SENATE BILL

No. 305

Introduced by Senator Vasconcellos

February 4, 1999

An act to add Sections 48645.8 and 51220.6 to the Education Code, and to add Sections 885.5, 896.5, 1122.5, and 1857.5 to the Welfare and Institutions Code, relating to parenting.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 305, as amended, Vasconcellos. Parenting education.

Existing law requires the State Department of Health Services to maintain a program of maternal and child health.

This bill would require the department to convene a summit no later than March 31, 2000, to develop a master plan for parenting education in nonschool settings. The bill would require the various state departments to participate in the summit and collect, complete, and submit to the summit research available regarding the causal relationship between the presence or absence of parenting skills and dysfunctional behavior. The bill would require the department to submit a proposed master plan for parenting education based upon the recommendations of the summit to the Legislature on or before January 1, 2001.

Existing law authorizes the county board of education to provide for the administration and operation of juvenile court schools either by the county superintendent of schools or by contract with respective governing boards of the schools in which the juvenile court school is located.

This bill would require a juvenile court school to provide to each pupil who is at least 12 years old a course in parenting education.

Existing law requires the governing board of each school district that maintains a junior or senior high school to adopt standards of proficiency in basic skills for pupils attending school within its school district. Existing law sets forth the required courses of study in grades 7 to 12. Existing law requires that the course of study for grade 7 or 8 include course content in parenting skills and education.

This bill would require, commencing in the 2000–01 school year, a school district to ensure that all pupils in grades 9 to 12, inclusive, or the equivalent thereof, receive parenting education from adequately trained instructors in appropriate courses. This bill would require, on or before January 1, 2004, the State Department of Education to submit to the Legislature an evaluation of the parenting education required by this provision.

Existing law requires the Board of Corrections to adopt and prescribe the minimum standards of programs of education and training for juvenile homes, ranches, camps, or forestry camps. Existing law also requires the board to adopt and prescribe the minimum standards of programs of education and training for regional youth educational facilities and youth correctional centers. Existing law establishes within the Department of the Youth Authority a correctional education authority to carry out the education and training of wards committed to the authority.

This bill would require the board and the Department of the Youth Authority to ensure that the above described facilities provide to each ward committed to the facility a course in parenting education.

This bill would impose a state-mandated local program by requiring the schools to which it applies to provide to certain pupils a course in parenting education.



These provisions would be implemented only to the extent that funding is appropriated for the purposes of these provisions.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement, including the creation of a State Mandates Claims Fund to pay the costs of mandates that do not exceed \$1,000,000 statewide and other procedures for claims whose statewide costs exceed \$1,000,000.

This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to these statutory provisions.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. (a) It is the intent of the Legislature in
- 2 enacting this act that the state design and implement a
- 3 comprehensive parenting education plan that would
- 4 foster the development of healthier parents, families,
- 5 children, and adults.
- 6 (b) The Director of Health Services shall convene a
- 7 summit no later than March 31, 2000, for the purpose of
- 8 developing a master plan for parenting education in
- 9 nonschool settings. The master plan shall especially
- 10 accommodate those persons who are no longer attending
- 11 school in the year 2000.
- 12 (c) The summit shall include interested parties of all
- 13 ideologies and persuasions, legislative experts in
- 14 parenting issues, representatives of current providers,
- 15 academic experts, business leaders, family and child
- 16 development experts, health professionals, experts in
- 17 public school parenting education programs, parents, and
- 18 children.
- 19 (d) The director, or his or her designee, of each of the
- 20 departments listed in subdivision (e) shall participate in
- 21 the summit. To the extent that his or her department has

1 jurisdiction, each director shall collect, complete, and
2 submit to the summit the best research available
3 regarding the causal relationship between good and
4 healthy parenting, or lack thereof, to dysfunctional
5 behavior. The research submitted to the summit shall also
6 address the public costs that result from dysfunctional
7 behavior.

