complete and without client errors.

22 (iv) If an application described in this section also contains
23 adults, and the adult applicants are required to submit additional
24 information beyond the information provided for the children, the
25 county shall process the eligibility for the child or children without
26 delay, consistent with this section while gathering the necessary
27 information to process eligibility for the adults.

28 (B) The department, in consultation with the County Welfare
29 Directors Association, shall develop reporting requirements for
30 the counties to provide regular data to the state regarding the
31 timeliness and outcomes of applications processed by the counties
32 that are received from the SPE.

33 (C) Performance thresholds and corrective action standards as
34 set forth in Section 14154 shall apply.

35 (D) For applications received directly into the county, these
36 applications shall be processed by the counties in accordance with
37 the performance standards established under subdivision (d) of
38 Section 14154.

39 (3) This subdivision shall be implemented 90 days after
40 enactment of this section or January 1, 2013, whichever is later.

(4) Twelve months after implementation of this section pursuant to subdivision (d), the department shall provide enrollment information regarding individuals determined eligible pursuant to subdivision (a) to the fiscal and appropriate policy committees of the Legislature.

(o) (1) Notwithstanding Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, for purposes of this transition, the department, without taking any further regulatory action, shall implement, interpret, or make specific this section by means of all-county letters, plan letters, plan or provider bulletins, or similar instructions until the time regulations are adopted. It is the intent of the Legislature that the department be allowed temporary authority as necessary to implement program changes until completion of the regulatory process.

(2) To the extent otherwise required by Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 11340) of Part 1 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, the department shall adopt emergency regulations implementing this section no later than July 1, 2014. The department may thereafter readopt the emergency regulations pursuant to that chapter. The adoption and readoption, by the department, of regulations implementing this section shall be deemed to be an emergency and necessary to avoid serious harm to the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare for purposes of Sections 11346.1 and 11349.6 of the Government Code, and the department is hereby exempted from the requirement that it describe facts showing the need for immediate action and from review by the Office of Administrative Law.

(p) (1) If at any time the director determines that this section or any part of this section may jeopardize the state's ability to receive federal financial participation under the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111-148), or any amendment or extension of that act, or any additional federal funds that the director, in consultation with the Department of Finance, determines would be advantageous to the state, the director shall give notice to the fiscal and policy committees of the Legislature and to the Department of Finance. After giving notice, this section or any part of this section shall become inoperative on the date that the director executes a declaration stating that the department has determined, in consultation with the Department of Finance,

1 that it is necessary to cease to implement this section or a part or
2 parts thereof in order to receive federal financial participation,
3 any increase in the federal medical assistance percentage available
4 on or after October 1, 2008, or any additional federal funds that
5 the director, in consultation with the Department of Finance, has
6 determined would be advantageous to the state.

7 (2) The director shall retain the declaration described in
8 paragraph (1), shall provide a copy of the declaration to the
9 Secretary of the State, the Secretary of the Senate, the Chief Clerk
10 of the Assembly, and the Legislative Counsel, and shall post the
11 declaration on the department's Internet Web site.

12 (3) In the event that the director makes a determination under
13 paragraph (1) and this section ceases to be implemented, the
14 children shall be enrolled back into the Healthy Families Program.

15 SEC. 12. The sum of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000)
16 is hereby appropriated from the Managed Care Fund to the
17 Department of Managed Health Care for administration of the
18 call center to assist individuals with the Healthy Families
19 transition, and any other aspects related to health plan readiness
20 and coordination functions with the Department of Health Care
21 Services and the Managed Risk Medical Insurance Board.

22 SEC. 13. The Legislature finds and declares that a special law
23 is necessary and that a general law cannot be made applicable
24 within the meaning of Section 16 of Article IV of the California
25 Constitution because the Counties of Los Angeles and Sacramento
26 are the only counties that have Medi-Cal dental managed care
27 arrangements and Sacramento County is the only county with
28 mandatory dental managed care enrollment.

29 SEC. 14. If the Commission on State Mandates determines that
30 this act contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement to
31 local agencies and school districts for those costs shall be made
32 pursuant to Part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division
33 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code.

34 SEC. 15. This act is a bill providing for appropriations related
35 to the Budget Bill within the meaning of subdivision (e) of Section
36 12 of Article IV of the California Constitution, has been identified
37 as related to the budget in the Budget Bill, and shall take effect
38 immediately.