8 (e) The director, or his or her designee, of the
9 following departments shall participate in the summit as
10 provided in subdivision (d):

- 11 (1) Department of Corrections.
- 12 (2) Department of the Youth Authority.
- 13 (3) State Department of Social Services.
- 14 (4) State Department of Mental Health.
- 15 (5) State Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs.
- 16 (6) Superintendent of Public Instruction.

17 (f) The objectives of the summit shall include, but not
18 be limited to, the following:

19 (1) Development of an inventory of all parenting
20 education programs currently available in California.

21 (2) Development of a method and curriculum by
22 which parents of newborns may receive parenting
23 education in an appropriate range of public and private
24 nonschool settings.

25 (3) Identification of the classifications of licensed
26 professionals who would be the most appropriate
27 educators of parenting skills in nonschool settings,
28 assessment of the need for the establishment of instructor
29 training and continuing education requirements for
30 these professionals, and development of mechanisms by
31 which these professionals can be engaged in the practice
32 of parenting education.

33 (4) Creation of a means for coordinating parenting
34 education services, in consultation with the State
35 Department of Education.

36 (5) Identification of the ways and means for
37 developing the funding for the various options for
38 parenting education.

39 (6) Identification and development of additional
40 methods by which each of the state departments

1 participating in this summit can ensure that Californians
2 receive effective and useful parenting education.

3 (g) The State Department of Health Services shall
4 organize the recommendations of the summit into a
5 proposed California master plan for parenting education
6 and submit that plan to the Legislature no later than
7 January 1, 2001.

8 (h) The State Department of Health Services shall
9 make every reasonable effort to secure private funding to
10 underwrite the cost of this summit.

11 (i) The State Department of Health Services shall not
12 be responsible for travel costs and per diem associated
13 with this summit for any participant, except when
14 required by state law or administrative policy.

15 (j) After making available copies of the master plan to
16 the Legislature and appropriate persons in the executive
17 branch, the State Department of Health Services may
18 make additional copies available to interested persons at
19 a reasonable charge to cover costs of printing and mailing.

20 (k) The State Department of Health Services shall
21 evaluate the implementation of the summit's
22 recommendations and shall make every reasonable effort
23 to either use existing resources or secure private funding
24 to underwrite this evaluation.

25 SEC. 2. Section 48645.8 is added to the Education
26 Code, to read:

27 48645.8. (a) A juvenile court school shall provide, to
28 each pupil who is at least 12 years old, a course in
29 parenting education, with content designed to develop a
30 knowledge of topics described in subdivision (b) of
31 Section 51220.6.

32 (b) *This section shall be implemented only to the*
33 *extent funding is appropriated for this purpose.*

34 SEC. 3. Section 51220.6 is added to the Education
35 Code, to read:

36 51220.6. (a) Commencing in the 2000–01 school year,
37 a school district shall ensure that all pupils in grades 9 to
38 12, inclusive, or the equivalent thereof, receive parenting
39 education from adequately trained instructors in
40 appropriate courses, including, but not limited to, home

1 economics careers and technology education. To the
2 extent practicable, school districts shall include parenting
3 education in existing appropriate education courses. For
4 purposes of this subdivision, “school district” includes
5 county boards of education, county superintendents of
6 schools, and state schools for the handicapped.

7 (b) The required parenting education shall be
8 designed to develop knowledge of topics including, but
9 not limited to, all of the following:

- 10 (1) Parental responsibilities.
- 11 (2) Child growth and development.
- 12 (3) Maintaining healthy relationships.
- 13 (4) Child abuse and neglect issues.
- 14 (5) Self-esteem.
- 15 (6) Personal hygiene.
- 16 (7) Household budgeting.
- 17 (8) Teen parenting issues.
- 18 (9) Positive communication and problem solving skill.

19 (c) A teacher of parenting education shall meet at
20 least one of the following qualifications:

21 (1) Hold a valid California teaching credential that
22 includes preparation to teach child growth and
23 development, family and interpersonal relationships, and
24 parenting education.

25 (2) Complete at least 40 hours of in-service instruction,
26 within the last five years, in child growth and
27 development, family and interpersonal relationships, and
28 parenting education, as approved by the State
29 Department of Education.

30 (d) Parenting education may be offered by a team of
31 teachers functioning under the direction or supervision
32 of a teacher who holds the teaching credential described
33 in paragraph (1) of subdivision (c).

34 (e) In accordance with state law and the policy of the
35 school district, each school district shall give the following
36 to the parent or guardian of a pupil who is currently
37 enrolled in a course in which parenting education is
38 taught:



1 (1) Adequate notice of the pupil's proposed
2 participation in the parenting education curriculum set
3 forth in this section.

4 (2) Access to the parenting education instructional
5 materials for his or her review.

6 (f) It is the intent of the Legislature that each school
7 district ensure that all pupils known to be pregnant and
8 all pupils who are known to be prospective fathers for the
9 babies of these pregnant pupils shall be enrolled in the
10 next scheduled parenting education course.

11 (g) On or before January 1, 2004, the State
12 Department of Education shall submit to the Legislature
13 an evaluation of the effectiveness of the parenting
14 education required by this section.

15 *(h) This section shall be implemented only to the*
16 *extent funding is appropriated for this purpose.*

17 SEC. 4. Section 885.5 is added to the Welfare and
18 Institutions Code, to read:

19 885.5. (a) The Board of Corrections, in consultation
20 with the Department of the Youth Authority, shall ensure
21 that a juvenile home, ranch, camp, or forestry camp shall
22 provide to each ward committed to the home, ranch, or
23 camp who is at least 12 years old a course in parenting
24 education, with content designed to develop a knowledge
25 of topics described in subdivision (b) of Section 51220.6
26 of the Education Code.

27 *(b) This section shall be implemented only to the*
28 *extent funding is appropriated for this purpose.*

29 SEC. 5. Section 896.5 is added to the Welfare and
30 Institutions Code, to read:

31 896.5. (a) The Board of Corrections, in consultation
32 with the Department of the Youth Authority, shall ensure
33 that a regional youth educational facility shall provide to
34 each ward committed to the facility a course in parenting
35 education, with content designed to develop a knowledge
36 of topics described in subdivision (b) of Section 51220.6
37 of the Education Code.

38 *(b) This section shall be implemented only to the*
39 *extent funding is appropriated for this purpose.*

1 SEC. 6. Section 1122.5 is added to the Welfare and
2 Institutions Code, to read:

3 1122.5. (a) The Department of the Youth Authority
4 shall ensure that an institution under this chapter shall
5 provide to each ward committed to that institution a
6 course in parenting education, with content designed to
7 develop a knowledge of topics described in subdivision
8 (b) of Section 51220.6 of the Education Code.

9 (b) *This section shall be implemented only to the*
10 *extent funding is appropriated for this purpose.*

11 SEC. 7. Section 1857.5 is added to the Welfare and
12 Institutions Code, to read:

13 1857.5. (a) The Board of Corrections, in consultation
14 with the Department of the Youth Authority, shall ensure
15 that a youth correctional center shall provide to each
16 ward committed to the center a course in parenting
17 education, with content designed to develop a knowledge
18 of topics described in subdivision (b) of Section 51220.6
19 of the Education Code.

20 (b) *This section shall be implemented only to the*
21 *extent funding s appropriated for this purpose.*

22 SEC. 8. Notwithstanding Section 17610 of the
23 Government Code, if the Commission on State Mandates
24 determines that this act contains costs mandated by the
25 state, reimbursement to local agencies and school
26 districts for those costs shall be made pursuant to Part 7
27 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of Title
28 2 of the Government Code. If the statewide cost of the
29 claim for reimbursement does not exceed one million
30 dollars (\$1,000,000), reimbursement shall be made from
31 the State Mandates Claims Fund.
